Developing Your Resilience

- 5. Be nurturing. Care about those around you in both your professional and personal lives.
- 6. Be gritty and tough. Don't wallow in self-pity. Instead, dig deep and tap into your emotional strength.

7. Focus on others, not yourself. Value what those around you contribute to your life. Realize that you won't succeed on your own.
