This knowledge informs critical thought and develops responsible citizens prepared to engage with the world. In working to understand human behaviour, students acquire tools to shape our society.

The need for leaders versed in the liberal arts, social sciences, and the professions has never been greater. Voices are needed to remind humanity of its essential diversity, and its fragile and complex character. They are needed to remind us: that leaders are meant to guide – not lead – humanity; that social justice is not just an academic study; that compassion is sacred; and that human beings are part of nature.



DID YOU KNOW?

Our Discovery Program allows students without a declared major to explore different academic subjects by taking a pair of specially designed courses in the Fall semester, and one course in the Winter semester, alongside courses in their area of study.

Anthropology

Anthropology combines an interest in local communities and international power. A concern for social change that is appropriate to the needs of people drives our scholarly explorations of the cultural past and present. Anthropology is the study of how people live and think across cultures. If you like exploring the world's diversity, knowing more about First Nations peoples and people living in cultures outside of North America, then anthropology is for you. Archaeological, physical (forensic), and social-cultural approaches offered by our program will strengthen your ability to think more critically about the world and to contribute more effectively to social policy. Employers seek graduates who are sensitive to cultural diversity and who have an awareness of international issues.

Behaviour, Cognition, and Neuroscience

Behaviour, Cognition and Neuroscience combines the biological aspects of psychology and biology relating to the brain and behaviour. This is an interdisciplinary program designed for students interested in carrying out research in the life/behavioural sciences as part of their undergraduate academic training.

Along with taking regular courses with students in the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, you will also take directed research-based courses with one or more faculty. Graduates receive a Bachelor of Science degree upon graduation.

Certificate in Arts Management

The Certificate in Arts Management is a program which may be completed alone or within a degree program. It provides the foundational skills necessary to succeed as an arts manager.

You will acquire skills in financial management, marketing and publicity, fundraising, board and volunteer management, management and supervision, and computer applications.

As an Arts Management student, you may focus studies on music, theatre, visual arts, or can choose a general approach, taking courses in all three areas. Courses from a degree program may be counted towards the requirements of this certificate program.

Communication, Media and Film

Our Programs

UWindsor's Communication, Media and Film program is one of only a few in Ontario where you can combine hands-on production experience in sound, video, and film with the theoretical study of media. You will learn by doing, obtaining direct experience in documentaries, radio broadcasts, animation, and multimedia productions.

As a Communication, Media, and Film major, you can take three years of production courses after the introductory year. Courses in screenwriting, editing, audio production, video, film, and podcasting provide many outlets for creativity. Our practicum courses give you experience in professional settings. Experienced production faculty members will help you develop the knowledge and skills to produce award-winning work. Entry to some advanced courses is based on a portfolio review after second year.

The department also houses 401 Sunset Productions, a weekly newsmagazine TV show that features reports on research and community experts.

Communication, Media and Film allows you to combine theory and production with an emphasis on Social Justice. Drawing on the social sciences, theoretical coursework in Communication, Media and Film allows you to understand the role that the media play in our lives and how they can contribute to social change by shifting away from the consumerist mentality that media currently foster.

By critiquing the way media operate and how they contribute to solving social problems, you can help develop new ways of looking at the world and contribute to positive social change.

Creative Writing

Our Programs

Our program is one of only two undergraduate creative writing degree programs in Ontario and four in Canada. We are unique in that we offer a complete academic degree in English literature integrated with creative writing instruction in all genres, as well as hands-on training in editing and publishing.

Our Creative Writing faculty members are established authors with graduate degrees in English. We offer a variety of excellent resources. Each year, we host an internationally recognized Writer-in-Residence, who offers readings, lectures and workshops. We feature

a Visiting Authors reading series, co-sponsored by the Canada Council for the Arts. Our Resident Writing Professional, Marty Gervais, offers workshops, consultations, and advice on preparing writing for publication and instruction on publishing and editing.

We offer public venues for emerging writers to read their work on and off campus, including local cafés and at our Literary Quickies reading series. You will develop and refine your talent through individual attention from professionals in a supportive workshop environment. You will have the chance to collaborate with our other creative art departments, including Dramatic Art, Visual Arts, Music, and Communication, Media and Film which offers courses in film and television production.

Our graduates have gone on to become successful, award-winning authors. Our faculty – past and

present – includes writers such as Alistair MacLeod, Joyce Carol Oates, W.O. Mitchell, Adele Wiseman, Morley Callaghan, Di Brandt, Susan Holbrook, Karl Jirgens, Louis Cabri and Nicole Markotic. Recent Writers-in-Residence include Margaret Christakos, Nino Ricci, Christopher Dewdney and David French.

In addition to our undergraduate programs, the University of Windsor has one of Canada's best Master's programs in English and Creative Writing. We invite you to join our long-standing tradition of academic and creative excellence.

Criminology

Our Criminology program is designed to provide in-depth knowledge to prepare you for a career in the areas of criminology and criminal justice, particularly in research, government work, and the criminal justice system. In first and second year, you will take courses from several departments to provide a broad liberal arts background at the same time as receiving overviews in the key criminology fields. In third and fourth year, you can specialize in a variety of areas, including criminal justice, penology, policing, violence and victimology, security, youth crime and justice, and deviance.

Diaspora Studies

Diaspora Studies focuses on issues of identity critical to the multi-ethnic and multi-cultural nature of Western countries. Diasporas exist for groups of people that share a collective memory of forced dispersion and emigration from an ancestral homeland, resettlement in many countries, and a deep longing to maintain connection to their homeland and culture. Most immigrant communities include diasporic identities. The Jewish, Armenian, Ukrainian, African, and Irish diasporas are very well known.

Diaspora Studies is available as a minor or major within a Combined Honours BA to be taken with another subject, such as Social Work and Diaspora Studies. The Combined double major in Diaspora Studies requires courses from seven different departments including Political Science, Sociology, English, Communication, Media and Film and History.

Digital Journalism **NEW!**

This is a degree unique in Canada uniting journalism theory, ethics and skills education with an academic specialization in Communication, Media and Film, English Language and Literature, English and Creative Writing, or Political Science. It provides the academic foundation necessary to critically assess events and issues in context combined with the skill set for today's digital marketplace demands from professional journalists. You will benefit from Collaborative Studio Labs in each of the four years, hands-on, problem-solving workshops taught by faculty and media professionals. In third year, you will run your own digital newsroom.

There are opportunities in each of the four years to work for on-campus publications, freelance in local media and internships.

Disability Studies

The Disability Studies program provides knowledge and experience-based practice to become an advocate for social justice and accessibility for people with disabilities.

The program includes disability studies emphasis courses from several subject areas as well as Disability Studies foundation courses. The program includes a one-semester, community experience placement in a disabilities setting.

Our 20-course, 30-course and 40-course Disability Studies programs meet the needs of students coming directly from secondary school, graduates of Ontario CAAT human services programs, and students already employed in human services settings.

UWindsor's School of Dramatic Art is renowned for the training of theatre artists and educators. Choose the program that will help you reach your career aspirations. Each program provides a high degree of practical coursework, as well as academic classes in theatre and the liberal arts.

Students in every degree program meet at University Players, the theatre company of the School of Dramatic Art, which produces six plays a year. Work as an actor, stage manager, assistant director, design assistant or designer, crew supervisor, or house manager to hone your skills as you progress through your program. You'll graduate with a wealth of knowledge, and an extensive resumé.

Our professors are professional artists and educators – award-winning teachers who will nurture you. You will also learn from guest artists who conduct workshops, teach classes, and direct plays.

Our graduates work in professional and educational theatre. Many can count Dora Mavor Moore Awards, Genie Awards, Tyrone Guthrie Awards, teaching awards, and career achievement awards among their accomplishments. Others have been recognized by their alma mater through honorary doctorates and Odyssey Awards.

Acting

This internationally recognized, professional actor training program attracts students from around the world. Courses include acting technique, scene study, Shakespearean performance, voice, improvisation, movement, theatre history, other electives in Dramatic Art and courses in the Liberal Arts.

You will learn from faculty members who are professional actors and directors and from guest artists who are working theatre professionals.

Dramatic Art

This flexible program mixes directing, theatre history, lighting design, scenic design, directing, stage management, and performance courses.

In first year, you will take introductory courses in dramatic art, theatre history, and technical theatre, as well as dramatic literature, language or science options, and work in production labs at University Players. Internships and Work Study opportunities are available for senior students. In third year, you may choose to study abroad on our exchange program with Plymouth University in Great Britain, or institutions in other parts of Europe or Australia.

Drama in Education & Community

The Drama in Education & Community program will provide you with the opportunity to apply your training through teaching placements in local elementary and high schools in your second and third years. You will also have opportunities to be involved in several social action theatre projects, produced at local schools, at community based venues and in plays for young audiences.

Drama and Communication, Media and Film

You will learn and practise many facets of theatre, film, and television production through this double major offered jointly by the School of Dramatic Art and the Department of Communication, Media and Film.

First-year dramatic art courses focus on theatre history, the nature of theatre, and rendering for the theatre. First-year courses in Communication, Media, and Film explore the role of mass media in everyday life, and the social, cultural, political and economic implications of media structures, content and messages. Students may also take courses in media production and in film studies.

After first year, more specialized areas in theatre production, performance, media studies, and video and film production are offered.

English Literature

Our Programs

Study English literature and encounter the widest range of imaginative, philosophical, political, and social thought in the language, from its beginnings in Anglo-Saxon oral tradition to contemporary First Nations literature.

Learn to read perceptively and to open your mind to new viewpoints and experiences. Writing is central to all English courses. You can discover the power of language and develop skills of research, analysis, organization and expression. Interpretative methods include considerations of critical theory, history, philosophy, ideology, and psychology. In conjunction with

studies of literature, our Creative Writing program offers a special focus. This department is one of the oldest and strongest in Canada to offer undergraduate and master's programs in this discipline, and to integrate academic with creative skills.

You will have the chance to collaborate with our other creative art departments, including Dramatic Art, Visual Arts, Music, and Communication, Media and Film that offers courses in film and television production. You can also experience such interdisciplinary programs as Women's Studies and Labour Studies. Our English programs are at the heart of the humanities at the University of Windsor and are closely allied with programs in Classical and Modern Languages, History, and Philosophy. Courses from these programs parallel and complement courses in English.

Family and Social Relations

The Family and Social Relations degree combines courses from a variety of academic perspectives focusing on the family as a fundamental unit in society. This interdisciplinary program is designed to provide a comprehensive understanding of families, including variations in their structure and form, the changing relationships within families, and the nature of family interactions with other social institutions.

History

Studying the societies, politics, and ideas of times past provides a perspective that enables us to focus creatively on our own time and on our plans for the future.

History at UWindsor is an exciting program that enables you to explore such subjects as revolutions and wars, slavery, work, family, and the struggle for the vote for women. We offer courses in the history of Europe, Latin America, Africa, the Middle East, Canada, and the US, as well as in many different types of history – social, cultural, intellectual, political, and gender history. We also deal with the history of health and medicine, books and print culture, and people of Aboriginal and African descent. Our program encourages the fullest development of creative and academic talents, while emphasizing writing, the study of primary historical documents, and understanding how the writing of history itself has changed over time.

Windsor, Ontario, is one of the oldest communities in Canada, rich with the artifacts of the past. As well, the University's location at the Canada-US border provides a unique perspective on North American history. The community has long been a meeting place of First Nations peoples, Francophones, Anglophones, and people of African descent. It is the fourth-most, multicultural city in Canada and a major point of entry for new Canadians.

International Relations and Development Studies

The program in International Relations and Development Studies links courses in several areas of study to provide you a broad understanding of the dynamics of global society. You will take a common core of courses primarily in political science. You will then choose two fields of concentration from History, Sociology and Anthropology, Economics, Middle Eastern and Islamic Studies, Diaspora, Gender Studies and Languages.

The Honours BA in International Relations and Development Studies is a demanding yet rewarding degree that provides students with a multi-faceted understanding of global politics. It is also a degree you can easily combine with study abroad.

The International Relations faculty at UWindsor conduct cutting-edge research in a range of areas including, conflict resolution and track two diplomacy, development and aid strategies, food security and hunger, international policy analysis, international trade, Middle Eastern and Islamic politics, and religion and politics.

Our graduates have an excellent record of securing rewarding employment or going on to post-graduate degrees or law school.

Labour Studies

Work. Jobs. Careers. These are major aspects of our lives and our society. How can we better understand the organization of work and the work environment? How and why is work changing and with what impact? What can be done to ensure that work meets the needs of both workers and the global community? What are the roles and impact of labour unions and labour law in achieving these goals?

These are the core questions that define Labour Studies. Windsor – with its incredible labour history that continues to this day – is an exciting place to pursue this study. We offer a host of advantages: smaller class sizes, a flexible course format, high levels of student involvement and organization, practical community and workplace experiences, and a broad range of interdisciplinary learning and career opportunities.

UWindsor offers a three-year General, a four-year Honours and a four-year Combined Honours Bachelor of Arts degree in Labour Studies. Combined degrees in sociology, psychology, political science and social justice are popular. Labour Studies also offers 15- and 25-course General and Honours BA degree completion programs for CAAT Business Diploma graduates, and 25 and 35 course General and Honours BA degree completion programs combined with a 10-course St. Clair College Human Resource Studies Certificate. Languages, Literatures and Cultures

Discovering the cultural richness and variety of the world is the best preparation for any field of study, for a career or as a foundation for life-long learning. The Department of Languages, Literatures and Cultures offers you more than 20 major and minor programs in a wide variety of areas and disciplines.

Classical Studies

Ancient Greece and Rome are the twin areas of interest in Classical Studies. The Greek love affair with life, its quest for ideals of beauty, truth, and justice; and the Roman sense of destiny and imperial greatness, with its unceasing struggle against the forces of barbarism, are the focus. You will explore the social, political, artistic and religious aspects of the ancient Mediterranean world. Courses in Greek and Latin allow you to read the great literary works of the ancient world as they were written. A course that includes excavating archaeological sites in Greece is an option. Direct contact with the great ideas and achievements of distant but enduring cultures enlightens you in the choice of your own role in an ever-more complicated world.

French Studies

French is the mother tongue of at least seven million Canadians and is spoken as a first or second language in large areas of the world: Europe, the Middle East, Africa and the Caribbean. It is also the second-most taught foreign language in the world after English. French Studies at UWindsor will guide you in exploring the many aspects of this influential language and its culture through an in-depth study of its literature, its world views, and its linguistic features.

French Studies will expose you to expertise from the different corners of the Francophonie, with a dynamic faculty from francophone Canada, Africa and Europe specializing in a wide array of areas, including the literature of francophone Canada, Europe and Africa; post-colonialism; diasporic and feminist literature; romance linguistics; and translation studies. In addition to taking a wide range of courses from the richly varied French Studies' program, all offered in French only, you will have the opportunity to spend your third year at a French-language university in either Quebec or France. This will further enhance your level of proficiency in French and deepen your understanding of the language's rich cultural customs.

UWindsor offers a three-year general and a four-year honours Bachelor of Arts degree in French Studies, in addition to an elite concurrent degree in French Studies and Education. Students in all of these degree programs are eligible for Outstanding Scholars Awards.

Modern Languages (with options in German, Italian and Spanish)

The sequenced, language-training courses offered in an intensive format allow you to learn a new language quickly and efficiently. The Modern Languages program offers concentrations in German, Italian and Spanish. While it is possible for you to enter the program with no prior knowledge of the chosen language, advanced placement for those with previous knowledge is also possible. Programs offering a two-language concentration are available. In addition, each of the programs includes the study of the culture of the target language. The culture and civilization of the language studied are introduced in all courses with specialized courses in literature and cinema. The University's multimedia, language-learning lab and the departmental mini-lab, support the development of linguistic skills, cultural understanding and sensitivity. Academic exchanges with universities in Germany, Italy, Spain and Mexico provide you with a unique experience

in the practice of the language and the indispensable awareness of the cultural customs of the native speakers. A new minor in Arabic is available as are courses in Japanese and Ojibwe.

Certificate in Second Language Education

The Modern Languages program offers a Certificate in Second Language Education, which provides a theoretical and methodological foundation and the practical skills necessary to teach a language. The Certificate is offered either in conjunction with the study of a second language (German, Italian or Spanish) or as a stand-alone Certificate program in conjunction with any other major for those wishing to teach a language in which they are already fluent, normally English or French.

Liberal and Professional Studies

Liberal and Professional Studies is the ideal program if you would rather have some knowledge in several fields of study instead of a concentrated number of courses in one major subject, or you need the flexibility to take courses when your work schedule allows.

This program includes courses in arts, social sciences, science or engineering, and business. You may select additional courses from any of 25 different departments.

The School of Music offers a variety of degree programs and options to match your career goals. Interested in a professional career in music or music education? Do you want to enrich your life and academic studies with music? We have a program for you. Our exceptional faculty will help you to develop your full potential, whatever your interests may be.

Music (Bachelor of Music)

This program is for you if you wish to pursue a professional career in music. It is designed to offer a great deal of flexibility in course and concentration selection, to better meet your individual interests. It includes two years of required core musical studies followed by two years of upper-level study in which you may specialize in one or more professional music disciplines. In each semester of your first two years, you will take applied lessons on your principal instrument or voice, participate in an ensemble, and move through sequences of courses in aural and keyboard skills, music theory, and musicology/ethnomusicology. These core courses serve as a foundation for advanced study in an area of your choice. This may include:

- Composition
- Music education
- Musicology/ethnomusicology
- Performance
- Theory

An entrance audition is required prior to acceptance into the Bachelor of Music program.

Music (Bachelor of Arts)

If you are fascinated with music and its role in social and cultural life, this program is for you. With its focus on academic study and on the development of creative and critical-thinking skills, it provides you with excellent preparation for careers and graduate studies in music theory or music history and a range of careers in areas outside of music.

It is also aimed at students who wish to pursue advanced applied musical study outside of the western classical tradition, including popular music, electronic music, and music drawing upon diverse cultural traditions. You will have the opportunity to develop composition and performance skills that reflect the wide range and richness of these practices, to challenge yourself to be a creative and reflective musician, and to prepare yourself for a career in the rapidly evolving music industry.

This is also an excellent starting place for those wishing to later pursue a professional music degree once they have refined their music skills. Because of the focus on academic study rather than performance, students are admitted directly into this program without an entrance audition. An audition is required for performance instruction and ensemble participation.

Philosophy

The rapid scientific, technological, environmental, political, cultural and economic revolution that is enveloping the world, makes it more necessary than ever to have a discipline that cultivates the abilities to understand and criticize underlying principles. Philosophy nurtures your ability to systematically examine accepted practices and beliefs, as well as to argue rigorously in support of unexplored possibilities.

In contrast to its sometimes crudely drawn, ivory-tower image, philosophy is centrally involved in the investigation of the most important and practical problems. Philosophers at the University are at the forefront of research into: what makes reasoning and

argument sound or unsound; the roots of environmental problems; the possibility of artificial intelligence; the struggle of women for equality; and the future of democracy and a rational society. If you are interested in exploring such issues and want to develop the abilities to reason and argue clearly and convincingly about them, then philosophy is for you.

Political Science

Political science studies power; who holds it, how it is exercised, and how our lives are influenced by politicians, bureaucrats, and other politically important institutions and individuals. This program will introduce you to political, economic, social and environmental issues in Canada and around the world.

We offer a unique, student-led mentoring program to all incoming students.

We also offer internships in Public Service Management to senior students, as well as courses in public administration and public policy.

Political scientists at UWindsor carry out cutting-edge research in a range of areas including border studies, Canadian and international policy analysis, conflict resolution, international political economy, media studies, Middle Eastern and Islamic politics, and religion and politics.

Political Science, Bilingual Specialization

An elite program designed especially for students interested in a career in government and/or the public service and who require a good working knowledge of French and an understanding of Francophone culture.

This program is offered in co-operation with UWindsor's French Studies program and the School of Political Studies/École d'études politiques at the University of Ottawa/Université d'Ottawa.

Fourteen courses are taught in French, including nine at the University of Windsor, and five are taken during a semester at the University of Ottawa, normally in the third year of the program.

Political Science, Law and Politics Specialization

This is a unique program specifically designed for you if you are planning to pursue a career in law, or if you wish to learn more about the Canadian and international legal systems.

This program does not guarantee admission to law school or direct entry to the legal profession, but rather provides you with an academically rigorous curriculum aimed at fostering the skill sets demanded by law schools, such as analytical and problem-solving skills, critical reading abilities, strong oral and written communication, critical thinking, organizational skills, and knowledge of the law and social justice.

This will introduce you to the ways in which legal studies intersect with political science, philosophy, history, labour studies, women's studies and sociology.

Psychology

Our program will provide you with a broad base of knowledge about human behaviour. Courses cover many topics, including: memory; motivation and decision-making; when, how and why people are influenced by the attitudes and actions of others; the origins and treatment of mental illness; human development from birth to death; and the role of culture in shaping the way we think and behave.

You can take advantage of our research laboratories and working units that reflect the applied/service components of the graduate program, including the Clinical Neuropsychology Research and Resource Centre, the Child Study Centre, and the Psychological Services and Research Centre. You can participate in research projects and are encouraged to apply classroom skills by getting involved in community organizations.

Developmental Psychology

Developmental Psychology is a specialized major within Psychology that focuses on child, adolescent, and adult development. Courses emphasize different developmental periods and characteristics of both normal and abnormal development over the life span. This program is ideal for you if you are interested in pursuing post BA degrees in Education, Social Work, and Psychology.

Child Psychology

Child Psychology is a specialized, general (three-year) BA degree within the Developmental Psychology program that focuses on child and adolescent development. Courses emphasize different lifespan periods and various aspects of typical and atypical development. This major is for you if you are interested in pursuing additional degrees or certificate programs that train you to work with children and adolescents, such as Early Childhood Education, Child and Youth Worker, and Developmental Services Worker. This major is also well-suited if you are enrolled in the Concurrent Education program and wish to have a child-focused major for your second BA degree. You can participate in research and are encouraged to apply classroom skills by becoming involved in community organizations.

The Centre for Studies in Social Justice is where researchers address the causes and impact of widespread social and economic changes; investigate the elements that promote or impede social justice; access resources, training, and knowledge; stimulate discussion and debate on social justice issues; and formulate recommendations on policies or strategies that could diminish existing injustices.

Sociology

Our Sociology program is organized around the opportunity to learn about the many aspects of social relations and social issues, ranging from intimate and family relationships, to those among classes, movements, racialized and ethnic groups, genders, unions, corporations and governments. A degree in sociology offers tools for better understanding the local and global issues of the day. The faculty members have particular research strengths in social justice issues focusing on topics such as HIV/AIDS, occupational health and health care, international development and globalization, employment equity, sex work, gay and lesbian communities, and immigrant workers.

If you are looking for a professional career that makes a real difference in people's lives, you should consider social work. Social workers help people function the best way they can in their environment, deal with their relationships, and solve personal and family problems.

Social workers often see clients who face a life-threatening disease or a social problem, such as inadequate housing, unemployment, a disability, or substance abuse. They also assist families who have serious domestic conflicts, sometimes involving child or partner abuse. Social work is a challenging career choice that offers scope for initiative and exercise of responsibility in a wide variety of practice situations.

At the University of Windsor's School of Social Work, you will be able to choose from four different Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) program tracks; six Master of Social Work (MSW) program tracks; and one Doctoral track in Social Work (PhD). Both the BSW and MSW program tracks are fully accredited by the Canadian Association for Social Work Education and all graduates are eligible for membership in the Ontario Association of Social Workers and registration with the Ontario College of Social Workers

and Social Service Workers. As well, social work is a preferred profession under the North America Free Trade Agreement, which allows graduates to work in the US and Mexico.

Undeclared – First Year

If you are not ready to commit to a specific major when you enter university, you can use first year to explore the world of ideas and subjects available. As an undeclared student, you will take a Discovery Program, including the course, Foundations of Academic Writing, helping you succeed in later courses, whatever major you eventually choose.

You will take a special double-credit course "Understanding the Contemporary World," in which you learn to examine ideas in a variety of subjects and in several different ways as you further develop the academic skills needed to succeed at university.

The courses you take in your first year will normally count toward whatever major you select by your second year.

Distinguished Visitor in Women's Studies

The Distinguished Visitor in Women's Studies program offers students a unique opportunity to meet Canadian women whose activism on behalf of girls and women is nationally recognized. For one week each fall, the visitor attends Women's Studies classes, offers seminars and workshops for the Windsor community, and delivers the keynote address at the Women's Studies Community Dinner.

Our Visual Arts degree programs share the same core course requirements: a balance of studio and art history courses. We offer you practical, skill-based training in studio areas such as photography, painting, drawing, sculpture, printmaking, digital video and new media, while also emphasizing the critical and theoretical concerns in contemporary art. We have a newly established Incubator Lab that provides the opportunity to explore Bio Art. Our Green Corridor course is an interdisciplinary study of art and the environment.

We encourage you to regularly exhibit your work in the SoVA Projects Gallery and to engage in the local arts community through exhibiting and participating in off-campus, cultural activities.

Each year, faculty members organize tours to major galleries in the region. In the recent past, students have enjoyed very reasonably priced trips to Chicago, Pittsburgh and Toledo. The School of Visual Arts has an active visiting artist program. International artists and curators visit the School to give lectures and workshops.

Visual Arts and the Built Environment

Visual Arts and the Built Environment is a unique, new program offered by the University of Windsor's School of Visual Arts in collaboration with the University of Detroit Mercy's (UDM) School of Architecture. This cross-border program combines the study of art and architecture and offers students the breadth of knowledge and experience in both disciplines. You will have the opportunity to take courses in Windsor and Detroit. Those interested in pursuing architecture and who qualify can, at the end of third year, apply to the Architectural Program at UDM. This option leads either to a Bachelor of Science degree in architecture after fourth year from UDM, or after a fifth year of study, a professional degree at the Master's level from UDM. If your primary interest is in visual arts, you can complete fourth year at the University of Windsor and graduate with a Bachelor of Fine Arts and the Built Environment.

This interdisciplinary BFA program prepares you for career opportunities and further study at the master's level. By studying the built environment, you are prepared to work in such areas as building design, city planning, restoration, architectural journalism, project management, and art/architectural history.

Intellectually stimulating, personally fulfilling, and practical. UWindsor's Women's Studies program helps you interpret the world around you and find your particular place in it. Every course draws on multiple fields of knowledge. History, Psychology, Literature, Economics, Religion, Sociology and Law all have a place in the curriculum. Courses develop your ability to critically assess what you see and read, and draw conclusions from what you discover.

A deep understanding of women and gender is at the heart of the program, but this is not its boundary. Women's Studies courses are concerned with equality and social justice in the broadest sense. You

will examine how race, social class, religion, sexuality and gender shape society and culture.

Our goal is to help you find your voice, to fulfill your potential to learn about the world, and communicate what you learn to others. You are encouraged to act on what you know and to define your own direction.

UWindsor offers a three-year General and a four-year Honours Bachelor of Arts degree. Joint degrees with Psychology, English, History, Sociology, and Criminology are popular, as is the Combined Honours Bachelor of Social Work in Social Work and Women's Studies. Social Work and Women's Studies broadens your horizons and equips you to see beyond the conventional view of things. You learn to hear and understand the many voices of those who are vulnerable and at risk, and acquire the specialized knowledge and skills needed to effectively address the issues they face. On graduation, you receive a Bachelor

of Social Work in Social Work and Women's Studies, which prepares you to become a Registered Social Worker in the Ontario College of Social Workers and Social Service Workers.

Regardless of the program, a degree in Women's Studies is practical education. The skills and knowledge you gain will be valuable in workplaces where there is a need for employees who are tolerant, broad-minded and sensitive to issues of equality, difference, and diversity.

Unique Opportunities

The University of Windsor offers an exceptional and supportive undergraduate education that emphasizes independent learning, interdisciplinary opportunities, and flexibility in degree completion pathways. The Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences provides you with many unique learning opportunities through double majors, and concurrent and inter-faculty programs.

Double Your Focus

An Honours program with a “Double Major” allows you to combine two major areas of study. The areas can be closely related like English and Dramatic Art, or seemingly diverse, like Philosophy and Computer Science. Pursue interests you already have and develop the tools you need for your chosen field of employment. Obtain specialized knowledge and skills in more than one area of interest and tailor a program to your strengths. Combining two areas often leads to a deeper understanding as you investigate similar ideas or facts from different perspectives. Almost any major program in Arts, Social Sciences, and Science can be combined with any other program in these areas in a double major.

Concurrent Education

Do you want to become a teacher? The University of Windsor is home to the concurrent program that combines a Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Education and Early Childhood Education diploma. Concurrent BA/BEEd/ECE students receive a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Education (Primary-Junior) from the University of Windsor as well as a diploma in Early Childhood Education from St. Clair College. You will benefit significantly by being admitted directly into both the Faculty of Education and the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

Inter-faculty Programs

The following are not programs in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. They do, however, rely heavily on Social Science and Arts courses.

Arts and Science

The Bachelor of Arts and Science program provides substantial education in the disciplines of both arts and sciences, and puts an emphasis on critical thinking and argument. Throughout, you will take courses designed to foster the skills of inquiry. In the third and fourth years, you will take courses in the methods of inquiry and applied inquiry. In addition to developing your research skills and involving you with topics of public concern, these courses develop your abilities and confidence as a writer and speaker.

Environmental Studies

This program is truly interdisciplinary in approach and will introduce you to the social, cultural, economic, political, legal, and ethical factors affecting human interaction with the environment while, at the same time, ensuring you acquire a basic literacy in the physical and biological sciences. Graduates will understand the human dimensions of environmental issues and will be knowledgeable, skilled individuals capable of analyzing complex human-environmental situations and formulating effective political and social strategies to address human impact.

Forensic Science

Forensic Science is the study of evidence in modern, criminal investigation for presentation in courts of law. The Honours Bachelor of Forensic Science Program will provide you with an education in both the Social Sciences and the Sciences, with a focus on acquiring the skills and knowledge essential to the practice of professional forensic science. The program will enable you to develop as an inquisitive researcher, understand scientific processes and protocols, lab procedures, criminality, judicial systems, physical evidence, the significance of high ethical standards, sophisticated interpersonal skills, and learn effective report writing and public speaking skills.

Combined Honours in Forensics

The Combined Forensics degree is for you if you are interested in pairing forensic science with any other combined major program in Arts or Social Sciences such as Criminology, Psychology, Philosophy, Political Science, English, French, Anthropology and others. This is an excellent alternative if you want to combine your study of forensics with other disciplines in the arts and social sciences. You will study methods of collecting and handling evidence, legal issues associated with analysis of evidence and standards in legal investigations.

To renew an Entrance Scholarship, you must be registered full-time and maintain an A-cumulative average.

Outstanding Scholars Award

Depending upon your academic average, you could be eligible for the University's Outstanding Scholars Program. The program's intent is to build leaders or mentors, and reward academically strong students. Recipients of the Outstanding Scholars Award are also mentored in their first year in preparation for paid appointments within faculties.

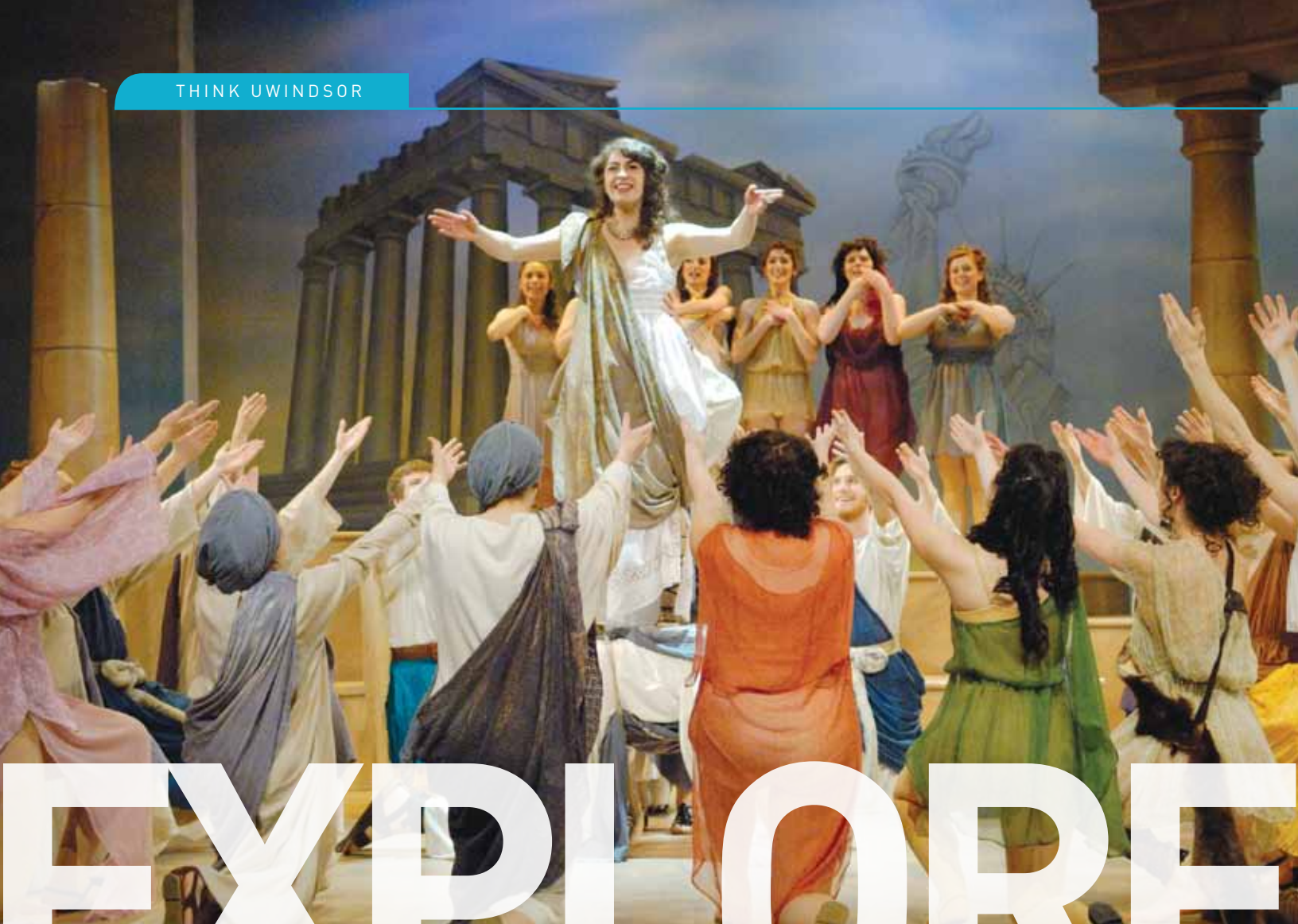

Experiential Learning

Experiential education allows you to obtain career-related experience before you graduate. Many Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences programs provide these opportunities in the form of an internship or practicum.

Humanities and Social Sciences

Anthropology

This program offers you the opportunity to apply your academic knowledge within community organization settings. You will learn about the day-to-day operation and structure of a social justice agency through observation of and discussion with staff and executive members. You will be assigned a major project to carry out for the agency under the supervision of the course instructor and an on-site practicum supervisor.

Communication, Media and Film

The Communication, Media and Film program offers you opportunities in practicum or internship courses to obtain on-the-job skills in your area of specialization. We place people in Windsor, Detroit and Toronto. You could work in such places as radio stations, TV/video operations, film productions and the PR offices of non-profits agencies.

Developmental Psychology

Supervised practicum in learning-based behaviour change strategies. You will practise behavioural assessment and systematic remediation of clinical problems through application of operant techniques in community placements.

English Literature and Creative Writing

We offer editing and publishing courses with direct training in editing, layout, design, and digital computer skills needed for a professional career. Resources in support of these skills include a publishing and professional writing centre, as well as state-of-the-art electronic media lab. You can collaborate with other creative art departments, including Music, Dramatic Art, Visual Arts and Communication, Media and Film. Students in our Editing and Publishing courses work as a team to produce books for publication, many of which have gone on to win prizes.

You will also have the opportunity to assist with publications such as these:

- Bookfest Windsor presents authors and book designers in a unique and accessible way for the Windsor-area community. It features dozens of authors of international repute, including nominees and winners of the IMPAC award, Governor General's Award, Booker Prize, Giller, Trillium, and Molson prizes. There are ample opportunities for you to get involved and to meet these writers in person!

Labour Studies

Labour Studies offers a practicum course which involves working for a government, business or community organization. You will be able to apply your academic studies within labour organizations or in other community organizations. You will learn about the operation and structure of selected organizations by observing the daily activities and by talking with staff, executive members, activists, and with the community members with whom the organization interacts. Labour Studies also offers a community action oriented research course which involves working on specific community projects for the Windsor Workers' Action Centre. This year-long course requires students to design, conduct and apply a research project to a real community or workplace issue.

Languages, Literatures and Cultures

Classical Studies

In fourth year, you may combine an exploration of the archaeological sites of ancient Greece with participation in an archaeological dig in a summer course.

French Studies

You can immerse yourself in French language and culture by spending your third year at the University of Nice in France. Courses are taken with an on-site Canadian co-ordinator, as well as with French professors. The courses are complemented by field trips and cultural activities in and around Nice, conducted in French. It is also possible to study in Quebec through an exchange program with UQAM or on a summer language bursary, and to study and work in France through the Ontario-France assistance program.

Modern Languages

You are encouraged to apply and improve your language skills in semester- or year-long academic exchanges in Germany, Spain, Italy or Mexico.

Second Language Education Certificate

The SLE Certificate program includes a practicum capstone course. You will initially observe in-class language instruction, normally teaching English to non-native speakers, followed by classroom teaching experience. The practicum course permits you to apply the pedagogical theories and practical methodologies for language instruction obtained in previous courses.

Political Science

The Public Management Internship program provides you an opportunity to receive career-related, supervised work experience in a public service management environment. The internship works in collaboration with the in-class component of the program. This course gives a critical examination of selected theories and concepts applicable to research and management practices in the public sector.

Psychology

This is a supervised practicum in a university or community setting. You will consolidate and enhance your knowledge about psychology and skills in connection with a specific project, activity or task. The practicum experience may include the opportunity to be involved in some aspect of community change, peer counselling, or research, among other possibilities.

Social Justice Studies

The practicum in Social Justice offers an opportunity to apply academic knowledge in a practical setting. You will be placed in an organization dedicated to the pursuit of social justice in the Windsor area and assigned a major project to be completed in consultation with the course instructor and under the supervision of a field supervisor.

Social Work

The successful completion of three Field Practice courses totalling 21 semester credit hours is required for graduation. You will be assigned a field placement in a human service organization or community setting for three days per week in Fall semester and four days per week in the Winter semester of fourth year. You must spend a minimum of 700 hours in field placement. The Field Education program provides experiential educational opportunities directed toward the development of values, knowledge, and skills required for generalist practice in social work.

Fine & Performing Arts

Musical Performances

The School of Music offers several series of concerts to entertain, inspire, educate and delight. **The School of Music Series** features our student choirs, band and jazz ensembles in concert on excellent stages throughout the city. The **Gallery Concerts** are a series of innovative professional performances by faculty and guests. You will have the opportunity to hear your own faculty's professional work, as well as inspiring presentations from guest artists. **Noiseborder** is an umbrella for a wide range of activities relating to new music at the University of Windsor. Noiseborder draws on the expertise of a core group of faculty, students, and community members interested in musical experimentation and collaboration, and emphasizes diverse music, emerging technologies and new performance practices.

School of Music concerts feature performances by our student ensembles:

Diverse Musics & Practices, Jazz Combo, Jazz Ensemble, New Music Workshop, Percussion Ensemble, University Singers, Chamber Choir, Wind Ensemble, Windsor Community Choir and Windsor Community Orchestra.

University Players

University Players, the production company of the School of Dramatic Art, features the talents of students in their senior years of training and the professional direction of guest artists and faculty members.

University Players is an integral part of an intensive training program for young theatre artists in all areas of performance, design, and production. We produce six plays each season in Essex Hall Theatre for approximately 14,000 patrons. The seasons represent a slice of the Canadian theatre scene: classical and period shows typical of the Stratford and Shaw Festivals; shows from the rich cannon of contemporary Canadian productions; cutting-edge shows of Canada's major production companies; and lighter fare featured on the summer theatre circuit.

Visual Arts Exhibitions

The School of Visual Arts Projects Gallery is a student-programmed exhibition space which features something new on a weekly basis. Throughout the year, visual arts students put their works on display for their peers, faculty, the University of Windsor community, and the Windsor area at large.

The Green Corridor

The Green Corridor is an interdisciplinary, community-based, public art project and Visual Arts course. The corridor, located adjacent to UWindsor's campus, is a two-kilometre stretch of Huron Church Rd., one of the busiest border-crossing routes between Canada and the US. The program aims to expand the student experience by emphasizing practical applications of creative skills. Based on an interdisciplinary team approach to problem-solving and creative practice, students work to understand their local context while developing creative solutions for community-based issues.

Focus on Students

The University of Windsor is investing in providing first-class arts facilities to ensure your educational experience is optimized in the most creative environment possible.

UWindsor is relocating its music and visual arts programs to the historic Armouries building in downtown Windsor. Our goal is to create inspiring spaces for our students in the downtown, while contributing to the social and artistic fabric of our community.

The University of Windsor has named one of Canada's leading architectural firms to provide all-inclusive design and implementation of the renovations, in partnership with one of Ontario's leading heritage consultants.

The project is being funded through a \$10-million capital donation from the

City of Windsor and its gift of the Armouries building, as well as a provincial government contribution of \$15 million.

Jackman Dramatic Art Centre

All practical classes in Dramatic Art are held in the spacious Jackman Dramatic Art Centre. Studio spaces feature sprung-wood floors with integrated sound and video systems. The Hatch Studio Theatre, our modified Black Box performance space, is fully equipped and is the centre of student-produced shows. The Acting Studio also has a production booth and lighting grid for performances.
