



This is a great time to be a Windsor grad. You have a lot to be proud of! Here are just a few of the new and exciting things happening at your alma mater.

**ENROLMENTS**

The University of Windsor is becoming a destination of choice. For Fall 2018, we are shaping up to have one of the largest incoming classes ever: 3,000 first-year students. Counting graduate and undergraduate, domestic and international, and full-time and part-time registrations, we expect to have in total approximately 16,000 students this year – one of the highest enrolments in our university's history. And all of them potential alumni!

**INVESTMENTS IN FACULTY**

We have just completed two major hiring initiatives in which we recruited 50 additional professors across all Faculties and hired five Indigenous professors in the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. These strategic campaigns were a campus-wide initiative, and they represent a major investment in both our faculty members and the undergraduate and graduate students who will be taught and mentored by them. Many thanks to the scores of colleagues who performed the important work of selecting this new generation of teachers, scholars, researchers, and practitioners.

**CAMPUS DEVELOPMENTS**


We continue with construction and renovation on main campus and downtown. The Science Research Innovation Facility, part of Essex Hall, will be ready for occupancy this Fall, and will feature 46,000 square feet of research space for collaborative work in such fields as advanced materials chemistry, cancer research, and nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy. Downtown, our School of Creative Arts is up and running and making a noise in the world of the fine and performing arts. The former Windsor Star building, housing our School of Social Work and the current Centre for Professional and Executive Education, has been renamed Windsor Hall. And the Lancer Sport and Recreation Centre is moving ahead, with an official groundbreaking expected early next Summer.

**ANNIVERSARIES**

The year 2018 saw the Faculty of Law, the School of Dramatic Art, Lancer Football, and the departments of Music, Visual Arts, and Earth and Environmental Sciences celebrate their 50th anniversaries, and our University Players begin their 60th season. What a track record! There will be special alumni events this Fall to mark these significant milestones.

The University of Windsor is an exciting place to be right now. Having served as Provost and Vice-President, Academic here since 2015, I am now seeing the University from a slightly different perspective – and what can I say? The view is full of promise! Warmest regards to all our alumni, and sincerest thanks for your continuing support.



# THE ONE MINUTE WORKOUT MAN

**Exercise has been proven to boost fat-burning metabolism, slow bone loss, help treat and prevent depression, and decrease risk of heart disease and cancer.**

Why don't we want to do it?

Not enough time is the number one reason cited by people, says Martin Gibala BHK '91.

But what if you could become more fit in less time? That's the theory behind "interval training", the subject of his book, *The One-Minute Workout: Science Shows a Way to Get Fit That's Smarter, Faster, Shorter*.

The 2017 book attracted global media attention from such outlets as *The New York Times*, CNN, NBC Nightly News, the Today Show, and *Time Magazine*. Gibala, who has published more than 100 scholarly journal articles on interval training, collaborated with author Christopher Shulgan.

Interval training is any activity that involves alternating periods of more intense effort and recovery, explains the researcher. "The idea is to vary the intensity of your workout. Go hard, relax, and repeat."\*

Interval training is not new, says Gibala, chair of the Department of Kinesiology at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ont. "It dates to the early 20th century, when Finnish athletes won Olympic gold training almost exclusively with intervals."

The book was the result of a series of research studies that asked the question: how low can you go? The answer is based on the most intense version tested in Gibala's studies:

- Two-minute warm-up
- 20 seconds of intense exercise
- Two-minute recovery (lower intensity or complete rest)
- 20 seconds of intense exercise
- Two-minute recovery
- 20 seconds of intense exercise
- Three-minute cool down

So, "The One-Minute Workout" actually takes 10 minutes. The most important thing is, "to just get out of your comfort zone. Push a bit and then recover."

Intervals can be applied to any kind of exercise, he says. "Walking, running, swimming, hiking. Anything."

Born in Windsor, the alumnus originally intended to study architecture but switched to kinesiology. He found his calling in second year when he took a physiology course, where he learned how the body functions.

Gibala, who participated in triathlons at that time, appreciated the ability to understand the body based on its physiology systems and limits, and structure his training accordingly.

After completing postdoctoral studies at the world-renowned Copenhagen Muscle and Research Centre, he eventually taught full time at McMaster. He's received three awards for teaching excellence at

McMaster as well as the President's Award for Excellence in Graduate Student Supervision.

In 2005, his lab published a study that made headlines around the world. It showed that short bouts of intense exercise could lead to profound benefits in just two weeks.

A more recent study directly compared The One Minute Workout with public health

guidelines that generally call for 150 minutes per week of moderate exercise.

Participants in one group completed three 20-second intervals on a stationary bicycle, pedaling as hard as they could, with two minutes of gentle, slow pedaling between each interval. The other group cycled continuously at a moderate pace for 50 minutes each session.

After 12 weeks of training, three times per week, the results were remarkably similar. Both groups were more aerobically fit and improved their blood sugar control, despite a five-fold difference in exercise time commitment.

Interval training can be adjusted to almost any level of fitness.\* "It's not just for elite athletes," says Gibala. "Even interval walking has been shown to be more effective than moderate, continuous walking to boost fitness in people with diabetes."

"The number one goal is to be fit. That's more important than chasing an unrealistic body weight ideal."

# Tiffany Mos

## NURSING A DREAM

### **Tiffany Mos always knew she wanted to work in the medical field. She just wasn't sure how.**

That is, until her mother set an example.

"I didn't specifically know I wanted to be a nurse until Grade 12," says Mos. "I saw my mom going through the program at that time and I was able to hear about her learning experiences. It really pushed me towards nursing, seeing how much she was learning and the impact she was already making on others' lives."

It certainly helped that Mos has no squeamishness about things that might give other mere mortals pause: blood and needles. On the contrary, "I'm usually fascinated by wounds and things like that," she says.

Mos chose to attend UWindsor, not only because it's close to home, "but it is also a great nursing program. It is an accredited program, so being able to attend a good school while being in the comfort of my home is a great benefit for me."

Once enrolled, the third-year student enjoyed the opportunity to integrate theory with practice. "We got to work with real patients starting in our first year," she explains. "And, each year, we get to build on our knowledge and skills and expand our scope of practice."

It lends an added practical dimension to the educational experience when students get to "actually see and practise the things you are learning about, rather than just reading about them in books," she says.

The most challenging aspect of the program for Mos is finding time to balance theory, clinical, work, and personal time. "It gets tough during exam season but I'm finding that as each semester goes on I get better and better with managing the workload."

To date, Mos has won a President's Renewable Entrance Scholarship and made the Dean's List for 2017 and 2018.

In addition, she was eligible to be an Outstanding Scholar, which meant she could participate in research.

In second year, her research group examined how such social factors as income, age, and education may affect a person's access to a primary health care provider such as a family doctor or nurse practitioner.

The group worked with the Erie St. Clair Health Integration Network (LHIN) on the project. "By analyzing this data, we can see if there are certain factors that cause inequities between people and possibly make it more difficult for them to access care," explains Mos.

"We can try to make health care more accessible to all people and possibly pinpoint which factors we need to take into account in order to make that happen," says Mos.

University of Windsor nursing professor, Dr. Maher El-Masri, led the group through the data collection and entry processes, "but (as of press time) the data is still in the process of being analyzed so we don't have results yet."

Mos had always thought of research as being done "in a science lab with coats and goggles."

But she quickly learned that the process is more than just working in a lab. "Doing research in the community has really opened up my eyes to all of the different paths you can take with research, and although I never imagined myself doing it, I am so grateful for the opportunity.

"I enjoy knowing that what we are doing is all in hopes of making a difference. Everyone begins the process with a goal in mind to learn more about a certain topic and use those answers to make positive contributions to society."

For Mos, the experience showed her that research is "definitely something I would like to continue."

She doesn't view nursing as a "one-track career."

"I am planning on attaining a master's degree and possibly even a PhD one day. I want to work as a nurse and get all of the field experience I can during the beginning of my career. But, later on, I would like to fall back on possibly teaching or doing research in a field I am passionate about."

Though Mos could see herself working as a nurse anesthetist one day, the future is wide open. "It is exciting to think about but time will only tell where I will end up once I get to experience different aspects of nursing as an RN.

"There are so many different paths you can take—whether working in the hospital or community work—and there is always room for more learning and growth."

During her first year, she was placed as a personal support worker at Extencicare Southwood Lakes in Windsor, Ont. In addition, she has spent time at the Windsor Regional Hospital Met Campus as part of her program. Since April 2017, she has served as a client service co-ordinator at Bayshore Therapy and Rehab.

Mos says that the most beneficial aspect of this hands-on experience is "without a doubt knowing that you helped make a patient more comfortable in their time of need."

For example, "some tasks that may seem so small to us, such as dressing yourself in the morning. But that may be a huge challenge to some patients. Being able to help them and provide them with dignity throughout their most vulnerable times is definitely very rewarding." ■

**W**ITH THE INAUGURAL SEMESTER AT THE SCHOOL OF CREATIVE ARTS IN THE BOOKS, THE GLOW OF THE NEW FACILITY CONTINUES TO SHINE BRIGHTLY FOR STUDENTS AND STAFF.

Those entering the former historic Armouries or the Alan Wildeman Centre for Creative Arts (AWCCA) say the buildings alone help to inspire creativity.

“Learning and creating music in a space that integrates multiple mediums of art has enabled me to grow as an innovator and performer,” says Madeline Doornaert, second-year concurrent BMus-BEd major, voice.

“I am deeply inspired walking into the building each day and seeing and experiencing the art my peers create.

“The building is structured so that students can constantly apply what they learn in their classes to the art they make and share in this environment.”

The School of Creative Arts (SoCA) houses about 500 students in the renovated Armouries and the AWCCA on the site of the former Tunnel Bar-B-Q.

The AWCCA hums as students work in film production studios, editing suites, sonic art studios and studios for sculpture, metal and woodworking.

In the Armouries, musicians and artists utilize practice rooms, the performance and practice halls, keyboard and computer labs, photography and painting studios and the Visual Arts and the Built Environment studio.

“I challenge you to find a school of creative arts in Canada with spaces as sophisticated, as culturally significant and as immersive as these,” says SoCA director Vincent George.

“By providing exceptional learning spaces for our students, we are already seeing results in their creative and academic work, their engagement and their pride.”

Natural light floods both spaces, illuminating the work of the faculty and students within.

Rachel Fitzgerald says being able to see her fellow classmates’ work on display is her favourite part of the new school.

“It’s bright, open, and allows music students and visual art students to interact in a way that wasn’t possible in the old buildings,” says the BA[H] student in English & Creative Writing and Visual Arts.

“The new gallery is the first room most people see when entering the building and it is always full of students’ or professors’ work. Music students can be heard practising every day.

“So far, the new downtown campus has done extremely well in showcasing the work of SoCA students and faculty.”

For associate professor Jennifer Willet, the School of Creative Arts cultivates a brighter future for its students.

“Studying in an environment like this will encourage UWindsor graduates to dream even bigger in setting their future professional goals,” Dr. Willet says. **■**

# WATCHING OVER OUR FRESHWATER ECOSYSTEMS

### **The Great Lakes will have a network of well-equipped guardians, thanks to a plan hatched by a UWindsor researcher.**

Dr. Aaron Fisk and his nine collaborators will receive \$15.9 million for the Real-time Aquatic Ecosystem Observation Network (RAEON) from the Canada Foundation for Innovation and Ontario's Ministry of Research, Innovation and Science and Ministry of Economic Development and Growth.

The collaborative research project will provide infrastructure and data management for Canadian scientists to carry out cutting-edge research on freshwater ecosystems.

"The lack of action on freshwater ecosystems by Canada is obvious when examining disproportionate spending by American versus Canadian federal governments on Great Lakes issues," says Dr. Fisk, the Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in Changing Great Lakes Ecosystems.

"The Real-time Aquatic Ecosystem Observation Network will provide the instruments and staff to carry out comprehensive and multidisciplinary research to understand and support management of the Great Lakes, and will be a reference for researchers worldwide who are investigating freshwater ecosystems."

The funding will allow Fisk and his team of researchers from Carleton, Trent, and Western universities, and collaborators from the United States, to create a network of real-time sensors, autonomous sub-surface vehicles and an extensive collection of independent instruments.

A portion of the funding will also go to build a 223-square metre addition to the University of Windsor's existing Freshwater Restoration Ecology Centre in LaSalle.

This addition will provide space for preparing, calibrating and maintaining the RAEON instruments and equipment, preparation and surgeries related to telemetry and biologging applications and developing, storing and analyzing collected samples associated with the network's research program.

Fisk, a professor at the Great Lakes Institute for Environmental Research and Department of Earth and Environmental Sciences, says the most significant challenge for researchers in the next 20 years will be understanding the impacts of the rapid changes in ecosystem

processes and functions associated with climate change and maintaining ecosystem services.

"As home to 20 per cent of the world's total freshwater resources, Canada has a global responsibility to protect these freshwater ecosystems," Fisk says.

"Despite their importance to Canada's social, economic and environmental health, freshwater ecosystems are threatened

and vulnerable; yet they remain understudied and underfunded."


Among the many areas of focus to be studied, Fisk says the new infrastructure and data management will assist in forecasting and responding to current threats like nutrient pollution and early detection of future threats, such as Asian carp.

"This network will give leaders in government, industry and even individual Canadian households the comprehensive science-based data they need to make effective, responsive policy and management decisions," Fisk says.

"RAEON will keep Canada at the forefront of aquatic research and technology development, allowing us to be a global leader in the conservation of freshwater ecosystems." ■

## PLAY IT FORWARD

**When fourth year Communications, Media and Film student Courtney Ellis looked at his UWindsor student account and saw that he received the W. D. Lowe High School and Lancer Football Alumni Scholarship, he was overcome with emotion and immediately called his mother to share the news.**

Ellis, Lancer Football defensive end, works part-time as a security guard to finance his education. “As the first in my family to attend university, the scholarship meant everything to me. It allowed me to take time off during the season to concentrate on football and my classes.”

The scholarship was established by long-time friends Justice Lloyd Dean BComm '87, LLB '90, BEd '93, Richard Holland BA '86, Monty Logan BSc '88, BComm '90 and Chris Porter, running back '86-'89. The foursome played football at W. D. Lowe Secondary school where they were coached by John Purcell. It was Purcell who introduced them to the late Lancer coach Gino Fracas. Fracas could see they were promising athletes and immediately recruited them to play football for UWindsor and pursue a university education.

Dean was the first in his family to earn a university degree and admits that he would not have gone to university if it wasn't for sports. “There were good paying jobs in the auto industry. Many of our classmates went from high school to work in the factories. My brother took a job in the plant and I likely would have too.”

The sentiment was echoed by Holland and Porter who were also the first in their families to attend university.

The foursome first heard of the need for football scholarships at the 2014 Gino Fracas Memorial Golf Tournament. They chatted about it during the dinner and soon committed to supporting a scholarship through the Annual Giving Program (AGP).

When asked what motivates them to give, they all agreed that it's rewarding to pay it forward. Logan shared his sentiments, “We all had a great time at the University of Windsor playing football, building camaraderie and now we have the ability to give back.”

“It's the generosity and support from our alumni and friends that makes the Annual Giving Program a success,” says Nicole Broderick, AGP Coordinator. “It strengthens their connection with their alma mater and the community. The impact our donors have on the lives of UWindsor students is immeasurable.”

Dean said, “to hear Courtney say he was so excited that he immediately called his mother to share the news, that's motivating

for us. That's exactly the reaction any one of us would have had as students.”

**The Honourable Ed Lumley has announced his intention to step down as the University of Windsor's Chancellor.**



In Fall 2014, Ron Joyce, chair of the Joyce Foundation, announced a \$10-million gift in support of students at the University of Windsor in the form of a bursary to be named the Ed Lumley Bursary, in recognition of the Chancellor's commitment to the University and the Windsor-Essex community.

As Chancellor, Lumley has also conferred degrees on nearly 55,000, or 40 per cent of the University's 134,000 alumni.

"Ed has been an exemplary Chancellor through his engagement with literally thousands of students, his success in securing significant material support for the University, his advocacy on behalf of our city as well as our campus, and his extraordinary personal generosity," said interim President Douglas Kneale.

## LAW STUDENT ADDRESSES SENATE ON MILLENNIAL SUPPORT FOR CHARITY

**Second-year Windsor Law student Kayla Smith kicked off her summer break with an appearance before the Special Senate Committee for the Charitable Sector, to testify about her personal experiences and research on the subject.**

Smith, who volunteered as a writer and fundraising research assistant for Imagine Canada in 2017, conducted research on giving by millennials — people coming of age in the early 21st century — and shared her findings in an online blog that earned her an invitation to appear before the committee.

The hour-long meeting contributed to the Senate Committee's examination of federal and provincial policies governing charities, non-profit organizations, foundations, and the overall impact of the voluntary sector in Canada.

"It's important to me that young people today value the importance of giving back. The charitable sector is an invaluable engine, which I believe forms the backbone of

## TEAM EXPANDS ORGANIC MATERIAL RESEARCH THANKS TO GRANTS, NEW FACILITY

**Chemistry and biochemistry professors Dr. Tricia Carmichael BSc '92, PhD '96, Dr. John Trant, and Dr. Simon Rondeau-Gagné will head up a new Functional Organic Materials Research Centre with grants totaling \$700,000 from the Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI), the Ontario Research Fund, and contributions from industry partners.**

The centre will allow the researchers to expand on their current research into designing and synthesizing new

organic materials to create wearable electronics, stretchable transistors, and highly specified drug delivery methods.

The team and their work will be housed in the Faculty of Science's new research facility and will be divided into two major biomaterials and bioelectronics platforms, and includes such advanced instrumentation as a custom-built peptide synthesizer, an ultra-high-temperature gel permeation chromatography system, and a cutting-edge transistor fabrication station.

## KINESIOLOGY PROFESSOR HONOURED FOR SERVICE TO SPORT HISTORY

**The North American Society for Sport History (NASSH) presented kinesiology professor Vicky Paraschak MHK '78, with an award recognizing her service to its work during its annual convention recently in Winnipeg.**

The society's past president, Kevin Wamsley, said the Canadian Museum for Human Rights made an appropriate setting for the conferral of the award.

"Vicky is an advocate for graduate students and an advocate for political and social rights," said Dr. Wamsley, provost of St. Francis Xavier University. "In all of NASSH history, in my opinion, there has been no greater advocate for marginalized people and no greater advocate for diversity."

Dr. Paraschak said she was honoured to receive the recognition, noting she has promoted inclusion, equity, and diversity throughout her career.

## SCULPTURE HONOURING PIONEERING PUBLISHER TO GRACE WINDSOR HALL

Local artist Donna Mayne BA '82, will create a sculpture to honour Mary Ann Shadd, an African-Canadian/American, anti-slavery activist, journalist, publisher, teacher, and lawyer, for the newly named Windsor Hall – previously known as the Pitt-Ferry Building.

Shadd was the first Black woman to publish and edit a newspaper — *The Provincial Freeman* — in North America and the first woman publisher in Canada. *The Provincial Freeman* was published from March 1853 to September 1857 in Windsor, then in Toronto and after that in Chatham. The newspaper advocated equality, integration, and self-reliance for Black people in Canada and the United States.

She was a role model to many and a powerful advocate to end enslavement. The placement of her sculpture at the former Windsor Star building is intended to remind the campus community of her impact and legacy.

Shadd died in Washington in 1893 and the Canadian government designated her a Person of National Historic Significance in 1994.



## NURSING PROFESSOR SHINES IN LEADERSHIP ROLE

Nursing professor Judy Bornais was recently awarded the “Stanley Cup of higher education” – a 3M National Teaching Fellowship – for her transformative educational leadership, as well as her dedication to the region’s health care system.


Bornais pioneered the Standardized Patient Program and the Simulation Program, which give UWindsor Nursing and Schulich School of Medicine and Dentistry students practical, hands-on patient experiences. She also worked to help establish the UWindsor Peer Collaboration Network where faculty members can share strategies and feedback on teaching practices.

She has accepted a one-year term as UWindsor acting executive director, Experiential Learning, where she and her team will support learning opportunities for students which include paid co-op placements, co-curricular volunteering, and program-integrated opportunities.

## LANCER FOOTBALL TURNS 50

**One hundred years ago, on a cold fall afternoon, you could find young men tossing a pigskin around on the University of Windsor (then Assumption College) campus. But not until half a century later did football become an official varsity sport.**

Legendary coach Gino Fracas helmed the first team, which took the field in 1968. He brought a track record of success to the role. Fracas was a star running back at Assumption College Catholic High School and won two Yates Cup championships at Western University as a running back and linebacker. Fracas was the first overall Canadian Football League pick in 1954 and played for both the Ottawa Rough Riders and the Edmonton Eskimos, where he won two Grey Cups.

Under Fracas, the Lancers won a Central Canadian Intercollegiate Football Conference Canadian championship in 1969, quarterbacked by Andy Parici BA '71, BComm '91. In 1972 Parici threw for 4,606 yards and 34 touchdowns, winning the inaugural Hec Crighton Trophy.

In 1975 Fracas's team captured another championship, riding one of the most dominant defenses in OUA history to a Yates Cup. The '75 defense gave up just 34 points against in seven games, a record that stands today.

Coach Fracas was named Coach of the Year in 1976 and 1977 by the OUA. In 1979 quarterback Scott Mallender BHK '80, BEd '81, earned the second Hec Creighton honour. During his Blue and Gold career, Mallender threw for more than 5,000 yards and still holds the Lancer record for passing yards in a season with 1,821.

In 1986 coach Fracas traded the sidelines of his local university for a lecture hall, leaving the coaching ranks but remaining a Lancer as part of the faculty.

Just two years after his coaching retirement, the CIS named an award in his honour; the Gino Fracas Award presented to an outstanding Volunteer or Coach, in honour of the former player, coach, administrator and University of Windsor professor.

Gerald Hlady BHK '91, BEd '92, made his mark on the Blue and Gold history books by becoming the first Lancer in program history to earn back to back first team all-Canadian honours with his performances at guard in the 1990 and '91 seasons. Hlady is also the first and only three-time winner of Windsor's DeMarco Trophy as top student-athlete.

In 2004, one of the best players to ever don the Blue and Gold arrived on campus. Daryl Stephenson BHK '04, MHK '11, didn't take long to prove he was a star, scoring a touchdown in his first game as part of his 25 carry, 161 yard CIS debut against Queen's.

That season after rushing for 1,192 and leading the CIS in rushing, he won the Norm Marshall Trophy as the OUA's Rookie of the Year. Stephenson was the first player in CIS history to rush for more 1,000 yards in three consecutive seasons (2004-2006). He won

the Hec Crighton Trophy in 2006 and 2008, the first and only CIS player to surpass the 5,000-yard mark. He still holds the CIS career-rushing crown with 5,163 yards.

In 2011 former Lancer wide receiver Joe D'Amore BA '00, returned to the Blue and Gold, this time as a coach. In his first year at the helm, he guided the Lancers to within one win of a Yates Cup appearance. D'Amore also cultivated Lancer standout Austin Kennedy, who sits fourth in OUA history for passing touchdowns in a career with 64.

Today, D'Amore hopes to build up the program with one of the biggest recruiting classes in the OUA. Bringing in a host of receivers and linemen that stand more than six-feet-tall has the Blue and Gold primed to start the next 50 years of Lancers football off right! **■**



# REMEMBERING

## *Sergio Marchionne* BCOMM '79, MBA '83, LLD '05

**Sergio Marchionne BComm '79, MBA '83, LLD '05, the former chief executive officer of Fiat Chrysler, leaves a legacy of business success and support for education, says UWindsor president Douglas Kneale.**

Marchionne died July 25, 2018 at the age of 66.

“We are all deeply saddened by the loss of Dr. Marchionne,” Dr. Kneale said.

“Here at the University of Windsor, we are remembering him as an outstanding graduate, a distinguished supporter and friend of the University, and a great mentor to our students.”

Marchionne was named CEO of Fiat SpA in 2004; the company acquired Chrysler in 2014. He is widely credited with saving both automakers. Ill health prompted his exit from corporate leadership just prior to his passing.

His post-graduate ties to the University of Windsor included the establishment of the International Master’s in Automotive Engineering program, which enabled students to complete concurrent graduate degrees from UWindsor and Politecnico di Torino in Italy, and regular appearances on campus to mentor students.

In a keynote address at the 2016 Georgie-Odette Leadership Symposium, Marchionne credited his studies at the University of Windsor with launching his career: “If there’s a high point in my life, it’s the time I spent here,” Marchionne said at the time.

The message that resonated with many UWindsor students was to “stay humble, keep a clean heart” and “don’t be anything other than what you are.”

Campus flags were flown at half-staff in Marchionne’s memory. **▼**
