Highlights and Skills

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Consecutive Program - Bachelor of Education (BEd) - Our two-year consecutive program is for candidates with an existing degree. It integrates on-campus classes with a minimum of 80 days of classroom observation and teaching and qualifies you to teach in one of three possible divisions of teaching specialization: Primary/Junior (JK to Grade 6), Junior/Intermediate (Grades 4 to 10), or Intermediate/Senior (Grades 7-12). Min Avg: 70% with existing degree

BEd in Technological Studies/Diploma in Education - Technological Studies - This unique program is offered in blended delivery over the course of fourteen months, with practical face-to-face courses being held on campus during July of Summer I and August of Summer II. Depending upon previous university/college education and years of work experience, candidates will receive either a BEd. degree in Technological Studies or a Diploma in Education - Technological Studies. All successful candidates will qualify for certification by the Ontario College of Teachers for teaching Technological Studies in Ontario High Schools. No Direct Entry.

Concurrent Programs (Primary/Junior)

Successful completion of these intensive 5-year programs will earn you two degrees and eligibility to teach at the primary/junior level (JK - Grade 6). The Concurrent Psychology/Education/ECE program is offered in co-operation with St. Clair College and will prepare you to teach at the preschool and primary/junior levels (JK - Grade 6).

Your Coursework



First/Second Year Concurrent Students

- Take required courses for your undergraduate degree plus Teaching and Learning Part I (Concurrent Education course) in Year 1 and Community Service Concurrent Education (Concurrent Education course) in Year 2 (except for Psychology/Concurrent Education/ECE and Music/Concurrent Education)
- Confirm second teachable and begin taking courses in this area in first year (Intermediate/Senior students)
- Meet with an academic advisor from your undergraduate and Concurrent Education degree programs and review degree requirements
- In Year 2, Psychology/Education/ECE Concurrent attend **St. Clair College** to complete the ECE Diploma

Third Year Concurrent Students

- First Full Year of Education! Take required Education courses (except Concurrent Music Education students).
- Explore completing a research project in final year **HIP**
- Research potential international practicum courses (England, China, Tanzania, etc.) **HIP**
- Consider taking **International Educator Certificate (IEC)** to qualify to teach in an **International Baccalaureate Organization** school

Fourth Year Concurrent Students

- First Full Year of Education for Concurrent Music degree plus Teaching and Learning Part II-Concurrent Education (except for Psychology/Concurrent Education/ECE and Music/Concurrent Education)
- Meet with academic advisor early in the year from your undergraduate and Concurrent Education degree programs to make sure you are on the right path
- For those in Intermediate-Senior Concurrent programs, complete courses for second teachable
- Consider declaring a minor and/or specialization

Fifth Year Concurrent Students

- Second and Final Year of Education! Take all required courses to complete your B.Ed. degree
- Apply to graduate through **UWinsite Student Portal**
- Consider a research project and the possibility of applying for funding through **MITACS** **HIP**
- Explore professional development opportunities such as International **Educator Certificate for IB Qualification** or **Additional Qualification** courses through the **Faculty of Education**, or **TESOL** through **Continuing Education**

Plan Ahead For What's Next



- Begin researching local, national, and international teaching opportunities and the requirements for obtaining them
- Meet with a career advisor in **Career Development and Experiential Learning (CDEL)** for help developing a plan for your future years
- Get involved with a part-time job, volunteer opportunity, campus group, or research assistantship
- Attend **CDEL workshops** to learn how to find a summer or part-time job and write a university level resumé

- Research all career fields and occupations with the help of a **CDEL** career advisor
- Explore opportunities and meet potential employers by participating in job fairs and industry networking events
- Create a **LinkedIn** profile and have it critiqued by **CDEL**
- Take part in informational interviews and join online communities like **LinkedIn** and **Ten Thousand Coffees** to connect with people in your targeted profession or industry

- Research career fields and occupations with the help of a **CDEL** career advisor

- Compose a portfolio of relevant academic and work experience, including finalizing your field experience e-portfolio
