PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Nursing - Our program combines equal doses of hands-on learning and academic excellence. Clinical practicum courses start in year one with a 1:8 instructor-student ratio and take place in a variety of healthcare settings throughout the first three years of the program. In fact, the Faculty of Nursing is partnered with more than 250 hospital and community agencies throughout southwestern Ontario. In the final year of their program, students gain independence as they work alongside a preceptor (1:1 ratio), completing a total of 384 hours in both hospital and community settings.

To reinforce student learning in both the classroom and in clinical settings, we have a series of seven experiential learning labs taught throughout the program. These labs are specifically designed to help the learner apply theory to clinical practice through a variety of interactive and simulated activities.

In order to dynamically support student learning, nursing students have access to academic and career advising through the Student Success Coordinator and free counseling services through the Clinical Therapist embedded in the program.

After graduation, students write the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) to be eligible for membership with the College of Nurses of Ontario.

In 2018, 95.8% passed the NCLEX by the end of the year in which they graduated. This is because students receive outstanding instruction from award-winning professors who are dedicated to student success. At an undergraduate level, students are engaged in professional development activities stemming from current research initiatives and best practices in Nursing. The NCLEX is the same exam that American students write. Graduates from the program may choose to pursue employment opportunities in the United States and would not need to write an alternate exam. Other eligibility criteria may be requested and may differ by state.

Ontario Course Requirements

Minimum Average of 70% – A minimum 70% average of the top six Grade 12 U or M courses, including ENG4U. SBI4U, SCH4U, ENG4U, and one Grade 12 mathematics required. A minimum grade of 65% in Grade 12U English (ENG4U) is required. A second minimum average of 70% is required in chemistry (SCH4U) and biology (SBI4U).

This is a very competitive program. An 80% average is recommended for the top six Grade 12 U or M courses along with a minimum average of 80% in chemistry and biology.

Students admitted into the program in 2018 and 2019 had an 85% average or greater for their top 6 U or M courses.

FUNCTIONAL KNOWLEDGE

- Collaborating with patients/clients, families, interdisciplinary health professionals to achieve positive health outcomes
- Decision making; considering information from a variety of sources to solve problems and make decisions

HIGH-IMPACT PRACTICE (HIP) Ⅲ

A HIP is an enriching educational experience that can be life-changing and often includes learning outside of the classroom while encouraging meaningful interaction and collaboration, such as:

- Co-op, internship or field experiences
- Research with faculty
- Culminating senior experience
- Capstone courses
- Service-learning
- Learning communities
- Study abroad

FIRST YEAR

- Take required courses including Professional Nursing I and II, Writing for the Professional Nurse, Human Anatomy & Physiology I and II, and Holistic Health Assessment
- Consider visiting the Nursing Student Support Centre for information about program advising, counselling, and clinical placements
- Meet with the Student Success Coordinator for program advising and information about individualized academic support services
- Visit the **Clinical Learning Centre** to meet peer mentors and spend time practicing health assessment skills

MIDDLE YEARS

- Take required and option courses as outlined on the BScN Collaborative Nursing Course Sequence Guide
- Meet with the Student Success Coordinator for program advising, to review degree requirements, and information about individualized academic support services
- Gain an abundance of field experience through clinical courses
- Begin thinking about your future nursing career including graduate school options
- Ask about opportunities to work with a faculty member on a research project or publication HIP

FINAL YEAR

- Complete all required courses to fulfill degree requirements including "Transition to Professional Practice" as a capstone theory course, which highlights the transition from student to professional IIIP
- Meet with the **Student Success Coordinator** for program advising, to review degree requirements, and information about individualized academic support services
- Ask about opportunities to work with a faculty member on a research project or publication
- Apply to graduate through **UWinsite Student Portal**
- Begin studying for National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX)
- Explore professional development opportunities through Continuing Education
