### Dr. Emily Regan Wills

Dr. Emily Regan Wills is an associate professor of comparative politics at the University of Ottawa. She is the co-director of the Community Mobilization in Crisis project, which develops and implements innovative multilingual digital pedagogical tools for teaching community mobilization skills in the Middle East and elsewhere.



### Shannon Labelle

Shannon Labelle is a researcher in psychotherapy, inclusion, and pedagogies, and coined the title of this presentation, "Blue Sky University". At the Centre of Excellence for Child and Youth Mental Health, she's facilitated trainings on engagement and inclusion practices.
