

Graduate student pathway to completing Winter 2020

Graduate Students Start Here

For each course,
**after you receive your
final grade but before
11:59 p.m. May 13, 2020,**
you can:

Accept the final course
grade assigned by your
professor *

This is the grade that will
appear on your
transcript *

Voluntarily withdraw from the course
without academic penalty

If you fail a course, you can voluntarily
withdraw after you've seen the grade.
This will be marked as VW COVID on
transcripts (VWC). The course will not
count in your GPA nor will it count
towards your degree requirements.

If the course is a prerequisite to
something else, you will not be able to
take the next course until you pass the
course.

Request a Pass/Non-Pass
grade (P/NP) based on a
minimum 70% grade

If the course you take a "P"
in is a pre-requisite to
another course, you can take
the other course.

** If you are repeating a
course and take a "P" the
original grade will continue to
be part of your cumulative
grade point average

You can choose to only
keep the grades that
improve your GPA, and
take a "P" on anything
else, so these courses
don't impact your GPA.**

Important Information

It may be helpful to calculate your
cumulative average to help decide your
path.

You may wish to see all your grades
before formally selecting VWC or P/NP
options.

Changes to P/NP or VWC during the grade
revision period will be irreversible.

* Students may choose to keep a grade
less than 70% if their program allows credit
to be given for grades between 60-69%.
Credit would be granted through the
normal Academic Standing process, in
consultation with the program.

During a course, students always have the right to request an
academic accommodation from their professor based on medical or
compassionate grounds, such as, bereavement, serious mental or
physical health circumstances, or unanticipated extenuating
circumstances beyond their control. These factors can be taken into
consideration "taking into account the severity of the illness,
bereavement, or other extenuating circumstance" on an individual
basis.
