
Dr. Ken CramerDepartment of Psychology






Dr. Siyaram Pandey Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry

- Winners receive \$20,000 over two years to encourage excellence in the classroom setting








Professor Donna-Marie Eansor Faculty of Law






Dr. Richard FrostSchool of Computer Science




Ontario Confederation of University Faculty Associations (OCUFA) Award
