Intermediate/Senior candidates choose 2 teaching subjects. You must have at least 10 semester undergraduate courses (30 semester hours) in the first teaching subject and 6 semester undergraduate courses (18 semester hours) in the second teaching subject, except for French and Music, which require additional courses.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the 2nd-year level or above. Teaching subject courses must be completed by the end of **April 202x**.

Business Studies – General

Teaching Subject Requirements

As a first teaching subject, 10 semester undergraduate core business courses are required. Two undergraduate courses in economics can count toward a first teaching subject only.

As a second teaching subject, 6 semester undergraduate core business courses are required.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

Recommended Courses to Meet Requirements

It is recommended that students pursuing a first or second teachable in Business Studies – General choose courses from the following list:

Under no circumstances will non-Business students be allowed to complete more than nine (9) Business courses. Non-Business students may still pursue Business as a first teachable subject. To meet the teachable requirements, students must complete ECON-1100, ECON-1110, and an additional eight (8) Business courses as part of their undergraduate degree.

Dramatic Arts

Teaching Subject Requirements

You must have at least 10 semester undergraduate courses in the first teaching subject and 6 semester undergraduate courses in the second teaching subject.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

Acceptable undergraduate courses are those offered through a drama or theatre arts department.

A maximum of 2 undergraduate semester courses in theory or history of theatre, drama or dramatic literature is allowed.

English

Teaching Subject Requirements

You must have at least 10 semester undergraduate courses in the first teaching subject and 6 semester undergraduate courses in the second teaching subject.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

A minimum of 2 undergraduate semester courses in English literature or poetry is required.

The remaining required courses can be a combination of literature, poetry and writing.

French as a Second Language

Teaching Subject Requirements

As your first or second teaching subject, 10 undergraduate semester courses in French are required. These courses must be taught by a French department and not just be courses taught in French to qualify. You must possess oral and written fluency in the French language and a thorough knowledge of grammar.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

Recommended Courses to Meet Requirements

It is recommended that students pursuing a first or second teachable in French as a Second Language take the following courses:

Geography

Teaching Subject Requirements

You must have at least 10 semester undergraduate courses in the first teaching subject and 6 semester undergraduate courses in the second teaching subject.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

You must have at least 1 semester course in Geo-Informatics (GIS) and courses in all 3 of the following recommended areas:

- Physical geography (geomorphology, biogeography, climatology),
- Human or economic geography and
- Canadian geography (geography or social science course covering global issues, such as tourism, development, environment or poverty).

Recommended Courses to Meet Requirements

To have Geography as a first teachable subject, your ten courses should include:

- two physical geography courses
- two human/economic geography courses
- one Canadian geography course
- two GIS (Geo-Informatics) courses
- two courses on global issues (e.g. tourism, environment, development, poverty)
- one course on resource management

To have Geography as a second teachable subject, your six courses should include:

- one physical geography course
- one human/economic geography course
- one Canadian geography course
- one GIS (Geo-Informatics) course

Health and Physical Education

Teaching Subject Requirements

You must have at least 10 semester undergraduate courses in the first teaching subject and 6 semester undergraduate courses in the second teaching subject.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

You must have courses offered through Kinesiology or Physical Education. Two semester courses in health studies are allowed.

Recommended Courses to Meet Requirements

To complete this teachable, students need to complete courses within Kinesiology and Health Studies, therefore, having a grade 12 U science background would be beneficial. Sport Management & Leadership courses will not fulfil the course requirements for the Health & Physical Education teachable.

Media Arts

Teaching Subject Requirements

As a first teachable subject, 10 semester undergraduate core courses in Communications, Media and Film are required. You may count 2 undergraduate courses in Visual Arts.

As a second teachable subject, 6 semester undergraduate core courses in Communication, Media and Film are required.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

Music – Vocal or Instrumental

Teaching Subject Requirements

As a first teaching subject, 10 undergraduate semester courses are required, with courses in music history and music theory (at least 4 courses in each), 1 course in conducting and 1 course in applied study (Major Instrument/Voice).

We recommend instrumental applicants have at least 2 semesters of study in woodwinds, brass, percussion, string or guitar techniques and to vocal applicants who have at least 1 semester of study in vocal techniques.

As a second teaching subject, 8 undergraduate semester courses are required, with at least 2 courses in each of music history and music theory, 1 course in conducting and 1 course in an applied area (Major Instrument/Voice).

We recommend instrumental applicants have at least 1 semester of study in woodwinds, brass, percussion, string or guitar techniques and to vocal applicants who have at least 1 semester of study in vocal techniques.

We advise you that, as the focus of the music programs of the 2 local school boards is on instrumental music, at least 1 placement will be in instrumental music.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

For a first teaching subject, 10 semester undergraduate courses across biology, chemistry and physics are required, with at least 2 courses in each of the following areas: Biology, chemistry and physics. At least 2 of these courses must include a lab component.

For a second teaching subject, 2 core semester courses are required from each of the following areas: Biology, chemistry and physics. At least 2 of these courses must include a lab component.

At least 2 of these courses must be at the second-year level or above.

Teaching Subject Requirements
