Triaging Your "To Do" List

If you are anything like me, you have a lengthy "To Do" list. I live by my "To Do" List. It keeps me focused on what I need to get through in a given day. On a good day, my list gets down to a page. When things get really bad, my list goes up to two pages long. On those bad days, it is hard to even find items on the list as I work through them and want to cross them off. Keeping a "To

Do" list manageable is crucial to being organized and efficient with your time.

The article <u>"Ask Four Questions to Ruthlessly Prioritize Your 'To Do' List"</u> has some simple suggestions for keeping your "To Do" list a manageable length.

- 1. Decide if the task is even worth doing. At the begining of each week I review my list and eliminate items that are no longer relevant.
- 2. Look for ways to automate tasks. It may take some time to automate some of your repetitive, routine tasks, but that time is well-spent once the automation kicks in.
- 3. Identify tasks you can delegate. Sometimes it is better to pay someone to free up some of your time, so that you can then be more productive on tasks that have a significant impact on your school.
- 4. Put tasks off until later. I have a system of identifying urgent tasks that I need to do right away, and those that are important but not urgent. I review the degree of urgency at the beginning of each week and shift tasks around if necessary.

This month's new video is: <u>Teaching Critical Reading Skills</u>.

Higher level language students, particularly those looking to move into higher education studies at an English-speaking university or college, need to learn to read critically, evaluating the quality of the content that they are reading. Reading critically means not just understanding the words on the page but also being able to 'read between the lines' for other layers of meaning

presented by the author. In this video, we look at some of the most important critical reading skills that our students need to learn, including: using context clues; identifying and differentiating among inference, fact and opinion; identifying the main idea; pronoun referencing; and identifying the author's purpose.
