

F26 Placement Profiles:

Windsor Law's Externship Program has a variety of placements in different areas of law and workplace contexts each term. Some placements are consistently available while others vary from term to term. Below is a brief description of placements available in the Fall 2026 academic term. Students should research the placements further, as most have websites and other publicly available information. If any security or police clearances are required, this will be listed in the placement profile. Students are expected to have their own laptop for most placements.

Students must ensure they are available the entire term, including for an orientation session the first week of classes.

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F26 PLACEMENT PROFILES:

1. Aamjiwnaang First Nation, Bill C-92, Legal Aid Ontario & Walpole Island Placement

Number of Placements: 2

Description: As part of this placement, students will work with the supervising lawyer on any of the following projects: working with a lawyer with Aamjiwnaang First Nation placement, supporting an initiative related to Bill C-92, and/or observing work at the Indigenous Peoples Court (Walpole Island/Bkejwanong). This placement offers a valuable opportunity to apply a decolonial lens to legal research and practice while building respectful relationships and learning directly from the experiences and priorities of Indigenous Peoples. Selection of work will be negotiated directly with the supervisor.

One student will be placed at Walpole Island and one at Aamjiwnaang.

Duties: Depending on the interest of the student.

Hours: This placement is either remote, in person, or hybrid, depending on the interest and needs of the student. Regular office hours are 9:00 am – 5:00pm.

2. Advocacy Centre for Tenants Ontario (ACTO)

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: Hybrid or remote. Students will primarily work during Office Hours 9am- 5pm.

Description: ACTO is a community legal clinic funded by Legal Aid Ontario with a province-wide mandate to assist low-income Ontarians with their housing issues through legal advice and representation, law reform, community organizing, and education and training. ACTO also runs the Tenant Duty Counsel Program across Ontario which provides legal information and assistance to self-represented tenants appearing at the Landlord and Tenant Board. ACTO works closely with the other legal clinics across Ontario, particularly in providing tenant duty counsel services.

Duties: As a student working with ACTO, you will be expected to demonstrate strong legal research and high-quality legal writing skills, along with a collaborative, team-based approach. You should have a genuine interest in social justice and advancing systemic change. Under the guidance of ACTO’s team of lawyers and professionals in community development, research, and communications, you will contribute to advocacy and legal research projects that support ACTO’s strategic litigation and intervention work in

appellate courts, legislative forums, and broader community settings. Unlike general legal clinics that focus on tribunal-level advocacy, ACTO operates as a litigation boutique with a primary emphasis on appellate work and public interest interventions.

3. Amy Osman Law Office

Number of placements: 2

Description: This placement is with a law firm based in Windsor, ON. The firm provides legal services in immigration and criminal law. Other practice areas include: Notary & Commissioning, Ticket Offences, and Consent & Capacity Board. Preference will be given to students who have taken or are currently enrolled in Criminal Law and Procedure, Immigration and Refugee Law, and/or Advanced Legal Research.

Duties: Drafting case briefs and summarizing disclosure, Courtroom observation and proceedings, Legal Research and drafting, Case file management, client and witness interaction.

Hours: Students will primarily complete work during typical office hours in person (8:30am – 4:30pm).

4. Bobby Russon Criminal Law Office

Number of Placements: 2

Description: This placement is ideal for students with a sincere interest in criminal law—whether you're a top-performing student with a clear career path or simply curious to explore what working in criminal defence is really like. We welcome students who are committed to learning, regardless of whether they've already decided on a future in criminal law or are just testing the waters.

Students will have the opportunity to observe and assist with real criminal files, attend court, conduct legal research, and engage in meaningful discussions about trial strategy and client advocacy. Preferred coursework includes Evidence, Criminal Law, Criminal Procedure, Criminal Trial Advocacy, Sentencing, and participation in the Community Legal Aid (CLA), but these are not mandatory. What matters most is a genuine willingness to learn and engage with the realities of criminal practice.

Duties: As a student in this placement, you will assist with legal research and case preparation, observe court proceedings, attend client meetings, and help draft legal documents and case summaries. You'll also participate in discussions around trial strategy and gain insight into the day-to-day realities of criminal defence work through direct mentorship and hands-on experience.

Hours: In person Placement, Office Hours 8:30am – 4:30pm.

5. Canadian Centre for Housing Rights (CCHR)

Number of Placements: 3

Hours: Regular office hours, virtual.

Description: This externship has two streams.

Stream One will focus on supporting our client services work. This will involve a) receiving calls from tenants with housing law concerns, b) researching callers' issues and providing them with accurate and timely legal information, c) working with the rest of the team to ensure callers are internally referred appropriately and d) providing research support to our lawyers.

Stream Two will focus on supporting our policy and law reform work. On law reform, this will involve a) conducting legal and policy research, b) exercising legal analysis through the drafting of briefing notes, legal memos, research papers and/or pleadings, c) providing other assistance with the development and execution of CCHR's litigation strategy. On policy, this will involve a) policy research, b) assistance with position papers, and c) assisting with communications.

Students should indicate their preference of which stream they will be placed with; however, it is possible that a student is placed in a stream that is not their first choice.

6. Centre for Cities/ Municipality of Lakeshore

Number of Placements: 1-2

Hours: Office hours. The position is hybrid, requiring some in person and some remote work.

Description: The Centre for Cities at Windsor Law supports collaborative research, teaching and public engagement on pressing legal and policy issues for municipalities. Students in this placement will work in a dynamic, multidisciplinary team specifically in the context of C4C's partnership with the Municipality of Lakeshore. Students will be involved with a range of work including community consultations and public engagement, research, bylaw and policy research and development, report drafting, and presentations.

7. City of Windsor

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: The externship student will primarily complete work during office hours (8:30 am – 4:30 pm). This position is in person.

Description: The externship student will be placed in the Legal & Real Estate Services Department of The Corporation of the City of Windsor. The externship student will be exposed to a range of legal matters, depending upon the issues that arise and the student's interests.

Duties: The externship student will engage in a variety of possible tasks including: conducting research on a variety of legal issues, assisting with contract review and/or attending examinations for discovery and mediations.

8. DSJ Professional Corporation

Number of Placements: 4

Hours: Remote, Hybrid

Description: D.S. Jones Law Professional Corporation is a respected Ontario-based criminal defence firm dedicated to providing skilled and client-focused legal representation. This placement offers law students valuable hands-on experience in criminal defence practice, with opportunities to engage in meaningful legal work and observe the justice system in action.

Duties: Students will assist with legal research, drafting, and file organization, and may have the chance to observe client meetings and court proceedings. Duties may also include summarizing disclosure, preparing case briefs, and supporting trial preparation. This placement is well-suited to students with an interest in criminal law, whether they are exploring the field or committed to pursuing a career in it. Strong attention to detail, discretion, and a willingness to learn are essential.

9. The HIV Legal Network (formerly the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network)

Number of Placements: 1

Description: The HIV Legal Network (formerly the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network) promotes the human rights of people living with, at risk of or affected by HIV or AIDS, in Canada and internationally, through research and analysis, litigation and other advocacy, public education and community mobilization. The HIV Legal Network produces research and resources used to support the work of front-line AIDS service organizations, researchers and community activists from across Canada and around the world. The HIV Legal Network engages decision-makers, from parliamentarians and judges to United Nations delegates on the importance of human rights in the fight against HIV and AIDS. The clinic defends and advances human rights through strategic litigation in the courts, in Canada and internationally.

Duties: The student will do constitutional law research in support of sex workers' and drug users' rights, comparative law research on LGBTQ+ rights in the Caribbean, and legal research on caselaw relevant to cases of HIV non-disclosure. In addition, the student will do legal research in support of the Legal Network's court interventions, assist with drafting of legal submissions and observe court hearings and depositions.

Hours: Remote Placements, Office Hours: 9:00am – 5:00pm.

10. Industrial Accident Victims' Group of Ontario (IAVGO) Community Legal Clinic

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: Students will primarily complete work during typical office hours (8:30am – 4:30pm). This position is primarily remote.

Description: IAVGO is a not for profit community legal clinic providing free legal services to injured workers in Ontario since 1975. IAVGO is funded by Legal Aid Ontario. IAVGO also operates “Advocates for Injured Workers” which is a student legal aid clinic. IAVGO provides individual legal representation and summary legal advice as well as public legal education, community development and law reform. Duties: IAVGO is willing to adapt students' assignments to their interests. Students are asked to describe their areas of interest in their cover letter.

11. Johnson Miller Family Lawyers

Number of Placements:1

Hours: This role is in person. Our office is open 9 am – 5 pm, although the actual hours for the student will vary depending on their schedule.

Description: Johnson Miller is a Windsor-based firm dedicated exclusively to family law, offering personalized legal services in areas such as divorce, separation, child custody, support, and property division. With over 25 years of experience, the firm is known for its compassionate approach and commitment to guiding clients through complex family matters with clarity and integrity. As a student in this placement, you will gain hands-on experience in family law practice.

Duties: The duties will include shadowing counsel in various in-office and court appearances and may also include small research projects.

12. John Howard Society

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: This is a remote placement.

Description: John Howard Society of Ontario (JHSO) is a provincial non-profit organization dedicated to research, advocacy and education in the criminal justice space. Our Centre of Research & Policy connects direct service experience with innovative analysis to translate research into action. By collaborating closely with the 19 JHS local offices in the province, the Centre's team of analysts and researchers develops policy positions that truly reflect the needs of each community, advances those positions to governments and other organizations, educates the public on the critical issues, and evaluates program efficacy to guide future work. Through it all, we're committed to ensuring that innovative ideas can translate into real action.

Duties: Students will work primarily with the Director of Policy and Policy Analyst but may also engage in research and/or public education activities depending on Centre priorities and student interests. Work with the Centre may include reviewing and preparing briefs of criminal and social justice legislation, assisting with the development of factsheets, submissions and other policy documentation and participating and contributing to policy and research projects of the JHSO, as required. Public education activities may include conceptualizing, developing and designing public legal education content (see public education section on our website for examples). Students may work on issues/topics including bail and remand, homelessness, drug toxicity and the experiences of people as they move through the policing, courts and correctional systems.

13. Julie Santarossa/Ben Strickland Law Office

Number of Placements: 1

Description: This shared placement with the law offices of Julie Santarossa and Ben Strickland offers law students a valuable opportunity to gain practical experience in criminal defence. The placement is ideal for students with a strong interest in criminal law and a desire to develop their skills in case law analysis, legal writing, and professional client interaction. Working with two experienced practitioners, students will gain insight into the realities of defence work and the criminal justice system in a supportive and hands-on environment.

Duties: Students will engage in a range of assignments, including legal research and memo writing, attending court to observe proceedings, and participating in client and surety interviews.

Hours: In Person Placement, Office Hours: 9:00am – 5:00pm.

14. Justice for Children & Youth (JFCY)

Description: Justice for Children and Youth is a legal aid clinic that provides specialized legal services to youth under 18 and unstably housed youth under 25. We protect the rights of those facing barriers in the justice, education, and social service systems. Our work is rooted in the belief that young people deserve a voice, dignity, and expert representation. We seek a student who is interested in social justice and its intersection with children's law.

Duties: The student will be expected to assist with legal research and drafting legal documents and plain-language resources. Depending on the student's skills, experience, and the nature of the placement (in-person vs. remote), there may be opportunities for intake support, shadowing and attending court or tribunal hearings.

Office hours: 9am - 5pm. Hybrid (exact configuration to be determined based on student's capacity)

15. Lavigne Law

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: This placement will be mainly in person with some opportunity for hybrid work if needed. Office Hours: 9:00am – 4:30pm.

Description: Located in Chatham, Ontario, Lavigne Law is a family law firm dedicated to providing compassionate and effective legal representation in matters such as divorce, separation, child decision making responsibility and parenting time, support, child protection, and representation of child clients through the Office of the Children's Lawyer. This placement offers law students an opportunity to gain hands-on experience in family law practice.

Duties: Students will assist with legal research, drafting documents, and organizing case files. They may also observe court proceedings and client meetings, providing insight into the family justice process.

This placement is ideal for students with a strong interest in family law and a desire to develop practical skills in a supportive and client-centered environment.

Hours: This placement will be a combination of in person and hybrid work. Office Hours: 9:00am – 4:30pm.

16. Legal Aid Ontario – Family Division (Windsor)

Number of Placements: 1

Placement Description: Legal Aid Ontario - Windsor Family Law Service Centre provides services in family court including: helping unrepresented clients draft applications, affidavits, and motions; preparing lists of cases, summaries of cases, and case books that could be accessed by duty counsel; observing courtroom presentations; and assisting with client meetings.

The Family Senior Counsel Program provides certificate based legal services aimed to improve access to justice for some of our most vulnerable family law and child protection clients, including those who are experiencing intimate partner violence, mental health challenges, and members of equity seeking groups. Our lawyers accept legal aid certificates and provide full representation to clients, from first appearance court up to and including trial representation. In addition to direct client advocacy, the Family Senior Counsel Program also plays a key role in mentorship and legal education, providing training opportunities for staff lawyers, students, and private counsel to cultivate professional judgment and skill.

Duties: Attending/assisting at client meetings, Court, advice clinics and mediation with the Staff Lawyers as well as assisting with client triage, research, document preparation and other administrative duties.

Hours/in-person/hybrid/remote: Up to 5 days a week in person at the Windsor Family Law Service Centre located at 443 Ouellette Avenue

17. Legal Aid Ontario – Indigenous Services Division

Description: Up to two students will be placed under supervision of lawyers Rebecca Hammond and Jamie Holmes to work in a social justice context on issues impacting Indigenous peoples in Ontario. ISD is a dedicated department of Legal Aid Ontario dedicated to delivering culturally safe legal services and addressing overrepresentation of Indigenous peoples particularly in criminal courts and child welfare proceedings. ISD provides close and supportive supervision in a collaborative workplace environment.

Duties: Students will be working primarily on issues related to An Act respecting First Nations, Metis and Inuit children, youth and families (SC 2019, c. 24). Students will conduct research, complete work on an ongoing caselaw database, prepare public legal education materials, meet with project partners, and prepare online educational materials.

Other: This position will primarily remote, with the possibility of attending in person at the ISD, LAO office, or at other community meetings. Students will generally complete hours between 9:00 am - 5:00 pm.

18. Ministry of the Attorney General – Windsor Crown Attorney’s Office

Number of Placements: 1 student

Hours: In person between the hours of 9-5.

Description: The Crown Attorney system is responsible for prosecuting the vast majority of Ontario's criminal cases. Organized on a local basis, each office is supervised by a Crown Attorney and staffed by Assistant Crown Attorneys. In becoming a proficient prosecutor, an Assistant Crown Attorney must master all aspects of trial practice including such matters as case preparation, witness examination and cross-examination, the use of forensic evidence, legal argument, and the art of addressing the jury.

Apart from trial work, Assistant Crown Attorneys may provide a range of related services. They give legal advice to police during the course of investigations; they assist police in obtaining search warrants; they review police briefs and conduct 'charge screening' (by which they endeavour to eliminate charges where there is no reasonable prospect of conviction); and they try to facilitate reasonable resolutions of cases prior to trial whenever possible.

Duties: The student will observe court proceedings and shadow Assistant Crown Attorneys engaged in their daily assignments.

19. Muslim Legal Support Centre

Number of Placements: Number of Placements: 1

Description: The Muslim Legal Support Centre (MLSC) is an innovative organization that aims to ensure Muslims have equitable access to legal services and fair treatment within the legal system. The MLSC works to increase access to justice for Muslims in Ontario by providing legal information and education, referrals and summary legal advice, and by addressing systemic injustice.

Discrimination against Muslims in Ontario is on the rise and the intersecting impacts of poverty, racialization, discrimination and Islamophobia make this diverse population distinctly vulnerable.

The MLSC was created to cater to the day-to-day needs of low to middle income Muslims and increase their access to justice. Since its inception, the MLSC has served hundreds of Muslims through its legal education sessions, pop-up clinics and legal services.

The MLSC is responsive, community-based and collaborative. We embrace Muslim communities as a group of diverse people with many common interests. We focus our work on the legal needs of Ontarians who self-identify as Muslim or are perceived as Muslim.

Duties: Students will be exposed to multiple areas of law that disproportionately impact Muslims with limited means including immigration, social benefits, and family. The student's primary competencies and responsibilities include: understanding of access to justice needs of racialized communities, ability to locate local legal and social service and supports available for racialized communities, updating case status and client data. Under the supervision of lawyers, the law student may provide: client intake, contribute to the development and management of MLSC interventions and case work, clerical and research support for our staff lawyer, soliciting feedback from clients, providing referrals to relevant service providers, speaking with clients and managing phone line, attending check-in meetings with staff, exploring areas for improvement for intake process, other duties assigned from time to time.

Hours: The student is expected to work regular business hours. The MLSC has no permanent office space. This is a remote role.

20. Office of Daniel Scott (Criminal Defense)

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: Regular office hours, in person.

Description: Strictly criminal defense work. Students need to demonstrate genuine interest in criminal law.

Duties: Students will support defense counsel on active files and learn the day to day of criminal practice. Work will include file management, research and drafting, client communication under supervision, and observational learning at court. Students will have the opportunity to observe multiple criminal lawyers during this placement.

21. Paul Gosio Law Office

Number of Placements: 1-2

Description: Founded in 2007, our firm is a full-service law practice dedicated to delivering strategic, client-focused legal solutions across a range of practice areas. We have

developed particular strength in criminal law, civil litigation, and immigration matters, offering comprehensive representation that reflects both legal excellence and a deep understanding of our clients' circumstances.

A defining aspect of our work is our commitment to serving newcomers to Canada, particularly individuals and families from Latin and South America. We recognize that navigating a new legal system can be complex and often overwhelming, especially when compounded by language, cultural, and systemic barriers. Our firm strives to bridge these gaps by providing accessible, culturally informed, and compassionate legal services.

For law students, our practice offers exposure to dynamic and meaningful work at the intersection of advocacy and community service. Duties: Student will be exposed to Court Appearances; File Review; Draft Court Documents; Client Meetings;

Hours: In-Person/Hybrid and/or Remote. Hours 9-4 (Flexible)

22. Public Health Ontario

Number of Placements: 1

Description: The extern will support Legal Services with a broad range of in-house public-sector legal work. The placement will involve privacy and access to information matters, including requests under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA), the extern will also be exposed to other core areas of public-sector legal practice.

Under the supervision of PHO Legal Counsel, the extern may assist with:

- Supporting the processing of FIPPA access requests, including reviewing records, assisting with responsiveness assessments, and supporting the application of statutory exemptions
- Conducting legal research and drafting memoranda on privacy, public health law, administrative law, and governance issues

- Assisting with policy review and drafting, including internal policies, procedures, and guidance documents
- Supporting complex procurements and contracts, including reviewing procurement documents, agreements, and related legal risk considerations
- Assisting with matters related to conflict of interest, ethics, and compliance
- Supporting general counsel functions within a public-sector organization, including legal risk analysis, briefing materials, and internal advisory work
- Observing and participating in internal meetings to gain exposure to the role of in-house counsel in a public health agency

Duties: The extern will assist Legal Services with a range of in-house public-sector legal duties, including supporting privacy and access to information matters under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA), legal research and drafting, policy review and development, and legal analysis related to public health operations. Duties may also include assisting with complex procurements and contracts, supporting conflict of interest and ethics matters, and contributing to general counsel functions such as legal risk assessment, governance support, and internal advisory work. All work will be performed under the supervision of Legal Counsel.

Hours: This placement is remote. Regular office hours are 9:00 am – 5:00pm.

23. Toronto Community Bikeways Coalition

Number of Placements: 2

Hours: Remote Placement, Office Hours 8:30am – 4:30pm.

Description: Toronto Community Bikeways Coalition (TCBC) is a non for profit corporation dedicated to transforming Toronto’s transportation priorities by championing active, sustainable, and people-focused infrastructure. We advocate for the reallocation of public road space away from motor traffic toward cleaner, more equitable modes of transportation such as cycling, transit, and walking.

A passion for active transportation and a belief in creating vibrant, people-friendly cities are key. Whether you're a cyclist or just believe in better streets, this is a chance to use your legal and advocacy skills to make a tangible impact in Toronto communities.

Duties: As a student in this placement, you will support TCBC’s work across our three core pillars: strategic advocacy, community partnership, and government transparency. Duties may include legal and policy research, assisting with public education materials, helping draft submissions or correspondence to government bodies, and supporting community engagement initiatives. There may also be opportunities to contribute to campaigns

promoting cycling equity, road safety, and climate-conscious urban design. This placement is ideal for students with an interest in municipal law, transportation policy, environmental justice, or public interest advocacy.

24. Town of Essex

Number of Placements: 1 student placement

Hours: In person – Mon-Fri; 8:30 am – 4:30 pm (Flexible within those hours)

Description: Legal and Legislative Services carries out a variety of duties for The Corporation of the Town of Essex, as defined by the Municipal Act and as directed by Council. As a representative of the Office of the Registrar General, the division processes and issues marriage licences and death registrations on behalf of the Province of Ontario. Lottery licence applications are also processed through this office. The Municipal Clerk is also responsible for the administration and conduct of the Municipal Elections, in accordance with the Municipal Elections Act, and various duties performed in accordance with the Drainage Act.

The Legislative Services function provides secretariat services to Council and its committees and boards, including the preparation of Council meeting agendas, recording of minutes, distribution of communications resulting from Council proceedings, and the management of municipal by-laws. The Legislative Services function also manages the safekeeping of corporate records and is responsible for municipal licensing, municipal elections, and Freedom of Information requests.

The Legal Services function provides legal advice and support to Town Council, the Chief Administrative Officer, and departments on Town-related matters. This also includes coordinating representation before the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT), and the Provincial and Superior Courts. The Legal Services function also coordinates corporate insurance and risk management. As well, the Legal Services function oversees our By-Law Enforcement division, providing guidance and legal support.

Duties: Our extern student primarily conducts legal research to support our Legal and Legislative functions.

25. University of Windsor Legal Services

Number of Placements: 1

Description: The Department of Legal Services provides legal advice to the President, administration, faculty, and staff on legal matters involving or affecting the University of Windsor. This Office provides legal assistance to University Vice Presidents in the formulation of administrative policies, as well as legal advice to all Deans, Directors and Department Heads, as needed.

The Office engages in risk and opportunity management and preventative counseling, including the identification of high-risk activities and enterprises conducted by the University and the articulation of methodologies or strategies for coping with the risks.

** Please note that we welcome applications from Indigenous students interested in participating in a specialized project centered around repatriation.

Type of Police Clearance required: Criminal Records check.

Duties: Legal research, memo drafting, special project support, creating and presenting presentations to managerial and professional staff.

Hours: Students will primarily complete work during typical office hours (8:30 am – 4:30 pm). This is a hybrid placement.

26. Weisman Wolfe LLP

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: Office hours. To get the most out of this placements, students should plan to attend in-person (i.e. attending client meetings, court appearances, observing how a traditional law office functions, etc.)

Description: Wiesman Wolfe is a full-service law firm in Windsor, Ontario, providing clients with comprehensive legal support in the areas of family law, civil litigation, employment law, real estate, wills and estates, and corporate and commercial matters.

Duties: The student would assist Morgan Nasr, primarily with family law practice. Morgan practices exclusively civil family law (no child protection), and she also acts as an agent for the Director of the Family Responsibility Office and the Office of the Children's Lawyer. The student would shadow her practice on the days they are in office, sitting in on client meetings and observing motions, conferences, and mediations. In order to get a full understanding of family law practice, the student will also assist in drafting straight forward court materials such as confirmation forms and 14B Motion Forms with the assistance of counsel and precedents. The student may also assist in drafting correspondence to clients and preparing research memoranda on various legal issues.

Morgan is always open to debriefing with the student after each assignment to answer any questions they may have and discuss the nuances of family law.

27. Windsor-Essex Bilingual Legal Clinic

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: Work hours M-F 9 AM – 4:30 PM. This is an in-person placement.

Description: Windsor-Essex Bilingual Legal Clinic provides bilingual legal services to members of the Windsor-Essex Community. Services are provided in the following areas of law: social benefits, housing, employment, CPP, human rights, and Small Claims. The clinic also engages in law reform and public legal education. Services are provided at no cost to people with low incomes.

Duties: Students will engage in a range of duties including research, interviewing clients, writing submissions, observing and/or conducting hearings under close supervision, as appropriate. **French speaking students are preferred but not required. English speaking students may also apply. Please indicate if you speak languages other than English and French.**

28. Windsor Regional Hospital

Number of Placements: 1

Hours: Students will primarily complete work during typical office hours (8:30am – 4:30pm). May be required to attend meetings outside these hours (e.g. 7 am or 5 pm). The placement is a hybrid model – virtual and in person.

Description: WRH is one of the largest community hospitals in the Province of Ontario. It is the regional provider of advanced care in areas that include complex trauma, renal dialysis, cardiac care, stroke and neurosurgery, intensive care, acute mental health, family birthing centre, neonatal intensive care, paediatric services, regional cancer services, and a broad range of medical and surgical services required to support these specialised areas for more than 400,000 people in Windsor and Essex County.

Duties: Student will be exposed to a wide range of legal areas, and others related to the provision of services in a hospital setting. Students work under the supervision of in-house lawyers at WRH.

29. Taxpayer Law

Number of Placements: 1- 2

Description: Students will gain exposure to tax dispute resolution matters involving CRA audits, reassessments, objections, appeals, collections, voluntary disclosures, and Tax Court proceedings. The placement offers experience in client communication, legal research, document review, drafting submissions, and observing strategic advocacy in complex tax matters

Duties: Students will be completing primarily research and writing tasks related to clients in the area of tax law. No previous experience required. The placement is open to upper years. Students will be paired with a primary mentor but will also work with other lawyers in the office. Students use their own laptop, but are provided with all software. Taxpayer Law has a structured onboarding process for placement students.

Hours of operation: Office hours, remote only.
