

## A MESSAGE FROM THE BENEFITS PLAN ADMINISTRATOR

I'd like to welcome all part-time and mature undergraduate students to the University of Windsor. As the Benefits Plan Administrator, I administer the benefits plan to ensure the health and dental needs of students are addressed efficiently. I also oversee duties in the Student Centre as the facilities administrator. The Student Centre is jointly managed by the Policy Management Board (PMB) which consists of OPUS, UWSA and the University.

The insurance provider is Green Shield Canada along with the National Student Health Network through the membership with the Canadian Federation of Students. The insurance coverage is based on a pay



direct system where students are not required to pay up-front and wait to get reimbursed later. Students can add dependents (spouse or children) to their benefits coverage for an additional fee.

The OPUS benefits plan is an affordable and accessible insurance plan that includes drug prescription, dental, vision, emergency travel, mental health and more. As a non-profit student association, our goal is to have enough to pay the insurance premiums, cover our administrative expenses and ensure that we can keep providing this vital service and enhance whenever possible for our students. Prescription drug coverage co-pay is 20% up to \$1,500 maximum per benefit year. If purchased through PocketPills, the co-pay is only 10%.

We understand the importance of accessing health care and continue to provide our members with this vital service which includes PocketPills, Inkblot and Tranquility. PocketPills is an online pharmacy that allows you to order and refill your prescription medications and vitamins from the convenience of getting them online using a mobile app. Inkblot and Tranquility are mental health services that are cognitive based and effectively provide students with support and treatment. Additional discounts and savings are available for dental, vision, mental health and other items.

#### **OPUS Office**

### **OPUS Society/Membership Fee**

These membership fees are charged per semester as per the bylaws of the Organization of Part-time University Students (OPUS) and the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) and are adjusted each year by the rate of change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

#### **OPUS Benefits Plan Fee**

The OPUS Benefits Plan fee is assessed annually either in the Fall or Winter semester, depending on when students start their academic year.


Please note that all part-time and mature undergraduate students, regardless of when they start (either September or January) are charged the same fee since they receive the same amount of coverage.

If you wish to add family members to your insurance plan (spouse and/or children), notify the OPUS office to process your OPT-IN application. Co-op and senior students must OPT-IN to the plan with OPUS directly if they want coverage as they do not get charged through their student accounts. Please contact us via email (opus@uwindsor.ca) for details including fees, adding dependents and more. Our available payment methods are cheque, cash, or e-transfer.

Students can choose to OPT-OUT of the plan during the OPT-OUT period if they are already covered under a comparable insurance plan. For more information, visit: https://www.uwindsor.ca/OPUS/benefits-plan.

#### OPUS Universal Bus Pass Fee (U-Pass)

All students regardless of status who are enrolled at UWindsor are assessed this fee. Senior, exchange, and co-op students are typically exempt and can opt-in if they require this service. Opt-out periods occur in September or January. The UWSA office assists us with administering the bus pass opt-out applications on behalf of undergraduate students. While working together has led to many victories, students continue to shoulder an ever-increasing portion of the cost of post-secondary education. For this reason, it is essential that students continue to work together to fight to improve the post-secondary system and create a more just society for all.





## MESSAGE FROM THE AT-LARGE

Dear Members,

For over four decades, students across Canada have recognized the power of collective action through their membership with the Canadian Federation of Students. Today, you are part of a community of over 530,000 members from 62 students' unions across the nation, committed to addressing the challenges faced by students.

In recent years, we have celebrated significant victories, such as the permanent elimination of interest on Canada student loans and increased funding for post-secondary education. However, tuition fees have tripled since 2001, disproportionately affecting low-income students and leading to a crisis in post-secondary education.

As a Federation, we acknowledge that there are numerous systemic barriers faced by all students and this is why we are committed to creating an inclusive and equitable educational experience for all students in post-secondary institutions across Canada. The "Fight the Fees" campaign calls for the elimination of tuition fees through increased public investment in education.

Over the past year, we have noticed an uptick in hate crimes against Trans students, Jewish students, Muslim students, Indigenous students, Black students, 2SLGBTQIA+ students and students from other equity-seeking groups on campus. This trend has created increased fear and insecurity for our members all across the country. This is why more than ever, the Federation must amplify the work of advocating for policies and practices that support marginalized students, including those from racialized backgrounds, students with disabilities, international students and those from low-income families. We are dedicated to supporting Indigenous languages and cultures in line with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's recommendations.

Historically, students have always been on the right side of the fight for liberation. We understand that we have a collective and moral duty, as students and as a society at large, to challenge, resist and dismantle various systems of oppression. From Turtle Island to Sudan, to Congo, to Tigray, to Tamil Eelam, to Haiti, to Palestine and beyond, we, the students, condemn all acts of genocide and occupation. We urge post-secondary institutions to disclose details of any investments linked to the ongoing genocide, divest from companies directly or indirectly involved, and defend students' right to organize on Turtle Island.

The students united, will never be defeated!



### STRUCTURE OF THE FEDERATION

As a democratic membership-driven organization, the Federation places students at the top of its decision-making structure. Students elect their students' union representatives to bring their issues to decision-making spaces such as the Annual National General Meeting.

As a student, you are considered a member of the Federation. Your students' union—also referred to as a member local—has an equal say in setting the direction, policies, and priorities of the Federation—whether through general meetings, executive meetings, or provincial organizing.

### FEDERATION CAUCUSES

#### The Circle of First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Students

The Circle of First Nations, Inuit and Métis Students is the only national group of Indigenous students, representing thousands of Indigenous post-secondary students across this side of Turtle Island. The priorities of the Caucus are set by its membership and defined by the systemic and daily challenges that Indigenous students face in pursuit of post-secondary education.

For the past 30 years, the Circle has highlighted the challenges facing Indigenous students in Canada, including racism on campus, cutbacks in funding to the Post-Secondary Student Support Program (PSSSP), and the exclusion of some students from the program. The Circle has also addressed broader societal issues that impact Indigenous people and society more broadly, including the development of pipelines, the inability of some to access clean drinking water, and land claim disputes, to name a few.

The Circle has created several campaigns that address the experiences of Indigenous students across the country:

#### Black Students' Caucus

The Black Students' Caucus is a living national movement representing the thousands of Black students across Canada. They unite, formally through meetings of the Federation and informally through a nationwide network of Black student leaders, to discuss issues pertaining to the realities and experiences of Black students within post-secondary education and in communities.

As a movement, the priority is to advocate for the interests of all Black students at the national and international levels. Through collective community awareness of the intersecting realities within the Black diaspora, the Black Caucus is unapologetically, relentlessly and progressively centered on Black unity and liberation.

### **FEDERATION CAUCUSES**

#### **Graduate Students' Caucus**

The Graduate Caucus unites more than 50,000 graduate students in Canada. It is composed of individual members and member local associations within the Canadian Federation of Students who have a common interest and concern with graduate student issues. The Caucus provides a forum for the exchange of information and ideas between graduate students and member local associations in order to promote the interests of graduate students to the provincial government and other external authorities whose jurisdiction affects graduate student affairs. Graduate students also join together with over 530,000 students across the country to lobby on issues of concern to all students such as tuition fees, student debt, research and core funding to post-secondary institutions

In addition to the Federation's extensive campaigns work, members of the National Graduate Caucus have worked together to develop several campaigns that address the experiences of graduate students across the country.

#### Colleges and Institutes' Caucus

The Colleges and Institutes' Caucus exists to bring together students that attend colleges and institutions, so that they may have a collective voice and structure to address issues that relate to their specific needs. Students in this demographic face different issues than those in universities. The issues include but are not limited to geographic isolation due to the location of their college or institute, less access to resources and outreach due to location and the existence of multiple campuses as well as learners that come from lower-income backgrounds. The Caucus has an annually elected representative that communicates and chairs meeting spaces with students across the country and brings their perspectives to the national executive board of the Federation.

### YOUR MEMBERSHIP HAS ITS BENEFITS!

The Federation offers a number of programs and services in order to offset the high cost of education. Federation services are designed to help both individual student members and students' unions save money.

New and existing services are constantly being created and improved by the membership. Students have prioritized purchasing and providing ethically sourced materials with consideration for the rights of workers and the environment. Collectively participating in services gives members of the Federation the ability to negotiate for better pricing while maintaining high quality.

#### International Student Identity Card (ISIC)

The ISIC is an internationally recognized student travel discount card and proof of full-time student status, recognized in 98 countries. As a benefit of membership in the Federation, the ISIC is free for all Federation members. Non-members pay \$20 for the card. #### Free Online Tax Filing

Students are often first-time tax filers and usually have incomes that make it difficult for them to afford the services of professional tax accounts. Online tax filing through reputable software programs is a great alternative to costly tax professionals. The Federation's partnership with UFile, one of Canada's leading online tax preparation software, makes filing free for all Canadian postsecondary students. Since 2006, the Federation has coordinated the purchase of ethically produced and sustainably sourced materials for campuses across Canada. Most of the products available through the Ethical Purchasing Network are union-made, from recycled materials and environmentally conscious.

#### Handbook and Dayplanner

The Federation coordinates the bulk purchasing of thousands of handbooks each year, including this one! By cooperatively coordinating the production of handbooks with each other, students' unions are able to provide high quality, ethically produced day planners with low printing and administration costs, ensuring more students' fees can go to other important services, campaigns and events on campus.



### FEDERATION CAMPAIGNS

#### **United for Equity**

The United for Equity campaign aims to challenge and educate students on barrier-free access to post-secondary education regardless of race, (dis)ability, sexual orientation, gender identity, religion, age and socio-economic background.



The campaign involves several awareness building materials, including stickers, buttons, and information pamphlets. The materials focus

on educating people about and challenging six forms of oppression: homophobia, transphobia, ableism, colonialism, sexism, and racism.

#### **Antisemitism**

Antisemitism is a form of discrimination characterized by hostility, prejudice, vilification, discomfort, or violence against Jewish people, whether as individuals, groups, or a collective. It manifests through attributing dangerous, harmful, frightening, or threatening characteristics or behaviours to Jewish people, communities, and religious facilities.

The purpose of this campaign is to raise awareness and acknowledge the forms of oppression faced by Jewish people, such as the lack of affordable and accessible kosher food options on campuses or the scheduling of student and university events during Jewish holidays. With the growing rise of antisemitism on campuses, this issue requires immediate attention. Through this campaign, we seek to mobilize public support for the fight against antisemitism while also generating pressure on university administrations across the country to address issues of antisemitism on campus.

As students, we must always publicly and unequivocally condemn antisemitic acts, statements, and all forms of hatred towards Jewish people.

### FEDERATION CAMPAIGNS

#### No Islamophobia

Islamophobia is the unfounded hostility towards Islam and, therefore, fear or dislike of Muslim people. Students have a responsibility to challenge the narratives that seek to dehumanize and justify the violence and segregation of Muslim communities on campuses and in our communities.



#### Mental Health Matters

Students have unique mental health needs that relate to the multiple roles they take on, including student, worker, researcher, educator and parent, to name a few. This campaign calls on post-secondary institutions to create mental health services that are accessible, diverse and intersectional.

#### **Consent is Mandatory**

Consent is Mandatory is a campus sexualized violence prevention campaign produced by the Canadian Federation of Students. The goal of this campaign is to support student groups in their efforts to build consent culture on campus. Sexual violence is a term used to describe a wide range of behaviours and acts. Sexual violence also means sexual acts or act targeting a person's sexuality, gender identity or gender expression, whether the act is physical or psychological





in nature, that is committed, threatened or attempted against a person without the person's consent. This includes sexual assault, stalking, sexual harassment, indecent exposure, voyeurism, and sexual exploitation. It is about one or more people exerting power and control over another.

We need to continue to demand more from our post-secondary institutions and governments, build a culture that promotes and prioritizes consent, and do our part to contribute to a safe learning environment for students both online and on campus.

### **RECENT VICTORIES**

The Federation's strength comes from its membership across the country. Working together as members of the Canadian Federation of Students and alongside coalition partners and allies, students have won:

\$48 million over four years, starting in 2025-26, and \$15.8 million ongoing to expand the reach of the Canada Student Loan Forgiveness Program to early childhood educators who work in rural and remote communities.

The creation of a National Food Program that will alleviate costs for student parents.

Modernize the shelter allowances used by the Canada Student Financial Assistance Program when determining financial need, at an estimated cost of \$154.6 million over five years, starting in 2024-25, and \$32.3 million per year ongoing to provide additional student aid to approximately 79,000 students each year.

\$500 million over five years, starting in 2024-25, for the creation of a new Youth Mental Health Fund.

\$242.7 million over three years, starting in 2024-25, to increase access to post-secondary education for First Nations students through the Post-Secondary Student Support Program.

An extension of an additional year for the increase in full-time Canada Student Grants from \$3,000 to \$4,200 per year. Additionally, interest-free Canada Student Loans have been increased from \$210 to \$300 per week.

Opt-in program for renters to report their rent payment history to credit bureaus, to strengthen their credit scores and unlock pathways for more renters to become homeowners.

The Federation also wins provincially!

### **HEAR OUR STORIES CAMPAIGN**

Colonization and systemic oppression against Indigenous communities have been deep-rooted in Academia which has led to Indigenous voices being silenced, and disregarding Indigenous experiences in Academia. This campaign aims at amplifying those muted voices. When students advocate for themselves, and share their experiences especially in Academia, they are met with institutional resistance.



Storytelling is a sacred practice within Indigenous culture, and is also a means of colonial resistance within Indigenous communities. When a community member suffers, we all suffer, when a community member succeeds, we all succeed. This campaign is a means to share and stand in solidarity within indigenous communities, and decolonize Academia while empowering communities through storytelling and curated experiences.

# FAIRNESS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

While all students in Canada have faced dramatic fee increases over the last decade, tuition fees for international students have become particularly burdensome in recent years. By fall 2021, the average tuition fees for international undergraduate students were \$33,623-more than five times the already high fees paid by domestic students.

At some universities, international students pay over \$50,000 a year in undergraduate tuition fees, in addition, professional programs such as medicine and law can cost a staggering \$90,000 a year. High differential fees are an unfair burden and a barrier to post-secondary education for international students. Ultimately, such fees could threaten Canada's ability to attract and retain foreign scholars. This campaign advocates for the regulation of international student tuition fees, public healthcare coverage, and fairer immigration pathways for international students.



# INDIGENOUS MENTAL HEALTH CAMPAIGN

Indigenous students face various economic, social, cultural, financial and situational barriers to health and wellbeing. The impacts of colonization, historic colonial violence and intergenerational trauma continue to affect Indigenous students' daily lives and increases the likelihood of experiencing stress and life challenges which can create hardships in adjusting to academic success. The Circle of



First Nations, Inuit, and Metis Students Caucus believe that increasing avenues for Indigenous students to experience positive mental health and wellbeing is fundamental to their success as students.

Gathering resources and tools which promote the mental health and wellbeing of Indigenous student communities automatically embraces sustainable practices which honor self-governance and self-determination strategies and practices.

The Canadian Federation of Students' Issues Policy states, "The Federation recognises and fully supports First Nations, Métis and Inuit Peoples' inherent rights and titles, including:

- the right to self-government, and all of its cultural and spiritual forms;
- 2. the right to self-determination;
- the right to hold and adhere to the results of a referendum on self-determination, and in other areas;" which are all protective factors for Indigenous students' mental wellbeing.

This campaign reinforces our commitment for education, advocacy, awareness and support for Indigenous students' mental health and wellbeing.

Through direct action, the Canadian Federation of Students, along with thousands of people across the country, pressured the government into announcing the Canada Emergency Student Benefit, which provided financial support to students during the COVID-19 pandemic.
