President Ross Paul's State of the University Address Outlines Directions For U of W

President Ross Paul invited the University community to his second "State of the University" address, on January 26 at 11 a.m. in the Ambassador Auditorium in the CAW Student Centre. Among the topics he covered included a review of the past year's achievements and an outline of challenges for the year ahead. This was a public presentation for the university community and university friends and supporters and marks the third anniversary of the president's term of office.

The address was recorded for cablecast on COGECO Cable 11 on Thursday, February 1 at 8 p.m. and Saturday, February 3 at 2 p.m.

PhD in Sociology With Specialization in Social Justice Gets Senate Approval First Students to Begin this September

The University of Windsor will launch a new doctoral degree program in Sociology with Specialization in Social Justice, accepting three students to begin studies in September 2001. The University of Windsor Senate gave final approval to the program unanimously. The Ontario Council on Graduate Studies review resulted in its approval late last year.

President Ross Paul said the new program will be "a flagship program along with law in pursuit of a strong focus on scholarship in social justice at the University of Windsor."

This will be unique program in Canada, created in response to changes in the discipline of Sociology, that require new approaches to issues of social inequality.

The program will be expanded each year for the next few years to a maximum of 15 students in order to make sure students have access to faculty and other resources, and a high quality program is assured.

Senate Hears Budget Outlook

Vice-President Administration and Finance Eric Harbottle told Senate that an increase in government grants of about two percent is a reasonable expectation, but that amount would just about cover the predicted 10 percent increase in campus utility costs. If the government decides to release some of that funding in envelopes designated for specific expenditures, it could spell difficulties for the university. President Ross Paul said promises of improved investment in higher education may not be realized if the government opts to be cautious because of the slowed-down economy.

As for student retention, the university lost ten percent (about 300 students) from its full-time enrolment between the initial count at the end of September and the official enrolment counted November. Administrative Dean John Corlett said some may have reduce their workloads to part-time, others may not have been able to get the courses when they wanted them. "The university would like to know who they are, where they went and what their reasons were."

Destructuring II Gets Go-ahead from Senate

President Ross Paul presented Senate recently with a set of principles, guidelines and processes for Deans to propose any new academic administrative structures for that faculty.

Senate approved the report, so that Deans will submit their reports to the Vice-President Academic who will review the proposals and take them to the Senate Steering Committee for consideration at the March 8 Senate.

"I do not want to see a complete unravelling of the restructuring of departments that took so much energy before I came to this university," Dr. Paul said. "At this time, I want to put efforts on academic structures behind us so we can concentrate on our most important priorities, but I do not want to turn a blind eye to legitimate concerns."

International Assessment of Psychology Students Ranks Windsor Ph.D. Grads with Best in North America

The Clinical Psychology Training Program at the University of Windsor ranks among the highest in North America in the latest results from the Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology (EPPP). Of the 154 university programs with reported scores in 1997-1998, Windsor tied for 11th and placed in the 93rd percentile.

Windsor PhD graduates outperformed counterparts from such universities as Duke, New York University, Colorado, Columbia Teacher's College, St. John's, Purdue, and Bryn Mawr. The Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology is one of the most important examinations in the career of a psychologist. Eight Canadian provinces and all states in the United States require the passing of this examination as a prerequisite for professional licensing.

Windsor has 100 students in its graduate psychology program, with internships in major medical centres across Canada and parts of the United States. Recent graduates are working in clinics, medical centres, children's hospitals and other facilities in Canada and at major institutions in Texas (U Texas-Houston), Kansas (Menninger Clinic), and Connecticut (Yale).

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Association News

Faculty Association Collective Agreement Proposals For 2001-2004

The following articles pertaining to the University Retirement Plan for Faculty and certain others was approved at a Special Meeting of the Faculty Association membership on Thursday, February 15, 2001.

Article D - The University Retirement Plan for Faculty and certain others

D. 2 The Chairman of the Retirement Committee constituted in accordance with clause 15.01 of the said Plan shall call meetings of the Retirement Committee on at least a quarterly basis.

D.15 The parties agree that, on an annual basis, the administration shall take a random sample of twenty records of the pension plan history for active members to determine the accuracy of the statements, for example, but not limited to, inclusion of university contributions to the money

purchase fund.

D.16. Effective July 1, 2001, all improvements to the University Retirement Plan for Faculty and Certain Others shall be applicable to all current and future members of the Plan.

D.17 At the option of the member, provision for secondary beneficiaries shall be included for pension and life insurance purposes.

D.18 The parties agree that, as a public institution, the administration is not obliged to pay goods and services tax on the administrative costs of the University Retirement Plan for Faculty and Certain Others.

D.19 The parties agree that the \$ 1,509,609 of the excess funding established as a contingency reserve in the Minimum Guarantee Fund and held in escrow shall be used to offset costs of improving benefits for retired members under clause F.3.

D.20 The parties agree to amend Section 7.03 of the Minimum Guaranteed benefit as follows:

The annual amount of the Minimum Guaranteed Benefit is equal to:

a) 1.60% of the Member's Best Average Earnings not in excess of the Average Canada Pension Plan Base; plus b) as is

D.21 The parties agree to amend Section 6.01 (1) of the Pension Plan for academic staff to read as follows:

The Normal Retirement Date for a Member who is either a member of the teaching staff, ancillary academic staff, librarian or sessional lecturer, if hired on a July 1st basis, shall be the last day of the contract year(June 30th) in which the Member attains age 65, and if hired on a September 1st basis, shall be the last day of the contract year(August 31st) in which the Member attains age 65.

Article F - Health Insurance Plans/Employee Assistant Programme

F.3 (b) Effective July 1, 2001, the University shall on behalf of all full-time retired members one-half («) of the Subscriber Rate for:

(i) The Green Shield Dental Plan 35(including \$ 3,000 additional cost) at current O.D.A.

rates.

- (ii) Green Shield Vision Plan (\$300.00/24months);
- (iii) massage therapy to a maximum of \$ 600.00 per calendar year;
- (iv) speech therapist or speech pathologist to a maximum of \$ 400.00 per calendar year;
- (v) 75% of the scheduled fee to clinical psychologist for ten visits;
- (vi) in home nursing to a maximum of \$ 25,000.

D7 Committee Draft Report Completed

Article "D" subsection "7" of the collective agreement between the Faculty Association and the Board of Governors of the University of Windsor requires the University to undertake to establish a Retired Members Pension Committee whose mandate would be to examine the adequacy of the retirement benefits provided by the University to former faculty members and Librarians who retired under the University of Windsor Retirement Plan for Faculty and Certain Others. Retirement benefits are defined as pension entitlement provided by the retirement plan and also include post retirement health care benefits provided by the University. Upon completion of the examination the committee shall produce a report, including recommendations, to the Association and the Board of Governors.

The Retired Members Pension Committee was composed of equal representation from the University and the Faculty Association. Representing the Faculty Association were Dr. Gerald Romsa and Dr. Adrian Van Den Hoven. Dr. Stanley Cunningham and Dr. Alan Metcalfe represented the University of Windsor Retirees' Association. Representatives of the University were Mr. Jim Butler,

Dr. Sheila Cameron, Mrs Sandra Aversa and Mr. Jim Skinner. The committee first met in February of 2000 and has met on numerous occasions since to address these issues. This report is the culmination of those meetings and is supported by all members of the committee.

University of Windsor Pension Plan for Faculty and Certain Others

The committee examined the adequacy of the pension plan by comparing the major components with that of Queen's and Carleton Universities and focused on the following issues

- 1. The adequacy of entitlement at retirement.
- 2. The various methodologies used in the calculation of indexing.
- 3. Non-Reduction Reserve
- 4. Contribution Holiday
- 5. Pension Plan Funding Position
- 6. Plan Improvements
- 7. Post retirement Benefits

This report is now submitted to the University and the Faculty Association. Once we have the approval from the Faculty Association to release the report, it will be distributed to all members of WURA.

 Moved by Kumar Chatterjee and Seconded by Jerry Malone that the name of the Faculty, Librarian and Administrator Retirees' Association be changed to Windsor University Retirees' Association (WURA) Carried unanimously.
- **5. Results of Bursary Fund Awards** Wilf Innerd, Chair, Bursary Fund Committee collated the results of individual rankings of the applicants, by all Executive members. He reported the three names of the Bursary award winners (Xun Lou, Dana Lezau and Jing Lei), which he forwarded to the Awards Office. He said that one student had already sent him a letter of thanks.

He had several concerns regarding the a) eligibility, b) criteria and c) Application Form.

- a) **Eligibility** -It was felt that we should make it clear in the calendar listing, if these bursaries are exclusively for undergraduates or if it includes also graduate students. This is the first time that a graduate applied, which caused some confusion. After some discussion, it was decided to restrict to undergraduates only, since graduate students have access to a number of other financial resources. The committee felt that this matter be raised at the Spring General Meeting to seek the input of the general membership.
- b) **Criteria** Wilf Innerd also suggested that we should develop some criteria. Whether the award should be based on financial need, grade point average, personal considerations or other special circumstances. It was agree, that there should be some weighting for all these criteria. He was asked to bring a draft for consideration at the next meeting.
- c) **Application Form** The present form is very confusing and needs to be simple, clear and user- friendly. Again, the Chair of the committee was asked to design a new form in consultation with the awards office.
- **6. Reports of D7 and Contract Committee** Stan Cunningham stated that the draft report of the D7 committee is attached with the agenda material. The D7 Committee has a scheduled meeting on Friday, February 9, 2001 at 9.15 am. He wished to get clarifications on page 3 the costing of indexing the pension; if it includes all the retirees or just the active faculty. The Health plan suggestions also needed some clarification from Jim Skinner. Datta Pillay suggested that we should invite Diane Russett of Green Shield for the Spring General Meeting to review the report.

Contract Committee(CC) - Alan Metcalfe reported the Retirees request to extend all health benefits currently enjoyed by active faculty to all retirees was rejected by CC. Alan was requested to raise this issue again at the next CC meeting on February 13, 2001. John Meyer's report as a retiree representative on the WUFA Executive was reviewed and his comment on the WUFA emphasis on salary increases was noted. The WUFA General membership meeting to consider contract proposals is set for February 15, 2001 at 4.00 pm in Winclair Hall. All Executive members were urged to attend.

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MEMBERSHIP NEWS

In Memoriam

Dr. Roland Engelhart passed away on December 7, 2000 in his sleep and funeral services were held on December 11, 2000. Unfortunately, this information reached WURA after the December Newsletter has been printed. Dr. Engelhart was a Professor of Psychology, retired in 1995 and living in West Bloomfield Hills in Michigan. He is survived by his wife Elaine and five step children and one adopted child. He was an active member of the Retirees Association. On behalf of the Association, our condolences were forwarded to the family and a \$ 50.00 donation made in his name to the Retirees' Bursary Fund.

John J. Stuart, the founding chair of the Board of Governors of the University of Windsor, has died. Two years before the university was established, Mr. Stuart was appointed by then former Ontario premier Leslie Frost to conduct negotiations and help draft the legislation that created the university. Frost was vice-chair of the provincial university affairs committee that drafted legislation to set up new universities in Ontario.

Professor Emeritus of Law John Whiteside recalls that Mr. Stuart was selected carefully by Frost to provide leadership for the new university and remained chair of the board for about four years. "John was known in community as fair minded, progressive individual who can be credited for creating the new university, its organization, securing the high regard in the community and for it being seen as institution that would serve the whole community. Stuart was president of J. T Wing."

The home of Mr. Stuart's father was among properties expropriated for the university and is now the official residence of the president of the university on Sunset Avenue near Riverside Drive.

Revised Health Plan Benefits - Proposal

1. Plan Structure-New Plan - single/couple/family structure.

2. Drug Plan

A \$2,000 annual maximum would be introduced and certain "over the counter"(otc) medications would be removed. Drugs such as insulin and most "life sustaining drugs" (ltd) would be included in the coverage. All drugs under this category would be maintained as eligible benefits. In addition, the following categories of OTCs and LTDs would remain eligible.

Itd-antiamenia agents; Itd- potassium replacement agents; Itd - electrolytic, caloric and water balance; Itd- gastrointestinal drugs; Itd-smmp agents; otc-antidiarrheal drugs; otc-non-sedating antihistamines; otc- lactose liquid and tablets; otc-blood formation and coagulation; otc-cardiovascular drugs; otc- central nervous system drugs; otc-gastrointestinal drugs; otc-heavy metal antagonists; otc- hormones and synthetic substitutes; otc- serums, toxoids and vaccines; otc- local anaesthetic; otc- enteric coated ASA (aspirin); otc-electrolyte caloric and water balance agents; otc - smoking cessation therapy (gum/patches).

3. Semi-Private Coverage

A \$100 annual deduction would be introduced

4. Extended Health Services

A 10% co-pay would be introduced to all eligible benefits and there would be a \$500 annual maximum for physiotherapy services.

5. Dental

- A. Recall limited to once every 9 months.
- B. Oral hygiene limited to once in a lifetime.
- C. Scaling/root planing would be limited to 4 units every 12 months but not more than 2 units in a 5 month period.
- D. Limitation on bitewings would be once every 12 months.
- E. Ortho coverage would be removed.
- F. Subscribers would pay the dentist directly for coverage.

6. Vision Care

A \$100 every 12 months vision plan would be introduced.

7. Audio

a new audio plan with coverage equal to \$500 every 5 years.

Current Retirees

Effective July 1, 2001, current retirees would be given one window of opportunity to apply for the new benefit structure. Retirees may choose a plan with or without a drug plan. A retiree must enroll in the plan for at least one year once enrolled.

Retirees on After July 1, 2001

Anyone retiring on after July 1, 2001, will be given one window of opportunity to apply for the benefits package. Retirees may choose a plan with or without a drug plan. A retiree must remain in the plan for at least one year.

The Newsletter
