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IMPORTANT MEETING SLATED MARCH 24TH

The Spring Meeting on Thursday, March 24th promises to be a milestone in the Association's history. "We're now at a point in our development where we have to make hard decisions, " said a gentleman interviewed on McEwen St. last week. "Right", added his friend, as he pushed his trailer onto his lawn through the snow. "We should be deciding how we can help others. That's assuming, we do want to help others, which might be a debate in itself."

These folks were not members of our Association and it is not clear who interviewed them or why. But they had a point. Our Association is now four years old. It has a place in the life of most of the faculty and librarian retirees. Perhaps it is time to expand our horizons a bit. Just a bit, to be sure. No big leap into the unknown!

For one thing, the Executive of the Association has been looking into the possibility of establishing, within the University's Office of Scholarship Finance, a fund to be known as the <u>Faculty and Librarian Retirees' Scholarship Fund</u>. We have so far had no policy to be followed on the occasion of a member's death. If we had such a Fund, the Association could make an automatic donation to the Fund in memory of the deceased person, informing the bereaved family that this had been done. Also family and friends of the deceased might appreciate having this alternative available for a memorial donation.

In time the Fund would grow. This would allow the Association to follow an appropriate and equitable policy when a member dies. Accounting, tax exemption status, etc. would be in the hands of the University. The cause itself would be a good one and the Association would have input into the actual disposition of the Fund.

On another page is a letter from **David Booth** with an idea he wants to put forth for consideration as well, having to do with a donation to the University to help in its **campaign to beautify the campus.**

The major agenda items for the March 24th meeting will be found in the annoucement on p. 4.

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ONE-TIME ADJUSTMENT MEANT TO REMEDY PAST SHORTFALLS IN MINIMUM GUARANTEED PENSIONS

Last Fall, our president, Norm Shklov, a math-stats whizz in his own right, published some startling findings in these pages. He showed that, for years, retirees on the University's Guaranteed Minimum Pension have taken, might we dare say, a bit of a fleecing! See our Fourth Issue, June, 1993, page 7)

Shklov didn't have to use differential calculus; **just simple arithmetic**. In one column he showed percent increases in consumer prices year by year, using government sources; in the other, percent increases in pensions to our retirees who are on the Minimum Guarantee.

No one was really surprised at what the study showed: that a retiree who had been on the minimum guarantee during the past ten years was now receiving about 44 per cent of the salary at which he or she terminated. The drop was the combined effect of both the initial joint-survivorship reduction and the reduction each year in his or her real purchasing power. Lost purchasing power resulted from an increase in prices of 56 per cent, matched by an increase in pension of 23% over the period.

But enough! This is not a story of woe. Nice things can happen in life, and surprises do occur!

Last summer the Faculty Association and the University concluded a new agreement. A Joint Committee was asked to review the impact of the Social Contract legislation on the Pension Plan.

Early in the new year, the Committee reported. Among other things, it addressed the problem that Dr. Shklov had highlighted, and came up with a proposal that most of our members will be pleased about, even if not wildly ecstatic.

The proposal is to increase the pensions of Min. G'tee. Members by (1) the increase in the C.P.I. from the date of retirement to July 1, 1993, MINUS (b) the cost-of-living increases previously granted to the member under the plan. The increase could be worthwhile. Don't go on a shopping spree, though - the MAXIMUM increase is 5%!

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COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS IMPROVED INDEXATION FORMULA

The Committee recommended the replacement of the old indexation formula by one that ensures that the Min. Gtd. Benefit win be increased by the full amount of any increase in CPI, up to 2%. If the CPI increases by more than 2%, there is a table which indicates further increases in the Min. Gtd. Benefit. These increases are a portion of the full increase in CPI above 2%, and will be discussed at the March meeting. At the time of going to print, we were waiting confirmation that the foregoing recommendations had received final approval. Even without such confirmation we feel quite sure that they have.
