The renovations to Odette House, the provisionally named **Retirees' Hub** and WURA's new home, continue. The new accessible lift should be







By the Numbers

This article is intended to present an examination of the enrollment numbers for the University over the last 24 years. Many factors have affected these numbers. The significant increase in 2005 and 2010 totals are partly due to the fact that Ontario eliminated grade 13 and for a couple of years there was twice the number of students graduating from high school and entering University. This was called the Double Cohort period.

Then, last year the Federal government significantly reduced the number of Student Visa Permits allowed while increasing the financial requirements for obtaining a Permit. For the fall of 2024, the number of study permits granted dropped by 35% and the cap for 2025 will be

enrollment at the University of Windsor dropped from 5,531 in 2023 to 4,052 in 2024... a total of 1,479 students.

I have included part of an article from the Spring Issue of the **e-Bulletin** that speaks to the issue of funding for Ontario's postsecondary institutions. It follows the charts. The situation is very dire.

This is the excerpt from the Spring Issue of the *e-Bulletin* referred to above. As I said, the situation is most dire. Whatever influence you can bring to bear on the Federal and Provincial governments by speaking to Members of Parliament or other professionals in your academic community will be worth the effort.

The reprint begins here.

Following the Laurentian University bankruptcy announcement in early 2021, combined with continuing concern over the financial stability of the entire Ontario postsecondary sector, the Ontario government announced the formation of a Blue Ribbon Panel in March of 2023.

The Blue-Ribbon Panel's recommendations were clear: full implementation is critical for the sector's survival, which would inject about \$2.5 billion in ongoing base funding into colleges and universities over the next three years, with \$1.9 billion in base funding specifically for universities.

In response to the Panel's recommendations, the Ontario government released its budget in February of 2024 announcing \$1.3 billion for colleges and universities. Following are excerpts from the Council of Ontario Universities (COU) response:

"COU response, February 26, 2024 – "Today's announcement, while providing short-term relief, falls far short of what the government's own expert panel found was urgently required. Ontario's universities now face an eight-year long tuition freeze without adequate multi-year base funding, which continues to undermine the financial sustainability of the sector. In fact, Ontario universities receive the lowest per-student funding in Canada and are only funded at 57 per cent of the national average. The 10 per cent tuition cut in 2019 and ongoing freeze, declining real per-student operating funding...are further placing the education, programs and services students rely on at risk."

"Stratford Reviews": Wrapping Up the Season

LONDON ASSURANCE: This is a delightful bit of 18th Century fluff. Essentially, the story concerns an old guy guardian who will in some manner acquire a young woman in marriage and, as a bonus, gain access to her inheritance. Or, something like that! However, as a pert young lady, the woman aspires to much better than an old degenerate and, naturally, falls in love with a younger man.

It is a cute, boisterous, farce. As always, at Stratford, the performers especially in lead roles easily excel in their roles

Stratford veteran Gerant Wyn Davies fills the leading role of the lascivious old guy, Sir Harcourt Courtly. Another veteran, Deborah Hay, is exceptional as Lady Gay Spanker. Trust me, there is no spanking -- at least not on stage.

The performance is fun and lively and as anticipated, very silly!

But I do have a concern: Deborah has an high pitched voice as does the other young lady. Apparently, Lady Spanker had some great lines. Even with a hearing assistance device, I could not catch all her lines. The audience roared and I sat wondering what she had said. High pitched voices are dreadful for those of us with hearing impairments. Love sopranos in opera but need mezzo-soprano voices in theatre.

My personal deficiencies aside, this is a fun-filled performance an Wyn Davies is absolutely at his performance best. Rate This Performance at 8.1 out of 10

LA CAGE AUX FOLLES: Of one thing you can always be certain about at Stratford and that is the musicals! "Cage" achieves an all new high, both in terms of exhausting and colourful dance, and in terms of individual performances. Literally one of them there *Tour des Forces*, Eh!

The story line is relatively well known. La Cage is a a gay nightclub where genders become irrelevant. Two chaps, Georges played by Stratford outstanding veteran, Sean Arbuckle, and Albin played by another exceptional veteran performer, Steve Ross, are lovers. They co-habit. At times, Ross's portrayal brought to mind Elton John! Georges has a son from a previous heterosexual marriage. Son announces intention to marry a girl who's father is tight-butted about homosexuals and gay anything.


Son needs a family context wherein his intended and her family can meet his family. Albin (Steve Ross) is to play mother or maybe Uncle Al. No matter, all are exposed and all rollick at La Cage aux Folles in one of the best performance we've ever seen of this play. If you miss this one, well, we're sorry. Rate This Performance at 10 out of 10.

SALESMAN IN CHINA: Without question this bold bilingual and bicultural play is the finest dramatic play we've witnessed at Stratford in many years. It is all about preparing for a performance of Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman". There are some great performances by several cast members but Adrian Pang as Ying Ruocheng, the man trying to launch a performance of Miller's "Death of a Salesman", is absolutely outstanding. Tom McCamus as Arthur Miller is entirely believable and brilliantly performed.

The Play includes surtitles in both English and Mandarin as needed.

Set in the middle of Chairman Mao's "cultural revolution", the Salesman play and its Chinese performers cannot entirely escape the insanity of the cultural war. Without question, this is a performance not to be missed as it bridges cultures in several dimensions. Riveting performances abound, especially by Adrian Pang. Only concern, the Surtitle screen is low on the stage making if difficult for those in the first 20 rows or so to see them without jiggling between heads. Otherwise, a brilliant and pioneering experiment in pure drama. **Rate This Performance at 9.9 out of 10**/

Fifty people were treated to the Stratford Festival's performance of *London Assurance* on September 19. Under the skillful handling of driver Ted Mastrionardi, our Badder Bus left the parking lot of the former Silver Cities Cinema at 8:30 in the morning arriving in Stratford shortly before noon.

Brian Taylor from the School of Dramatic Art provided insights into the play and its author, Dion Boucicault, along with anecdotes about his own work experiences at Stratford. His stories about the great William Hutt were particularly entertaining as well as his insights on what to watch for regarding the actors' movements on the stage during their performance.

Some people disembarked in downtown Stratford to do some shopping or grab a bite in one of the fine bistros in town while the rest travelled on to the Festival Theatre. There, we enjoyed the wonderful gardens and parklands, grabbed a bite to eat in the theatre cafe, and visited the theatre gift shop prior to the matinee performance. After the play, our group gathered in the Fleck where we were treated to a visit by Antoni Cimolino, the Artistic Director of the Stratford Theatre and the director of London Assurance.
