

The University of Windsor will continue to offer most courses online through the Winter 2021 semester, president Robert Gordon announced.

"Given current health and safety considerations, physical classroom space is a critical factor," he wrote in a message to faculty, students, and staff.

Deans are consulting with instructors to determine which courses must be offered in person; a detailed list will be available once it is finalized.

Whether courses are face-to-face or online, faculty and staff across the University of Windsor are investing an enormous amount of time, effort, and creativity into making them engaging, effective, and as safe as possible.

A former president of the Native Women's Association of Canada, she is nationally known for her work and commitment to Indigenous law and politics in Canada.

"The impact of Dr. Jacobs' research, teaching, and advocacy has been national and international in scope," says Windsor Law Dean Christopher Waters. "We look forward to her leadership at the law school."

\$3 million Donation To Law

A planned \$30 million transformation of the current Ron Ianni Faculty of Law building got a major boost Friday with the announcement of a \$3 million gift by the Don Rodzik Foundation in support of the Transforming Windsor Law building project.

University of Windsor president Rob Gordon and Faculty of Law dean Chris Waters were joined by Don Rodzik Sr. and members of the Rodzik family at an outdoor event on campus announcing the gift.

Prof. Tawfik's expertise on in-

A professor at the University of Windsor since 1991, Tawfik has founded a number of intellectual property clinical and experiential initiatives to support Windsor-Essex startups. Her administrative service includes stints as associate dean from 1998 to 2000, and as acting dean in 2011 and 2017.

The Great Lakes Institute for Environmental Research (GLIER) By Dr Datta Pillay

The University of Windsor taking advantage of the excellent location, along the Great Lakes on the Detroit river, established an institute for environmental research.

It first started as an interdisciplinary institute, under the leadership of **Late Dr. Marie Sanderson**, a geographer of international reputation.

Since then the GLIER started addressing complex environmental problems, that cross conventional disciplinary boundaries such as the effects of multiple environmental stressors on large lakes and their watersheds.

Under the Directorship of Dr. Robert Michael McKay, ten faculty members at GLIER work together with the Visiting Scholars, Post-Doctoral Fellows, Graduate Students and Staff to conduct exciting interdisciplinary research programs.

GLIER researchers have been awarded over \$ 40 million in funding in recent years, 5 Canada Research Chairs, 4 Premier's Research Excellence Awards, a Department of Fisheries and Oceans Invasive Species Research Chair and a Fellow in the Fellowship in the Royal Society of Canada.

GLIER scientists and their research have been featured in CNN, Washington Post, Chicago Tribune, Maclean's, Globe and Mail, National Post, Discovery Channel, and CBC television and radio.

GLIER is located on the Detroit River, housing 19 extensively equipped laboratories, offices for researchers, postdoctoral fellows and graduate students, as well as conference and meeting rooms. GLIER maintains a private boat launch

on the Detroit River and has a dedicated research vessel and boats.

GLIER infrastructure, funded by CFI Innovation Fund awards, builds on existing capabilities to make us a leading centre for freshwater aquatic research in North America. This infrastructure promotes collaboration and innovative multidisciplinary research.

GLIER has the distinction of housing one of the few university-based environmental analytical laboratories in Canada accredited by the Canadian Association for Laboratory Accreditation (CALA) to international standards of performance.

GLIER offers a research-oriented graduate program in environmental research leading to M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees

At GLIER; faculty, fellow students and staff are committed to making the experience of students as stimulating and rewarding as possible.

Professor Mitra Mirhassani



University of Windsor engineering professor **Mitra Mirhassani** has been honoured by IT World Canada

(ITWC) for her innovative cyber security research.research and dedication to helping others better understand the function and connectivity of our devices.

Dr. Mitra Mirhassani has been recognized as one of Canada's top 20 women in cyber security.

She was chosen out of more than 170 nominations for women working in cyber security across a wide variety of organizations and roles, including CISOs, company founders, professors, directors and women holding numerous specialty positions in both the public and private sectors.

"What worries me most is the health and security of the devices that we build and buy," says Mirhassani, who leads UWindsor's Analog and Mixed Signal Research Lab." There are many challenges in our way to understand the complexity of the process."

Mirhassani's latest research includes the investigation of cybersecurity issues that arise when using electric vehicle fleets with battery charging infrastructure and improving the security of autonomous and connected vehicles.

UWindsor Engineering Dean Mehrdad Saif

says female leaders in technology sectors serve as role models and mentors to future generations of female technology innovators. "I congratulate Dr. Mirhassani for this great achievement and wish her continued success."



Professor Anne Snowden

Anne Snowdon, a professor in the Odette School of Business, is leading a team of 18 other researchers from across the nation in the oneyear study funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, the federal agency responsible for funding health and medical research in Canada.

She has been awarded nearly \$1.4 million to research Canada's healthcare supply chain to identify ways to improve the processes critical to managing COVID-19 and similar crises in the future.

"The purpose of this research is to examine supply chain processes and infrastructure to ensure products are available to public health teams and health care professionals to protect the health of every Canadian citizen," said Dr. Snowdon.

Snowdon's team will study ways to ensure health teams have safe and effective products that are of high quality and available when needed.

It will study the processes involved in the procurement and distribution of health products in seven provinces, to improve planning and coordination across provincial, federal, and global health systems for effective pandemic management.

Her research will focus on how supply chain processes influence patient health outcomes, and how data, digital tools, and analytics can strengthen management of the pandemic. "to safeguard the health and safety of all Canadians."

Dr. Jan Ciborowski

UWindsor biology professor emeritus Jan Ciborowski's 35-year commitment to protecting the Great Lakes has been acknowledged with the International Association for Great Lakes Research (IAGLR) 2020 Lifetime Achievement Award.

The award recognizes important and continued contributions to the field of Great Lakes research over a period of 20 years or more.

He has received numerous awards for his work, including from the Great Lakes Fishery Commission (2008), the International Joint Commission (2003), Ohio Sea Grant (2017), and in 2016 he received UWindsor's Faculty of Science Lifetime Achievement Award.

WE ARE STILL IN THIS TOGETHER!

Hopefully, you and your family are all keeping safe and heathy, and remembering to follow the basic health guidelines of frequent hand washing, physical distancing of 2 metres and wearing a face mask, if you must go out. For the first 4 months, representing a group of 'most-at-risk' seniors, the WURA Executive cancelled all WURA activities and communicated by e-mail, with updates to members through e-mails, our website or in our WURA Newsletters.

In mid-July, seeing that the campus was going to teach primarily online for the Fall semester and possibly beyond, the Executive decided to meet online with our first meeting in mid-September. Please see the enclosed Agenda for the Executive Meeting.

The Executive decided only to discuss those "critical" topics that we would like to make a decision on, to pass on to the members, especially if we don't have a WURA Fall AGM.

Because of the current situation with the pandemic, we do NOT think that it's safe to have a Fall AGM on campus this year, and we feel that our Executive and members would not be ready to have the AGM online yet.

As a result, we will be asking the WURA membership to accept most of the decisions made by the Executive at this time, except the Nominating Committee report, where we will ask the members to approve the Executive member recommendations by both an online and mail-in vote. For other "non-critical" topics, we should have reports from these committees later, unless a "significant issue" arises.

For fall social activities, we are proposing a "WEEKLY WALK FOR THE COVID-WEARY" and a "MUSIC JAM", all socially-distanced, as well as a yet -to-be-decided modified Holiday Luncheon, as long as it is agreed to by the President to fit into UWindsor's 'Return to Campus' philosophy.
