UWindsor Presidential Update




The University of Windsor scored multiple successes in teaching and research in 2018, says interim president Douglas Kneale in a message he sent to the campus community In December.

"The success of our students and alumni, the support of our staff, the achievements of our faculty, the leadership of our administrative team, and the partnership of our retirees, donors, and community have made Fall 2018 an extraordinary moment in our trajectory," Dr. Kneale wrote.

He said he anticipates significant developments across the provincial landscape in the year to come, but made few predictions other than expecting clarity on the issues of the funding formula, the tuition framework, and the Strategic Mandate Agreements early in 2019.

Awards Honour Professors in Chemistry and Biochemistry



University of Windsor professors Simon Rondeau-Gagné and John Trant who received the 2019 Thieme Chemistry Journal Award are among 92 young professors from around the world recognized as recipients of a 2019 Thieme Chemistry Journal Award.

"This is a tremendous achievement," said Dan Mennill, associate dean, graduate studies and research. "The Faculty of Science is proud of both Dr. Rondeau-Gagné and Dr. Trant as well as their achievements."

Rondeau-Gagné said it is "particularly appreciated and rewarding to be recognized by our peers at the international level, especially at the beginning of our careers."

The Thieme Chemistry Journal Awards recognize promising early career researchers in organic chemistry and related fields such as inorganic, physical, material, and biological.

Nursing Student Wins Award

Office of Human Rights, Equity and Accessibility recognized nursing student **Chantal Kayumba** for her advocacy on behalf of patients.

UWindsor nursing students on clinical placements are expected to write about their experiences and turn in their notes to instructors as part of their course work. When fourth-year student Chantal Kayumba wrote about discriminatory comments targeting certain patients and the gutsy way she addressed it, Prof. Brenda McLaughlin took notice.



"By acting on her beliefs, Chantal stimulated change in the agency's corporate culture and helped to protect vulnerable people," McLaughlin said. "She also made strides in making University of Windsor field placements safer environments for students of minority groups."

Dr Frank DeMarco Celebrated His 98th Birthday

He began as an assistant professor and var-

sity coach at Assumption College, later became the inaugural Principal of Essex College, first Dean of Applied Science, and then served as Vice- President for three Presidents. He retired as Senior Vice President.

He has been referred to as "architect", "builder", founding ""pillar, ""Mr. Assumption", "Mr. Windsor", "Coach", "Professor," and "Dean ". No matter the label or title, they all point to the enormous contribution DeMarco has

made to the University of Windsor and the wider Windsor community.

In 2009 he received the prestigious Clark Award. In 2015, WURA presented him a special certificate in recognition of his contributions to the university.

In 2016, a Special Award was recommended by WURA Executive for being a member of WURA for 25 years in good standing. He was presented at this luncheon with a certificate. Later, Dr. DeMarco addressed the gathering

New Writer In Residence

A Canadian novelist who helped shape Québécoise feminist language theory is UWindsor's latest writer-in-residence.

Gail Scott, a fiction writer, essayist, and translator, will read from her works at two events and will be a resource for students during her time on campus.

Many of Scott's novels and short s tories deal with fragmentation in time, subjects, and narrative structures. Her ghost story, The Obituary, was a 2011 finalist for Le Grand Prix du Livre de la Ville de Montréal, and two of her novels — Main Brides and Heroine — were both nominated for the Quebec Writers' Federation Award. Her translation of Michael Delisle's Le Déasarroi du matelot was shortlisted for the Governor General's translation award in 2001.

"She has done much to create a writerly community in English-speaking Quebec, introduce French feminist theory and writers to the general populace, forge a 'new narrative' with her own ground-breaking writing, and write critically about — and translate — other writers' books," said UWindsor English professor Nicole Markotić. "It's an honour and quite a coup that we've secured her as one of our writers-in-residence."



Former Board Chair Passes Away

Former chair of the UWindsor board of Governors, *John Brockenshire*, who died on Dec. 19, was remembered as a friend to the University and pillar of the community. John Brockenshire (BA 1955) was a supporter of the University generous with his money and



his time, says UWindsor president Douglas Kneale.

Brockenshire, a retired Justice of the Superior Court of Ontario. He served the University of Windsor as a sessional instructor in the Faculty of Law and the Odette School of Business, and held a position on its Board of Governors from 1978 to 1987, including a three-year term as chair.

"John Brockenshire's engagement with the University over several decades touched the lives of many people across diverse areas, from drama to athletics to academics to capital projects," Dr. Kneale said. "His legacy is long and deep and will not be forgotten."

Brockenshire received the Alumni Award of Merit in 1993 and the Clark Award in 1997 in recognition of his service to the university and the community, volunteering his skills and knowledge in support of the United Way, Chamber of Commerce, Canadian Cancer Society, Windsor Aquatic Club, Assumption University, and Canterbury College, among others.

He and his wife Norma Brockenshire (deceased July 2016) received honorary doctorates in civil laws from the University during its 2007 Convocation ceremonies. They were valued donors to programs in law, business, drama, and science, as well as Lancer athletics and student scholarships.

Brockenshire's final gift to the University's students was the outdoor pingpong table in the David A. Wilson Commons.

New company born of UWindsor research Jan

Rust never sleeps, so nei-



ther does University of Windsor physicist Roman Maev.

Dr. Maev, founder of UWindsor's Institute for Diagnostic Imaging Research (IDIR) and local ultrasonic imaging manufacturer Tessonics Inc., has developed a new way of applying powder coatings that cleans, coats, and works metal in a single operation.

The technology has been used for several years on Enwin equipment — transformers, transformer stations, switching equipment, connectors, pipes, and the welded joints on the Hanna Street water tower — prolonging the life of equipment and causing fewer service disruptions to customers.

The application is now on the market through a new company, unveiled Tuesday, called ONtech Rapid Coatings. A collaboration between Tessonics and Enwin Energy, ONtech will market the technology across North America to utility companies, pipeline repair companies, automotive parts manufacturers and shipbuilding and aerospace industries.

"This demonstrates a great example of how initial collaboration between the University and Windsor and Enwin can be translated to a new, high-tech startup." Maey said.

Lisa Porter Receives One Million Grant For Cancer Research

A team led by UWindsor biologist

Lisa Porter has received more than a million dollars grant to advance research on an aggressive form of brain cancer.

Glioblastoma multiforme, or GBM, is the



aggressive cancer that claimed the life of Gord Downie, lead singer for the Canadian rock band the Tragically Hip. Dr. Porter's research focuses on finding new therapy directions to treat GBM. The research began with funding from the Canadian Cancer Society, said Porter, the clinical director who helped found the Windsor Cancer Research Group.

"The results were so promising that we applied for this larger federal funding," she said. "We are thrilled to have this support to con-

tinue the work."

The funding, part of a \$275 million announcement the federal health minister made earlier this week, will be spread over five years. It will be used to amass pre-

clinical data, using samples for testing. While the goal is to move onto patients, we need to first complete all testing in the lab," explained Porter.

The funding will support seven researchers, including students, who work in Porter's lab. The research is being done in collaboration with Windsor neurosurgeon Abdalla Shamisa, Windsor oncologist Swati Kulkarni, Wayne State University researcher Ana deCarvalho, Michigan

State University researcher Eran Andrechek and cancer researcher Daniel
Schramek from the Lunenfeld-Tanenbaum
Research Institute in Toronto.

"It takes a lot of collaborators to move this forward," Porter said.

Porter's GBM research is one of 370 health research projects across the country included in . CIHR is the major federal agency responsible for funding health and medical research in Canada.
