The Windsor University Retirees' Association-WURA (Faculty, Librarian, Administrator) at Windsor was formed in 1990, to give a unified voice to retirees; to provide a bridge for communication with the University; to encourage social contact among the retirees; and to open a few doors through which retirees could continue to contribute to the University of Windsor.

Thus the Association is meant to fill what could otherwise be a void in the lives of retirees – possible isolation from the University and from their former colleagues; and possible lack of understanding of vital pension and health issues that affect them directly.

There are only two meetings of the full membership per year: in the spring and the fall. An informal social committee arranges several other events per year – dinners, plays, picnics, and so on –all of which are paid for by those who take part. The Association encourages smaller special interest groups to form as occasion and their interests warrant. Because of extreme economy of operation, dues have been kept at the level of \$20 per year. 

Preliminary renderings of the University of Windsor's downtown campus were revealed by president Alan Wildeman during a media conference Wednesday, April 17, in the Windsor Armouries.

"The University of Windsor is creating new spaces where our students, faculty and staff can be engaged in innovative teaching, learning and discovery, and where they can more effectively partner with the arts community and social agencies to make a difference," Dr. Wildeman said.

"Just as the new engineering building, innovation centre and the Odette School of Business will create a regional address for innovation at California and Wyandotte, our downtown campus will create an important cultural hub for our community, providing access to services and new ideas that speak to the quality of life, when it opens in the fall of 2014."

The renderings were created by CS&P Architects Inc., the firm that will be working on all three historic projects: the Windsor Armouries, the former Greyhound bus depot and the Windsor Star building.

The Windsor Armouries will be transformed to become the home of the newly merged schools of music and visual arts. Ample skylights and a vertical addition on the south end of the 110-year old building are just a few of the many changes in store for this Windsor landmark.

The film production program will be relocated to the former Greyhound bus depot located directly across University Avenue from the Armouries. Together, the Armouries and bus depot will create a sense of connectivity through shared space, giving students the opportunity to collaborate between the various programs and with the community.

The School of Social Work and the Centre for Professional and

Executive Education will move into the Windsor Star building, which will undergo a renovation unlike any other architectural design in Windsor.

"The Windsor Star building will receive a dramatic transformation that will leave the historic façades intact, but completely rebuild the structures into new teaching and learning spaces with convenient access for the community," said Wildeman.

The brick façade of the 1918 apartment building on the south end of the complex facing Ferry Street will remain, and the interior floors will be removed and recreated as a landscaped courtyard that will be open to the sky. The historic limestone façade at the corner of Pitt and Ferry streets will also be left in its original state, but will see an entirely new building built behind it with a three-storey atrium and a rooftop terrace. The structure facing Pitt Street will be renovated into classrooms, offices and student lounge space featuring glass-paneled walls that open like garage doors.

The parking lot currently located at the northwest corner of Ferry and Chatham streets may be developed into a new building as future demand grows for these programs.

In addition to a provincial government investment of \$15 million, the City of Windsor donated the Armouries and the Greyhound Bus Depot, as well as \$10 million in funding to assist the University in creating its downtown campus.

The remaining funding for these capital projects, which are expected to total approximately \$70 million, is separate from the University's operating budget and will be supported through program revenues and fundraising.

# **Senate Approves New** Qualifications for President's Honour Roll

Making it onto the **President**'s Honour Roll became a little more of an honour as Senate approved toughening the criteria at its meeting April 13.

Under the new policy, the honour will be restricted to students in first-entry undergraduate programs who have completed a minimum of 10 courses with a cumulative grade-point average of 12.0 or higher.

Current eligibility requirements call for a cumulative average of 11.5, attained by 1,036 students over the past year. The <u>report of the Senate Student</u> Committeenoted, "So many students are receiving this honour that the prestige factor could be an issue."

# **Uwindsor Alumnus and Former Professor Appointed** to Ontario Court of Appeal

For a former English professor who never intended to practice law, Windsor's Edward Ducharme sure has made a mark in the justice system.

Ducharme, 68, holds three UWindsor degrees (BA English 1967, MA 1969, LLB 1985), and entered law only in his mid-40s, yet he was just appointed a judge on the highest court in the province: the Ontario Court of Appeal. He will be officially sworn in May 29 at a ceremony at Toronto's Osgoode Hall.

# **Uwindsor Commits Nearly** \$2.5 Million to Projects **Supporting University's** Mission, Vision and Values

In an ongoing effort to support its strategic plan, Thinking Forward, Taking Action, the University of Windsor has committed nearly \$2.5 million in 2012/13 funding for new initiatives and programs to improve the student experience, pursue strengths research and graduate education, recruit and retain the best faculty and staff, and engage in and build community and international partnerships.

First established as part of the University's 2009/10 operating budget, the Strategic Priority Fund has an ongoing commitment to fund new programs that directly support the vision and values of the institution's strategic plan. Among the 30 projects approved for the 2012/13 budget year are:

Commercial Aviation and Aerospace Leadership Option in the Honours Bachelor of Arts in Liberal and Professional Studies program. This new option is in response to a growing demand for university-educated pilots and leaders in the aviation and aerospace industries:

The In/Terminus Centre for Research and Creative Activity will provide for a team of faculty artists and researchers to develop interdisciplinary, student-led projects and installations in the Windsor/Detroit region. In/Terminus will implement a series of community-based projects in Windsor in anticipation of the development of the Armouries building as the new home for UWindsor's combined music and fine arts program. It is intended to foster greater working relationships with the community and with Detroit-based arts and academic come up with an exciting list of projects institutions:

Funding to provide **Field**, **Laboratory**, and Demonstration Equipment for Enhancing the Environmental Science Curriculum and Community Outreach Activities. This initiative will involve the purchase of up-to-date instrumentation necessary for in-class

and in-field experience and hands-on experimentation. The equipment will also be available to support talks at local schools and to the general public;

4Winds, a project facilitating Aboriginal participation in post-secondary science, engineering and technology, mathematics. Participating students in grades six to eight will take part in science and technology experiences that are extensions of Aboriginal cultural practices in interacting with nature for health, food, shelter and energy;

Centre for Engineering Innovation (CEI) Live Building Portal Development, a project that will make the building's innovative live building systems performance data available on the internet. Live building sensors that monitor the building's bio wall, green roof, weather station, building wind distribution, and rainwater distribution systems, make the building a teaching tool that will be accessible to worldwide users through the portal project;

Funding for the position of **Coordinator** for Faculty of Science Outreach Activities. This three-year position will coordinate outreach programs for the faculty, including school visits, to support the Windsor-Essex community and raise awareness of UWindsor's many research and teaching strengths in the sciences.

Provost Leo Groarke says all faculty and staff members are encouraged to apply for funding for projects that provide costeffective ways to meet the University's strategic objectives.

"We used a committee administrators, students and faculty to adjudicate the grants this time around," says Dr. Groarke. "I would like to thank the committee for its hard work and its commitment to new initiatives and the University's strategic plan. I think it has to fund this time around."

Groarke says the Strategic Priority Fund has provided an outstanding way for faculty and staff to participate in seeing their creative ideas come to fruition and encourages every member of the campus community to take part in building UWindsor's future.

### **Association News**

#### **Professor David Wurfel**

David Wurfel and his wife, Kathy, journeyed in April to Cagayan de Oro--Mindanao's second largest city, at over one million--where David had been invited to give the keynote address at the 50th anniversary meeting of the Philippine Political Science Association. It was the largest yet of PPSA meetings, with more than 150 registered attendants. The President of Xavier University, the host university, urged political scientists to become more involved in the protection of the environment, especially from the onslaught of corporate mining. Prof. Wurfel further stressed in his address that since Canadian companies dominated the mining scene in the Philippines, both Filipino and Canadian scholars had a special obligation to investigate and critique their role.

Before leaving for Manila the Wurfels were given a tour of Cagayan, devastated by the December flood that killed 1,500. In Manila they stayed at the University of the Philippines campus, where they were visited by friends. On the way back to Seattle they also stopped for more than a week in Tokyo, staying at the International Christian University campus. The chairman of the ICU Board of Trustees, who had been David's student, arranged a reception.

# U of W to Hike Parking Fees

The University of Windsor is raising parking permit fees by five per cent this coming school year.

The proposal, approved by the university's board of governors, raises the price for a student eight month parking permit by \$13.12 to \$274.16, with the price of a student 12-month pass rising by \$15.48 to \$328.32. The price of faculty and staff parking permits would also rise by five per cent.

Last year, students saw the price of their parking permits rise three per cent, with faculty and staff permit fees going up three to five per cent. According to the university, the rates are still below the median compared to other Ontario schools.
