# President Alan Wildeman Will Leave Office June 30, 2018



University of Windsor President Alan Wildeman announced that he will leave his position effective June 2018. Dr. Wildeman was appointed to his position July 1, 2008.

The announcement came during his annual State of the University address, in which Wildeman said he had made his decision only after long reflection.

"I am immensely proud of what the University has accomplished since I've been here. But it is all of you who have done it and the biggest task and the biggest joy for me is to applaud you," he said to an audience that included faculty, staff, students, board members, retirees, and community leaders.

"It's the right time for renewal to occur. The rebuilding of the campus, the integration into the downtown, the investment in new faculty, the need to make the rest of Ontario more aware of us, and most importantly the need to never waver from our story of letting students know that they come first... these were the things I saw as being important when I began."

Wildeman informed the University's Board of Governors of his decision prior to his address and the board will immediately begin the process to undertake a search for the next president.

## UWINDSOR Ranked Number One Among Five Rising Universities

UWindsor ranked number one among the country's rising universities. The University of Windsor was top among five universities named "Canada's Rising Stars" in University Hub's recently released Canadian University Rankings. The publication says the institutions named already have a lot to offer and promise to become household names in the near future.

University Hub cited UWindsor's investment in infrastructure, programs, and research among the reasons for its inclusion in the list and called the recently announced Science Research and Innovation Centre "an incredible space for creativity and collaboration."

"I am absolutely delighted to accept a second term as Vice-President, Research and Innovation, and I look forward to continuing interacting with our colleagues and advancing the research mandates of the University of Windsor," he said.

### **Associate Vice-President Academic Appointed**

**Provost Douglas Kneale** announced Wednesday the appointment of **Jeff Berryman** to a five-year term as associate vice-president, academic, effective March 1. Prof. Berryman had been serving in the role in an acting capacity since January 2016.

In making the announcement, Dr. Kneale highlighted Berryman's six years chairing the appraisal committee of the Ontario Universities Council on Quality Assurance, which is responsible for reviewing new degree programs, major modifications and graduate diplomas.

## The 2017 Federal Budget Reflects the Vital Role of the Country's Universities in Growing Prosperity and Improving Quality of Life for All Canadians.

Universities Canada says the 2017 budget released Wednesday by federal Finance Minister Bill Morneau reflects the vital role of the country's universities in growing prosperity and improving quality of life for all Canadians.

"The federal government is strategically investing in people and ideas to build a more prosperous Canada," says Elizabeth Cannon, chair of Universities Canada. "Today's support for university talent will help Canada become a model for the world in inclusive innovation."

In its response to the budget announcement, the organization noted:

\$117.6 million over eight years to fund 25 Canada 150 Research Chairs, attracting top researchers from around the world:

\$221 million over five years to provide 10,000 work-integrated learning placements for Canadian post secondary students and graduates each year;

\$90 million in increased funding to the Post-Secondary Student Support Program;

\$5 million per year for five years in new funding to Inspire, an Indigenous-led organization delivering postsecondary scholarships and bursaries for First Nations, Inuit and Métis students; and \$225 million over four years to establish a new organization to support skills development and measurement in Canada.

Present: Dr. Norman King, Mr Roger Lauzon, Dr Alfie Morgan, Dr Julio Menzes, Dr Datta Pillay, Dr Roger Hussey, Prof. David Palmer (Chair), Dr. Ihor Stebelsky Regrets: Christina Simmons

- 1. Approval of Agenda. Carried
- 2. Approval of Executive Meeting minutes December 7, 2016. Carried
- 3. Business Arising was covered under the Agenda
- 4. Presidents Report
- a). The Chair had written to Ms Penny Allen in reference to their appointment of Dr Datta Pillay as Equity Assessor on the Presidential Research Committee but no response has yet been received.
- b) Attention was being paid to bring the email addresses up to date but the task had not yet been completed. Dr Datta Pillay considered that working with Roger Lauzon, a complete list would be ready before the Fall AGM. Dr Norman King suggested that the dues date would be for the year and this was accepted.
- c) The organising committee for the recruitment event met in November. The proposal was to have an event immediately before the spring Annual General Meeting, possibly at 2.00 pm. There would be a concerted effort through leaflets and the newsletter emphasising the benefits of becoming a member of WURA
- 5.Treasurer's Report -Dr Norm King stated that WURA had a sound financial base. Membership was declining because fewer faculty were retiring. This did not cause any immediate financial problems and the recruitment driver at the spring annual general meeting could boost membership. Dr King reported that the Bank charged a significant sum for checks and it was agreed that when the need for more checks arose Dr King would investigate the terms of the WFCU.
- 6. WUFA Executive Report Dr Datta Pillay stated that the meetings were weekly and the role was consultative
- 7. WUFA Contract Committee Dr Julio Menezes stated that the Collective Agreement required a definition of "Retirees". Contract Committee is at the stage of finding a wording for contract proposals

Julio Menezes will submit on behalf of WURA a definition of Retirees which was previously undefined in the Collective Agreement

8. WUFA Council Report.- Professor David Palmer stated that the next meeting would be in March and it was agreed that he would judge the most important issues, if any, to

contribute at that time

9. Report from the Pensions and Benefits Committee - Dr Ihor Stebelsky submitted a written report. One issue that the Executive Committee discussed was that of members with aging parents. Although no problems had been encountered, yet it was agreed to monitor any shifts in population aging and be alert to any issues that arose.

10. WURA Website Upgrade to Drupal 7.

Roger Lauzon had attended training sessions and considered that the update was a lengthy process that could take between 6 months and one year. Roger Lauzon suggested that he would form a small committee to support the work and this was agree. Dr Alfie Morgan stated that it might be possible to find a student who could do some of the work as a project. It was agreed to investigate this.

- 11. Newsletter Dr Datta Pillay had already decided the main content and the newsletter would go out 2 to 3 weeks before the spring annual general meeting.
- 12. Correspondence Prof David Palmer advised that the CURAC Conference would take place on May 24-26 in Ottawa. He was unable to attend and there was some discussion on who would be able to attend. Roger Lauzon thought he may be able to attend and Dr Datta Pillay suggested that if there was a sufficient number they could all travel by car.

Next meeting - The next meeting will be on April 18th at 12 noon.

# Travel and Extended Health Insurance Plans Now Offered To Retiree Members of a Curac/arucc Association

The following is the text of a letter signed by President Ken Craig that was sent to all university and college retiree associations that are members of CURAC/ARUCC:

It is a pleasure to provide news culminating the search for providers of travel/trip cancellation insurance and extended health benefits insurance.

While a full promotional roll-out will happen later, I am happy to inform you, on behalf of CURAC/ARUCC, that we have affinity agreements with Johnson Inc. (for Medoc travel insurance) and Retired Teachers of Ontario RTO/ERO (for the RTO/ERO extended health care plan, also administered by Johnson Inc.).

# Travel/Trip Cancellation Insurance CURAC/ARUCC has identified the following two programs:

1. Medoc offers competitive travel/trip cancellation insurance, with rates varying by age and medical condition. A summary of their offering can be perused at https://www.johnson.ca/travel/medoc/splashen.jspx

Interested individuals may call 1-866-606-3362 with specific questions, to obtain a quote and to purchase the insurance. Please identify yourself by the university/college association from whence you come, and quote group number 087 unit 11.

2. RTO/ERO does not offer stand-alone travel insurance. However, their full extended health care package includes competitive travel/trip cancellation insurance. Rates are not age-banded and their full rate becomes increasingly a better travel value for clients at age 76 and upward. For those who opt to maintain their current EHB coverage and purchase this as their travel add-on, an incidental value is that the client would also have top-up insurance in other included categories. To contact them, please call the Plan administrator (Johnson) at the RTO/ERO toll-free telephone number 1-877-406-9007; identify yourself as a member of the CURAC/ARUCC group; and identify your member association.

Note that RTO/ERO is permitted to offer its Plan

only to members of RTO/ERO. Therefore, to enroll in the Plan you must become a member, at an annual cost of \$56. Membership enquiries may be directed to RTO at 1-800-361-9888.

#### **Extended health benefits insurance**

CURAC has identified the RTO/ERO Plan as one which might be of interest to members who are seeking to purchase new EHB insurance, transfer to a new plan, or add to their existing insurance. CURAC members who are currently in a group health benefits plan will be accepted as members of the RTO Plan with no medical questionnaire. Those not currently in a group plan will be pleased to learn that from now until April 30, 2017, RTO will treat those with an individual insurance plan as if they were coming from a group insurance plan and therefore will waive the medical questionnaire. Those with no current extended health benefits plan will need to complete the questionnaire to be assessed for acceptance.

RTO's Plan administrator (Johnson) is ready to accept calls for information and/or for enrolment. As a first step, we urge interested individuals to 4 carefully review the RTO extended health care plan and rates available at

### Please note, in particular:

- This plan includes a travel and trip cancellation benefit for \$2,000,000 per person, per trip for unlimited trips per year of 93 days duration each. Supplementary coverage may be purchased for trips of more than 93 days duration.
- · Vision care benefit is included.
- The prescription drug benefit is limited to \$3,300 annually per person.
- Rates vary relative only to single, double, or family. They are not age-banded.

The Carleton University Retirees Association (CURA) will host the 2017 annual conference of the College and University Retiree Associations of Canada (CURAC) on the Carleton campus in the Richcraft Building (formerly called the River Building), May 24 – May 26, 2017. This coincides with the 75th anniversary of Carleton University and the 150th anniversary of Canada's confederation. They are expecting around 100 delegates from universities and colleges across Canada.

On Wednesday afternoon, May 24 from 2-4 pm the Provost and Vice-President Academic of Carleton, Peter Ricketts, will host a reception for all Carleton retirees and CURAC delegates in the Richcraft Building atrium (2nd floor). This will be followed by registration and a reception for CURAC delegates in the same location. The Thursday and Friday sessions, May 25 and 26, and the Thursday evening Banquet, will also take place in the Richcraft Building.
