The Windsor University Retirees' Association-WURA (Faculty,Librarian, Administrator) at Windsor was formed in 1990, to give a unified voice to retirees; to provide a bridge for communication with the University; to encourage social contact among the retirees; and to open a few doors through which retirees could continue to contribute to the University of Windsor. Thus the Association is meant to fill what could otherwise be a void in the lives of retirees – possible isolation from the University and from their former colleagues; and possible lack of understanding of vital pension and health issues that affect them directly.

There are only two meetings of the full membership per year: in the spring and the fall. An informal social committee arranges several other events per year – dinners, plays, picnics, and so on –all of which are paid for by those who take part. The Association encourages smaller special interest groups to form as occasion and their interests warrant. Because of extreme economy of operation, dues have been kept at the level of \$20 per year. This includes four issues of The Retirees' Newsletter.

University Begins 50th Anniversary Celebrations

The 50th anniversary events on campus will occur throughout the year. Various academic units and Departments have enthusiastically planned activities for particular projects in the downtown. Phase I has been set this celebration. Special events are planned between September 19-22, 2013. This includes a Kick-off luncheon for 300 key stakeholders, in the Augustus Hall Windsor's Caesar. A 50th anniversary video produced and coproduced by Suede Productions was launched. The event was generously supported by Windsor Family Credit Union.

President Alan Wildeman's Outreach

The University of Windsor is in the midst of significant change. From the transformation of the campus including the downtown, to the shifting balances between undergraduate, graduate, domestic and international enrolment, to the more aggressive intrusions of government into postsecondary affairs, to the rising profile of our research and teaching within Ontario, this is an important time in the evolution of the university. As president, it places greater expectations and need on me to be doing all I can through outreach to help these transformations succeed.

Government relations, alumni and donor relations, fundraising, and support of student recruitment in key markets are things that require strategic engagement by the president. We have a strategic plan, a Capital Transformation Plan, a soon-to-be-completed Campus Master Plan, a strong and loyal administration team, a resource allocation model, and crystallizing messages about how our scholarship is important for society. The challenge now is to keep focused on those and to ensure they are executed.

2013 Clark Awards

Clark Awards have been presented annually since 1994 and are named in honour of the late Charles J. Clark, O.C., Q.C., LL.D., former Chancellor of the University of Windsor. The award recognizes outstanding personal service of both alumni volunteers and friends of the University.

The 2013 recipients are:

Eddie Francis ('02 LLB), a UWindsor alumnus and the youngest mayor in the history of the City of Windsor. Mayor Francis has been in office since 2003 and led the commission of a ground-breaking report to assess the need for new inter-modal transportation systems and border crossings that resulted in the \$1.8 billion Parkway project and a new bridge project connecting Windsor and Detroit.

He holds a combined undergraduate degree in chemistry and biochemistry from Western University and is a graduate of the University of Windsor's Faculty of Law. He began his career in a small family business, which he ran and grew with his brothers before being elected

mayor. He is married to Dr. Michelle Prince and is the father of Sienna and Phoenix.

Mike Horrobin ('86 BCom), a UWindsor alumnus and Vice-President, Finance and Chief Financial Officer of Tepperman's, a furniture, appliance and electronics chain where he began his career in 1991.

Mr. Horrobin, the former President of the University of Windsor Alumni Association, joined UWindsor's Board of Governors in 2003. During his term, he chaired its Audit, Pension and Resource Allocation committees and was Board Chair during his final two years of service.

He currently serves on the Board of Directors for Hotel-Dieu Grace Hospital, where he is also Chair of the Finance and Audit committees. Mr. Horrobin also serves as Vice-President of the Windsor-Essex Children's Aid Foundation.

Dr. Lois Smedick, Professor Emeritus, University of Windsor. Dr. Smedick has been a member of the University of Windsor community since 1963. Among her many services to the University, Dr. Smedick was Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research; served several terms as a representative on University Senate;

Her community involvement includes serving as President and Board Chair of the Art Gallery of Windsor, as well on several of the gallery's sub-committees.

Among her many honours, Dr. Smedick has received the President's Equity Award; the Mayor's Award for Excellence in Arts as Outstanding Arts Volunteer; an honorary doctorate of Humanities; the Assumption University Rev. E. Carlisle Lebel C.S.B. Award; and the establishment by her colleagues of the Lois K. Smedick Graduate Award, as well as the Lois Smedick HRG Endowment by the Humanities Research Group.

Margaret Williams, an active community volunteer and City Council member who served as President of the Windsor-Detroit International Freedom Festival and was a founding member and President of the Windsor and Essex County Cancer Centre Foundation.

Ms. Williams served three terms as City Councillor for Ward 1, where she chaired such committees as the Licensing Commission; the Convention and Visitors Bureau; Huron Lodge Committee of Management; and the Windsor/Essex Millennium Celebration Committee. Following her council terms she served in the private sector as a planning and development consultant.

Ms. Williams is married to Dr. Noel Williams, a UWindsor professor emeritus. She has two grown children and four grandchildren.

WARNING: OUR BANK DEPOSITS ARE NO LONGER SAFE

Last March we had shocking news. The European financial powers-that-be demanded that failing major banks in Cyprus were be rescued by seizing their clients' deposits. Now that same procedure, dubbed a "bail-in" as distinguished from "bail-outs" which were used during the 2008 financial meltdown, has been mandated for us here in Canada. Page 145 of the 2013 Federal Budget, passed in June, spells it out: In case "a systemically important bank depletes its capital, the bank can be recapitalized and returned to viability through the very rapid conversion of certain bank liabilities into regulatory capital."

Bank liabilities are our assets, including our deposits. In place of our assets we would get "regulatory capital" which is stock in the failing bank—a dubious deal depriving depositors of ready access to cash. The Finance Department has released a "clarification" saying that deposits under \$100,000 would remain insured. But the Budget gives no such reassurance, and it is doubtful that the CDIC would have sufficient funds to cover all claims. Moreover, we have other assets entrusted to the banks-deposits over \$100,000, pensions, RRSPs, GICs, insurance, mutual funds. Our major Canadian banks are not immune from the the attractions of derivatives gambling which now probably exceeds a global volume of \$700 trillion! But they risk losing big time, and when they do, they will need lots our carefully saved assets.

We need to be taking political action against this bailin agenda. In the meantime how can we protect ourselves from this threat of loss? Credit unions may provide havens from bail-ins, but we need to check with each one whether it has entrusted our assets to major banks. And we need to have our Pension and Benefits Committee explore whether our retirement funds are safe from the bail-in agenda.

Leadership is focused on the creation of cultures of safety in the workplace. One of the greatest challenges faced is deciding whether employees should be disciplined when they have been involved in an error. People are human.
