5 Reports/New Business

5.1 Reports from the Student Presidents (UWSA, OPUS, GSS)

University of Windsor Students Alliance (UWSA)

Senators were reminded that as of May 2014 the UWSA has been without an executive or board of directors after students voted down uncontested candidates running for positions. Since then, students

have been working with a consulting firm called the Green Mango and have also been working diligently rewriting their bylaws so that bi-elections can be held soon.

Organization of Part-Time University Students (OPUS)

Members were informed that OPUS continues to work on engaging part-time students through ongoing events and activities. Members were also informed that OPUS has set out their priorities for the year and held a successful orientation with over 200 students in attendance.

Graduate Students Society (GSS)

Members were informed that the GSS annual barbeque was a success with nearly 900 students and staff at the event. It was also noted that the GSS Café and Restaurant is now open for business, which is being operated by Mazaar Café.

5.2 Report of the President

Senators were reminded that the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities (MTCU) approved Strategic Mandate Agreements with each of Ontario's Colleges and Universities, which will likely play a key role in allocations of funding. Recently, there have been communications from the province regarding the future directions for universities and colleges in Ontario. Specifically, they relate to greater focus on differentiation and on the Strategic Mandate Agreements (SMA) that were submitted. Moving forward, program approvals will be more tightly linked to the SMAs. Additional steps may be needed by the University to comply with the new directives.

Members were informed that the Council of Ontario Universities (COU) has developed a consortium to develop onlines course and increase the availability of courses to students across the province. The Council of Ontario Universities is administering a call for proposals to support the development of university online courses. The goal is to leverage existing online strengths and provide online learning opportunities for students while enhancing student access and mobility. It was noted that a maximum of \$75,000 has been made available per online course. The types of collaborations that are eligible for funding can include partnerships between different academic departments, between two or more universities, or between a university (or universities) and a college (or colleges).

Concern was raised regarding the issue that the development of online course offerings and programming may be counter-intuitive to the Ministry's Differentiation Policy Framework. In response, it was noted that the changes are intended to encourage institutions to strengthen their innovative approaches to teaching and learning while continuing to offer high quality educational experience to students, thus not working at cross purposes. The overriding goal for a differentiated system is to build on well-established strengths of institutions and give students affordable access to post-secondary education.

Members were informed that Ontario's community colleges are lobbying to be able grant three-year Baccalaureate degrees (in addition to offering applied degrees), thus making degree completion times shorter and a degree education more cost effective and therefore possibly more attractive to students. However, the province needs to weigh these requests against employer and societal benefits of graduates with a broad-based, curiosity-driven education provided by universities.

5.3 Report of the Academic Colleague

An overview was provided to Senators on the main topics of discussion at the recent meeting of Academic Colleagues which included the following: 1) the funding framework for postsecondary education; 2) pension plans; 3) tuition; 4) Quality Council and 5) the Online Course Fund. Members were also informed that the Council of Ontario Universities honoured Roberta L. Jamieson with the David C. Smith Award. In response to a question raised regarding evaluating the effectiveness of the online courses it was noted that there is a ridged evaluation process in place where a panel of academic online

learning experts from all Ontario institutions will be assessing each proposal as part of the funding approval process.

The document was received for information.

5.4 Senate Student Caucus

Members were informed that a student co-chair has been elected to work with the faculty co-chair. It was noted that one of the student's main duties will be to bring matters of student concern to the regular meeting agenda. Currently the student co-chair is working on creating an online discussion board for students in consultation with Centre for Teaching and Learning. It is anticipated that this will help facilitate engagement with members and students groups regarding various issues and ideas that would be of interest to Student Caucus. A few of the student issues that are in the process of being discussed include the scheduling of mid-term exams and the policy on final exams. Currently there are no regulations for students writing midterms and a result students often have to write up to four midterms in a day. In terms of final exams, the current policy is that a student who has more than two final exams scheduled in a calendar day may apply to have one of the exams moved to another exam date. Issues will be fully vetted and reported back to Senate as appropriate.

The Certificate in Border Management program is a new initiative from the Cross Border Institute in collaboration with the Centre for Interfaculty programs that is geared to addressing the emerging trends in border management and international trade.

The Certificate program includes eight courses: each course can be taken individually as a standalone course, part of an individual's professional development, or as part of a required course, leading to a Cross-Border Management Level I and/or Level II Certificate (as issued by the CBI). Completion of all eight courses leads to the proposed Certificate in Border Management and International Trade and with the addition of one year of professional experience to the Certified International Trade Professional (*CITP**) designation.

The target market is working professionals as well as current students. In response to a question raised, members were reminded that as per the regulations for certificates, all of the courses from a degree program may be counted towards the requirements of a certificate program in a different area of study. Also, students may be granted advanced standing for all of the courses from a certificate program towards any degree.

The proposed program will be taught by a combination of full-time faculty members and sessional instructors, with the majority being sessional instructors at this time due to the expertise needed.

Given that the Certificate program's course offerings include face-to-face, online and blended delivery options, it is complimentary to the University's Strategic Mandate Agreement.

5.6 Academic Policy Committee

Reading Week – Nursing Update

At the April 11, 2014 Senate meeting, it was agreed that an exception for the timing of the reading week for Nursing in light of preceptors working hours be reviewed by the Academic Policy Committee. Since then, the Faculty of Nursing has determined that such an exception is not necessary since very few students are impacted and preceptors working hours can be accommodated on an individual basis.

5.6.1 Report on Student Awards Established During the **2013-2014** Academic Year and Proposed Change to Entrance Scholarship Program (See document Sa141010-5.6.1 for more details)

Senators were provided with an overview on the student awards that were established during the last academic year. Proposed changes to scholarships for 2015/2016 include: 1) Students will not have to apply for entrance scholarships as they will be issued automatically based on final grades attained as of July 1 using the top 6, 12 U or M level courses; 2) Awards will be for a full academic year but paid in two equal installments; 3) There will be no rescinding process in place for the Winter or Summer term; 4) Students must maintain a minimum of an 85% cumulative average by August 1 if going into year 2, 3 or 4 for their renewable scholarship; and, 5) Scholarships may be renewed for 3 years (or 6 additional semesters for co-op students).

In response to a question rasied about some of the scholarship values being reduced, it was noted that this is due to budget constraints. It was also noted that the original grid has been in effect for over 10 years and the new scholarship values are being proposed in order to create a better balance between allocation of resources and student funding.

Strong student concern was raised regarding the issue that the scholarship values are being reduced while tuition fees continue to be raised. Members were reminded that the proposal for Senate is to review the academic averages and not the monetary values.

It was noted that final scholarhip offers are based on final grades attained as of July 1st but final grades from provinces such as Manitoba and British Columbia are received much later. This could disadvantage students as grades attained after July 1 will not be used to adjust a student's scholarship offer. In response, it was noted that the timelines and procedures can and will be altered as needed.

- fostering faculty, student and staff exchanges and placements, as well as co-op and internship opportunities, that offer an international experience;
- ensuring the implementation of Senate Bylaw(s) as they pertain to international affairs;
- promoting the University's academic programs and student services to the local, regional, national, and international communities, in collaboration with appropriate areas on campus.
- delivery of English support programs for second language students through the Centre for English Language Development.

It was noted that the bylaw is being revised to reflect the changes to the Vice Provost's position, which highlights the role of Dean of Students and removes the international affairs component.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: That the title of the position be reworded to read: *Vice-Provost, Student Affairs and Dean of Students*.

5.7.3 Revised Bylaws 20, 22, 23

MOTION: That the revised Bylaws 20, 22 and 23, be approved.

Members were provided with an overview of the changes to *Bylaw 20: Types and Terms of Appointments, Bylaw 22: Renewal, Tenure and Promotion,* and *Bylaw 23: Criteria for Renewal, Tenure and Promotion.* The revisions reflect the instructions provided by Senate during the last academic year.

All changes requested by Senate at its June meeting were included in these revisions. The Bylaw Review Committee also discussed the concern raised regarding current criteria for tenure and promotion for Dramatic Art. However, since Senate did not direct the Committee to consider an exception and since Senate had underscored that these bylaws are to reflect consistent University-wide procedures and criteria, these drafts do not provide for an exception for Dramatic Art.

The floor was open for discussion and the following feedback and proposed revisions were provided:

Bylaw 22

Item 2.4 should clarify that, in addition to tenure, approval for the first sabbatical is subject to all other rules governing the granting of such leaves .

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: 2.4: Granting of the first sabbatical leave is subject to the granting of tenure, *and subject to other rules governing the granting of sabbatical leaves.*

Item 4.5 should apply to Assistant professors only. There should be no two-year restriction on associate professor or professor ranks. Because the application for tenure is submitted at the beginning of the candidate's fifth year, it would be clearer to refer to the maximum length of employment at the probationary level.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: 4.5: Any untenured faculty member at the Assistant level can be considered for promotion at any time during the probationary period, but may only be considered for tenure after two full years of employment at the University. In such cases, s/he shall initiate the process by making an application to the AAU Head by September 15. The maximum length of employment at the probationary period prior to the consideration of tenure, level is six full years of employment.

Bylaw 23

Definition of Scholarship: Concern was raised regarding the issue that the definition does not include peer-reviewed monographs, which differ from journal articles in that they focus on a single subject or aspect of that subject in depth.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: Scholarship includes research, scholarly and creative activity, such as articles published in reputable scholarly journals, **peer-reviewed monographs**, invited papers delivered to academic or professional associations, demonstrated ability in creative work, conducting or directing, juried exhibits or performances, peer-evaluated unpublished research deemed by senior colleagues to be of a publishable calibre, and other scholarly activities.

Members commended the Bylaw Review Committee on the revised bylaws.

Searches

Members were informed that Searches are underway for the positions of Associate Vice-President Academic, Dean of the Library, and Dean of the Faculty of Education and Academic Development.

Study week

Senators were reminded that the upcoming Reading Week will be implemented during the week of Thanksgiving. It was stressed that this break is a week free from any evaluative procedures and mirrors the study breaks in the Winter and Summer terms, as was the intent when approved by Senate. Students will be able to choose how they wish to use the break. (*i.e.*, study, vacation, *etc.*).

In response to a question raised about whether professors should have regular office hours, it was noted that this is up to the instructor's discretion. The Provost will send out a memo to explain and remind instructors about the purpose of reading week. (See Senate document Sa140411-5.6.2 for more details about the Reading week)

6 Question Period/Other Business

Concern was raised regarding the issue that there has been instances where instructors have not submitted their final grades for a course seven days after the final exam has been written, which is problematic for students that may be required to withdraw from programs. If this feedback is not communicated, then students can continue to register in courses that will not count towards a degree once they are sent the notice to withdraw, which is extremely costly and unfair. In response, it was noted that compliance to Senate Bylaw 51 is extremely important and this issue should be further discussed with the Provost.
