5.6 Academic Policy Committee

5.6.1 University Operating Budget 2019-2020

Senators were informed that the University is proposing a balanced budget for 2019/20. The 2019/20 operating revenue is budgeted at \$291,115M, which is a slight increase of over 2018/19 due to higher projected enrolments for Fall 2019 (15,045 full time and 1,815 part-time students). The budget has taken into consideration the new tuition framework, the Student Choice Initiative, projected enrolment growth and adjustments to Strategic Investments. The largest expenditure in the University Operating Budget is still salaries, wages and benefits representing approximately 74% of the Operating Budget. The University's continued commitment to maintaining its fiscal position has served the institution well and has enabled it to still set aside \$6.3M for Strategic Investment Funds.

The floor was open for comments/questions.

In response to a question raised, it was noted the cancellation of the graduate enrolment stimulus fund required the operating budget to absorb the unexpected expenses commencing 2019/20.

In response to a question raised about the gender breakdown of the 50 new faculty members through the Strategic Priority Fund positions, in addition to the five female faculty members hired through the President's Indigenous Peoples Scholars initiative, it was noted that this was reported at Senate last year.²

Concern was raised regarding the issue that we are still considered to be a publicly funded institution even though only 35% of our operating grant comes from the Province.

In response to a question raised about the Strategic Enrolment Management Plan (SEM), members were reminded that a few years ago the University hired external consultants (*SEM Works*) to undertake the review of recruitment, admissions, and retention practices which lead to the creation of the 2017-2019 SEM plan. In the future, the associate vice-president of enrolment management has been tasked with working on developing a new strategic enrolment plan.

In response to a question raised regarding Senate's role in the SEM, it was noted that the document was brought to Senate (2017) for consultation and feedback.

Concern was raised regarding the issue that under the existing enrolment centered budgeting model, funds generated from the cost-recovery course-based graduate programs are not going back to the program areas to cover the cost of incidentals (such as lab fees). Instead, the revenue generated is bypassing the Deans and going directly towards the Faculty deficits. In response it was suggested that a conversation be had between the Deans and Budgets regarding resources.

5.6.1.1 Report from Academic Policy Committee

APC members reiterated the concern that Windsor's (and other universities') increasingly reliance on international tuition fees, as the domestic student population declines and in light of budget constraints (with only one-third of the budget coming from government grants and recent government directives on domestic tuition), is not without risks. APC members stressed the need for strategic enrolment management planning.

Members were provided with an overview of the mandate of the APC Subcommittee. It was noted that the Subcommittee agreed with the student focus group recommendation that bylaw 51 should require that course syllabi include information on the University's mental health resources. In addition, the Subcommittee also identified an additional revision to bylaw 51 to explicitly establish that mental health issues must be considered under clause 1.18 and 2.6, Considerations for Health, Bereavement, or Extenuating Circumstances.

The floor was open for comments.

In response to a question raised regarding including information on the University's metal health resources on the course syllabus, it was noted that APC has provided some suggested wording, for Faculties interested in some direction.

Although the intent of the proposed change to include the terminology "including mental health issues" is to clarify for instructors that this clause is inclusive of mental health, concern was raised that this perpetuates the categorization of mental health as "other". It was argued that there is no need for this phrase as it should be understood that mental health falls within "serious health circumstances".

Although not a proposed change to the bylaw, it was noted that the reference to "physician's letter" should be updated so that it encompasses medical notes from regulated health care professionals. The Senate Policy on Notes from Regulated Health Care Professionals states that the University of Windsor accepts medical notes or certificates signed by any health care professional regulated under either the Health Professions Act (RHPA) or the Social Services Work Act or equivalent.

It was expressed that when dealing with serious health circumstances of any manner, the people that are involved should be extremely sensitive regarding the sharing of specific information to protect the privacy of the student. It was noted that the policy on medical notes states that a diagnosis does not have to be disclosed and cannot be required.

It was reiterated that the issue of consideration of Indigenous peoples and practices needs to be taking into account when engaging in in dialogue about wellness on campus, especially if they are referred off-campus for support that is tailored to Indigenous people.

In light of the feedback and concerns it was agreed that this item be sent back to the Bylaw Review Committee for consideration.

5.7 Senate Governance Committee

5.7.1 Bylaw 51 Revisions: Proposal for New Bylaw 54 (Undergraduate) and New Bylaw 55 (Graduate)

That proposed revisions to Bylaw 51 be approved, including dividing the bylaw into two bylaws: Bylaw 54, Undergraduate Academic Evaluation Procedures, and Bylaw 55, Graduate Academic Evaluation Procedures, and that the proposed revisions be approved.

The proposed change creates separate bylaws for undergraduate and graduate students for academic evaluative procedures and provides graduate students with the same rights, responsibilities and protections as undergraduate students.

In response to a question raised pertaining to the Dean of Graduate Studies approving exemptions for providing meaningful feedback on in course performance at the graduate level, it was noted that there may be courses similar to a thesis, internship or practicum where providing 20% prior to the voluntary withdraw deadline would not be pedagogically sound. These exceptions come forward to the Dean upon recommendation from the AAU Head.

In response to a clarification sought on the term "promotion", it was noted that this refers to promotion of a student to the degree. It was further noted that when reviewing a case, the Standing Required for Continuation is reviewed as well as the other requirements defined by the specific Faculty.

Clarification was sought regarding what is meant by referring to days the University is closed. It was noted that these are the days noted as closed in the official dates posted by the Registrar as well as any other official announcement by the University of official closures, such as in the case of snow days.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: No forms of assessment shall be scheduled or made do on days identified as break days such as reading weeks, holidays, or days that the University is *officially* closed.

In response to a question about the procedures in place if an assessment is not able to be submitted due to school closure, it was noted that the evaluation, which includes test or submission due date, will be automatically rescheduled for the next regular class schedule.

In response to a question raised about the rationale for including the words "hard copy or electronic" in place of a "written" course outline, it was noted that this was done deliberately as some departments were interpreting "written" as only being a paper copy.

A minor correction was noted.

5.7.2 Biomedical Sciences – New AAU Proposal

A presentation was provided to Senators on the proposal to create a new Department of Biomedical Sciences in the Faculty of Science. It was noted that discussions regarding the possible establishment of creating a Biomedical Sciences Department apart from Biological Sciences began in 2018.

The main objective of creating the department is to expand the health and biomedical focus by creating a new and cohesive department that centers on growing and strengthening research and education in Biomedical Sciences. Additional objectives include increasing recruitment of top local academic undergraduates, attracting new students from outside Windsor-Essex, and increase collaboration across disciplines.

It is anticipated that health and biomedical careers will be among some of the most sought out fields in science and one of the areas with the lowest unemployment rate.

If approved, the goal is to launch the department by July 1st and work towards developing a BSc program in Biomedical Science with Chemistry and Biochemistry as well as offering the BSc program in Molecular Biology and Biotechnology by 2020. Additional future goals would include the development of a MSc and PhD in Biomedical Science and a MSc in Translational Health Research. Also, the area would like to propose developing certificate programs.

Interested faculty members will have the opportunity to join the new department and there is potential for cross appointments and re-deployments. There are current faculty with teaching and research interests related to biomedical sciences that have already committed to forming part of the proposed new department.

The floor was open for comments/questions and a discussion ensued.

In response to a question raised about the need to create an additional department since the current AAU offers a BSc Honours Biology and Biochemistry (Health and Biomedical Stream), it was noted that one of the main recruitment challenges is that Windsor does not have a standalone program which is a deterrent for students or a department specific to them. The structure of a unit and how it is perceived is very important to applicants and their families. With an everchanging demographic the academic landscape often needs to shift and be rebranded to be competitive in a student-driven environment.

Currently Windsor is one of the four Universities out of 20 in Ontario that does not have a health or biomedical sciences department. The majority of Ontario universities (13) have a Biology Department plus a standalone Health or Biomedical Sciences Department. This keeps Windsor from being able to market effectively in a such a competitive environment.

In response to a concern raised about application numbers it was noted that currently there are over 300 students in the existing programs in Biology. It was reiterated that there are no budgetary implication and that the current related programs or streams will move to the new department with future program proposals being brought forward through to Senate.

With diverse disciplines and interests within Biological Sciences, it was noted that developing this proposal has not been without its challenges, but the proposal (which was faculty-member led) was supported by a strong majority vote at Faculty of Science Coordinating Council.
