Dr. Carlo Charles joined the department as an Assistant Professor. Carlo specializes in the sociology of international migration, sexualities, social and economic inequality, and race and ethnicity. Over the past year, he has presented research at several conferences, including the Canadian Sociological Association, the American Sociological Association, the Haitian Studies Association, and the American Studies Association, among others.



Dr. Camisha Sibblis joined the department as an Assistant Professor. She is currently the Director of the Black Scholars Institute (BSI), and a Registered Social Worker. She specializes in systemic oppression, anti-Black racism, Criminal Justice, the sociology of education, mental health, and neo-coloniality.



Dr. Wesley Tourangeau has also joined the department as an Assistant Professor. His work connects green criminology and critical criminology with socio-ecological sustainability and systems thinking. This includes researching systems of regulation, discourse, and practice that influence interactions between humans, non-human animals, and the natural environment. Research Spotlight: Sabbatical in France

Dr. Ronjon Paul Datta, Associate Professor and Graduate Faculty member specializing in social theory, spent his half-sabbatical (January 2024 to June 2024) as Chercheur Invité at the Centre Émile Durkheim and the Faculté de Sociologie at the Université de Bordeaux, France.

Dr. Datta was conducting research for his book on Durkheim, and for a chapter on Durkheim, Foucault, and exclusion for a contemporary collection being edited by Drs. Paul Carls and Marcel Fournier.

Bordeaux was the context for Durkheim's most productive and innovative period, 1887-1902. Dr. Datta conducted research on this milieu to provide a contemporary humanistic view on the emergence of modern French sociology during this very dynamic, contradictory, and volatile period of the French Third Republic.

Dr. Datta benefited significantly from immersion in the contemporary French sociology scene, and especially from regular collegial discussions with senior faculty members at Bordeaux, especially Matthieu Béra and Ronan Hervouet. Of his sojourn, he reports that it was "the best decision I've made as an academic since becoming a professor. It changed my understanding of the history and development of French society and its political culture."

Faculty Spotlight: World Health Organization (WHO) and Ethics

During her sabbatical (2022-23), Dr. Suzanne McMurphy was a consultant to the World Health Organization's Science Division, working with the Secretariat to the Research Ethics Committee as part of an international team preparing and managing research ethics review files. During the two years she worked with WHO, she initiated and managed a weekly on-line drop-in centre for research ethics for WHO staff and researchers.



This past term (Winter 2024), Dr. McMurphy worked with researchers in Ireland to develop a set of on-line modules for training on research ethics for researchers and ethics committee members. She is currently working with the team from Ireland on enhancing these modules as resources for the scholarship of research ethics.

Dr. Camisha Sibblis is the first Director of the University of Windsor's Black Scholars Institute.




Research Spotlight: Faces of Racism

Dr. Jane Ku and Dr. Francisca Omorodion are undertaking a SSHRC-funded three-year multi-disciplinary project to explore and document the racialized experience of African, Caribbean, and Black (ACB) women in the Windsor Essex community.

The ACB community experiences inequality in many aspects of social life because of the systemic racism, such as education, immigration, criminal justice, labor market, economic income, etc. The project will develop a comprehensive examination of systemic racism in Windsor Essex, with the guidance of feminist intersectionality and critical race theory. The outcomes include developing strategies for ACB women to challenge racism, nurture the capacity of community organizations to address gendered racism, and contribute to the promotion of anti-racist knowledge and legal frameworks.

The project engages seven researchers across disciplines (with five additional research appointments to students and two community researchers), four ACB community-based organizations and two legal services.

UWindsor at CSA Congress May 29 – June 2 2023


